LINDBERGH BABY IS TAKEN FROM CRIB, SPIRITED AWAY

CHINESE **EVACUATE**

Withdraw to Trench Line 12 Miles From City

SHANGHAI, March 2. (UP)-Chinese defense troops evacuated their fortifications around Shanghai today under withering fire from the Japanese and established positions miles to the rear for another dogged stand.

The Chinese commander of the 19th Route army declared that the fight had "just begun" as troops accomplished an orderly retreat to the second defense lines

The Japanese merged land, sea and air forces for driving the offensive and seizing quick advantage of the opportunity offered by the re-treat. They captured a quantity of Chinese munitions.

Scenes of desolation were left in the Chapei sector where the Chinese mined principal streets and set fire to many houses as they retreated. The evacuation began shortly before the expiration of the Japanese ultimatum threatening to blow up the main Shanghai railways.



DEFINITE CLUE IS NOT FOUND TODAY

HOPEWELL, March 2. (UP) .-- Friends of Col. Lindbergh flew over the nearby country photographing and searching for the kidnapers of the Lindbergh baby.

The colonel stayed on the ground directing the search,

o'clock as he lay suffering with a cold. He was wrapped only in his "sleepers." His mother was prostrated from grief and fear that the baby would suffer severe illness.

The child was seized from its crib last night between 7:30 and 10

The note left in the crib said, "We will be back Wednesday to talk business. Don't talk to the police or papers." Lindbergh, grim and reticent as he aided the searchers, was represented as ready personally to enter direct negotiations for the child's return. Literally thousands of police and state troops were put on guard watch-
