# Only 11 Jurors Accepted by 2:40 in Trial of Jones THREE WOUNDED AND TWO OTHERS FORCED TO GIVE UP ATTEMP

HUNTSVILLE, March 7. (UP).)-Charles Frazier, life termer sentenced for robbery with firearms, from Houston county; Pete Finch, serving 10 years for robbery with firearms, from Taylor, Ellis and San Jacinto counties, and Edward MacArthur, serving 10 years for burglary, from Galveston county, were shot as they attempted to scale the walls of the prison here during an early morning break today.

Frazier and Finch, shot from ladders, were expected to die. Two others who surrendered to guards were Ray

Thornton and the former husband of Bonnie Parker, companion of Clyde Barrow and Robert Hill. The attempted break occurred as 300 other prisoners slept in their cells. They escaped from their cells by use of a crude hand made key. They were a propulsion of the current of the c

by use of a crude hand made key. They were encountered by Gus Gray, guard, as they tried to get over the walls. Gray fired but miss-ed and other guards assembled. It was the second time in a month that Frazier had attented to es-cape. He, with two others, were stopped by Gray.

**RULES RELEASED**
