Machinery for Starting Potash Work Is Bought

Machinery for sinking a shaft on the potash leases of the Texas Potash corporation on the O. P. Jones ranch 26 miles southwest of Midand, was purchased from a mining supply house in El Paso last week.

Actual work is scheduled to start Tuesday or Wednesday.

The shaft will be 7 by 16 feet and will be sunk to about 2,200 feet. The polyhalite is found below 2,000 feet and this will be the principal mineral recovered. Plans are being worked out for a refinery, which may be located in Midland county or may be located on the Houston ship channel, or on the coast, final

A PROMISE TO THWART CRIMINAL POLITICS

A nation-wide drive to rid the country of racketeers and gangsters will be launched by the national administration, according to dispatches from Washington, just as soon as Congress finishes action on certain pending anti-crime bills.

These laws will give the federal government new power to step into local situations and deal with crooks who have not, so far, been within reach of federal laws.

Significantly enough, it is stated at the capital that federal agents will be enabled to strike directly at gangisters "now shielded by crooked politicians or city officials." It will be a fine thing if the federal authorities ac-

tually do this; and it will be even finer if by doing so they force us to realize what the real trouble with our police system has been. - Nothing could be much odder than the way in which we berate the inefficiency of our police in dealing with organized crime, while we simultaneously put up with the

kind of municipal politics which makes such inefficiency inevitable. How is the ordinary city police force administered, anyhow? Well, the voters in their wisdom elect as mayor John Doe, who is known to be hand in glove with the most

unsavory political gang in town. Mayor Doe appoints Lieutenant Hoozis chief of police; Chief Hoozis immediately promotes all the officers who favored John Doe's election and demotes those who

Hoozis knows he will stay chief of police only as long as he keeps on the good side of Mayor Doe, and one of Mayor Doe's chief allies is the high-powered lawyer whose clients include the biggest racketeers in town.

Furthermore, Mayor Doe is busy selling special favors to some of the town's best citizens, so the general atmosphere is hardly conducive to strict honesty. As a result, Hoozis keeps his trap shut, does as he's

told, and makes hay while the sun shines. A couple of years later some other politician beats Mayor Doe, a new chief is appointed, and the same rou-

tine is followed, with a new set of names. Now this is the sort of thing that is put up with in the great majority of our cities. The wonder is that the racketeers and gangsters haven't walked off bodily with most of our city halls.

If this federal campaign makes us realize that the war on crime ultimately stands or falls by local political conditions, it will be worth all its costs.

HONOR—AT TWENTY PACES!

The ancient and honorable custom of duelling is still observed in France; and one reason that a civilized people like the French put up with it might be that the people who take part in duels are such atrocious marksmen.

Roger de Tour, Royalist leader, fought a duel the other day with Deputy Jean Mistler, former cabinet member. They met on a rifle range near Carcassone, fired two shots apiece at a distance of 20 paces—and missed each other completely.

Honor, one gathers, was satisfied, and the men left the field unscathed.

How even the rottenest shot could miss a target the size of a human body—and miss it twice—at 20 paces is almost beyond comprehension. That two such miserable marksmen could be found at one time and place is even more incomprehensible.



Graf's Sister Ship To Be Ready in Fall

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN. (U.R) - LZ motors is in the last stage of discussion. If the constructors can make up their minds soon the newest dirigible may be ready this fall for its maiden trip.

By July, 1933, the mid-section of the dirigible, with eight principle and 24 auxiliary ribs and a total length of 121 meters, was finished. By September, 160 meters of framework were ready and since that time work has been pushed until at present only the stern skeleton, with its complicated steering apparatus remains

cated steering apparatus, remains to be set in position.

Without the stern section, the ship measures 189 meters. The completed length will be 248 meters, 13 meters longer than the Graf

Despite the only slightly greater length, however, the LZ 129 will have almost double the gas capacity of the Graf. Its circumpacity of the Graf. Its circum-ference will be 41.20 meters com-pared with 30.52 for the Graf Zeppelin, making for a respective carrying capacity of 200,000 as against 105,000 cubic meters.

Meantime the interior construc-tion is rapidly meanting. The

Meantime the interior construc-tion is rapidly progressing. The passenger cabins are well along; piping is at present being laid for hot and cold water. As an inno-vation, the used water will not be discharged, but will be conducted to a special tank as ballast.

Other innovations to be installed in the LZ 129 include an electric lift to facilitate loading and unloading the cargo and huge wheels affixed to the pilot's gondola and the lower fin to aid in landing. These wheels can be turned in any direction.

The LZ 129 will be the first German airship on which smoking is permissable. This has been made possible by the introduction as a

is permissable. This has been made possible by the introduction as a lifting agent of helium gas, hitherto confined to United States airships. The smoking room will be situated on the lower, or "B" deck, equipped with double doors and a veritable "sluice" through which smokers must pass entering or departing. GONZALES. (U.P.)—The village of Ottine, once a thriving trade center that supplied Germany with gun stocks from its walnut woods, may shortly find new fame as the site of a state park.

Gonzales county citizens have raised \$3,000 toward the purchase of approximately 500 acres with the hope of preserving marshes and mud bogs said to hold a botannical wealth, ferns, palms and rare woods that break the monotony of a rolling prairie covered with sage brush. The state park board has asked an option on the land. The federal government has been asked to join the park proposal by designating the site for a camp of the Civilian Conservation corps.

The village derived its name from its tradesman-founder, J. A. Otto,

and his wife, Christine. Shortly before the turn of the century, lumber mills supplied large quantities of walnut and other woods to foreign markets. One lumber mill still operates at Ottine on water power from the San Marcos river.

Ottine also possesses historical significance. The Battle of Plum Creek, which routed Comanche Indians who fled across a human bridge of their own struggling warriors and horses, occurred near




