PAY UP, FIRST!

It is hard to see how anyone can quarrel with the new administration policy by which American loans will not be advanced to foreign debtor nations which are wholly or partially in default on previous loans.

A law embodying this policy is in process of being passed by Congress; without waiting for its passage, Treasury Secretary Morgenthau has made it effective in advance by proclamation.

It may be that all the arguments of the war debt cancellationists are sound. Perhaps our insistence that the debts be paid is delaying world recovery; perhaps we have no moral right to ask that they be repaid. May-

But at least the country is quite within its rights in insisting that no good money is going to go after the bad. We loaned money and we didn't get it back; we can hardly be blamed for concluding that the defaulting bor-

Rubber Shelled Eggs Are Being Perfected Now

BRYON, Cal. (U.P.)—Rubber shelied eggs, a boon to hens and grocers, are being perfected here by Herman Krumland, poultry-man.

Krumland is feeding his hens ground guayule, a Mexican rubber plant, to test a 30-year-old theory that houseing eggs if cracked can

plant to test a 30-year-old theory that bouncing eggs, if cracked, can be vulcanized in a manner similar to an inner tube.

Five years ago Krumland toughened the inner skin of his hens eggs by specialized diet. This led him to believe that the ingredients of the rubber plant might be substituted for the line in the egg shells and the hen induced to produce a resilent covering instead.






