

Perhaps you have asked what has become of the plan for a gymnasium.

A check-up this afternoon A check-up this atternoon shewed that the proposition is at a crucial stage. Action by the school board in one direction may mean a gymnasium for Midland, action in the other will mean absolutely that the opportunity is dead. And the action is scheduled to be taken action is scheduled to be taken Saturday.

Here is the deal in a nut-shell. The plan originally was to secure a loan and grant from the federal government for a \$68,000 gymnasium. Of this amount, approximately \$20,000 would be an outright gift, the balance a

In the application, it was set forth that the loan would be self-jiquidating. Although it appeared that the deal would go through, government officials later required that the school district should issue general ob-

The bond issue would require no tax increase, no specific amount to set aside each year for sinking fund and interest but merely an obligation that the school district, through its future boards, would stand be-lind the action of the present

hind the action of the present beard.

As it stands, the school board may pass a resolution pledging itself to order the election for such bonds only in the event the money is allocated, and after the allocation has been made. If the allocation is not made there is no necessity for a bond election.

Then, if the allocation is made, the election is ordered. The amount would be approximately \$38,000 of four per cent bonds, in that there is an outright gift from the government of approximately \$20,000 and the board has the cash to pay as much as \$10,000 down on the loan.

In passing the resolution to

In passing the resolution to order the election, if and after the allocation is made, the board would not necessarily be sponsoring the bond election but would be reviving itself of the responsibility and passing it to the property tax paying voters.

it to the property tax paying voters.

If the board votes not to pass the resolution, it has taken the responsibility itself and deprived the tax paying voters of having a voice in the gymnasium proposition.

Regardless of the outcome of such a bond election, this newspaper expresses the hope that the board Saturday will act to let the voters have an opportunity to voice their opinions.
