This is on the word of Sister Laurentine, director of nursing in St. Francis' Hospital, Pittsburg.

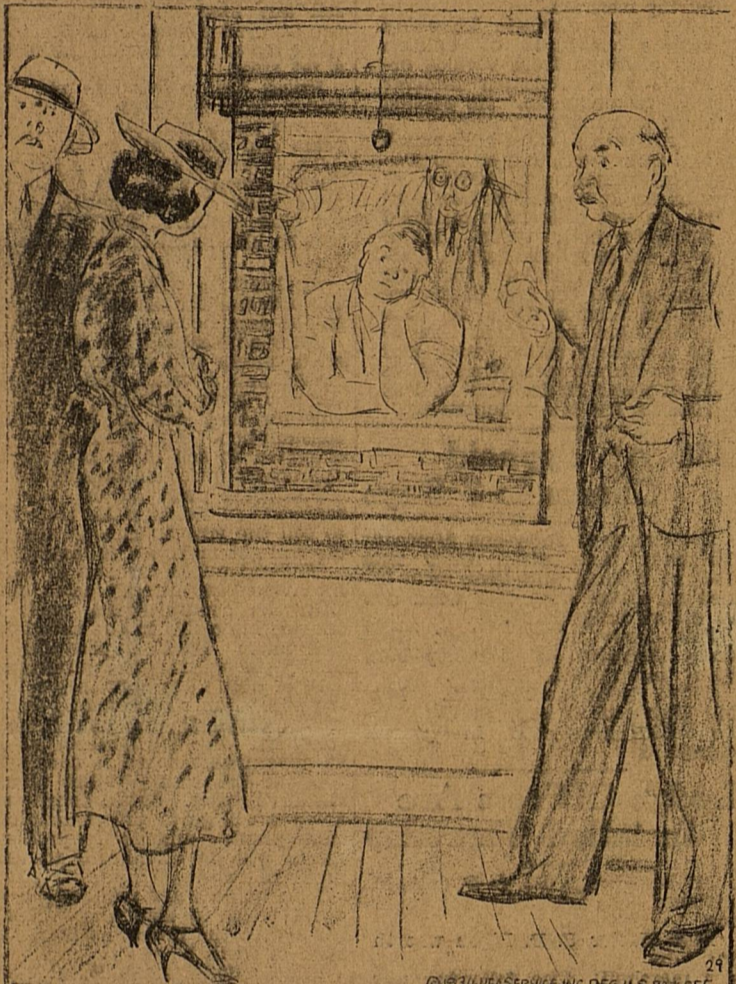

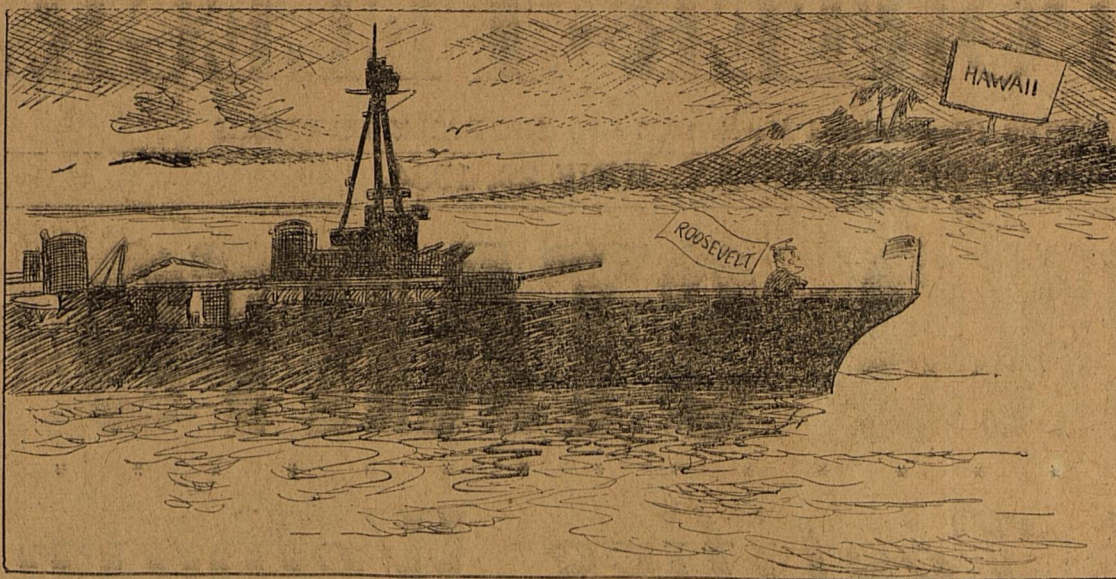

Interstellar Bandits Are Present in Solar Space

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dr. P. W. Merrill of the Carnegie Institution's Mount Wilson observatory, and Sir Arthur Eddington of the University of Cambridge, are agreed that interstellar space is an excellent, but not a perfect vacuum, according to statements released by the pair.

"A few lone atoms—one or two hundred per cubic foot—roam restlessly about attacking passing light rays and robbing them of certain favorite vibrations," Dr. Merrill observed.

There are two kinds of known interstellar "bandits," calcium atoms and sodium atoms; the former stealing violet light and the latter yellow light. Although their demands are not heavy, the American astronomer contended, the effect of the petty thefts is so cumulative that in the spectra of certain distant stars the losses appear plainly visible as dark lines.

A most interesting fact is that the intensities of these interstellar lines are used as measures of the distance of the stars in whose spectra they appear.

Sir Arthur, is corroborating Dr. Merrill's observations, added that the most luminous region of one nebula shades off into that of another. However, there is always tent of about one atom for every cubic inch.

Mid Winter in Oregon May Prove to Be Costly

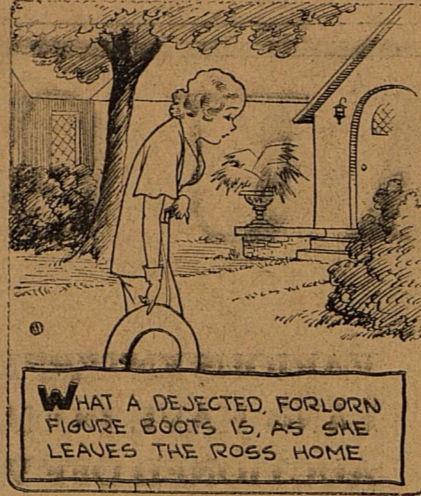
SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Oregon today was paying the penalty for too mild a winter.

Complete absence of frost in many sections of the state, which permitted flowers to bloom and vegetation to remain green all winter, also left alive millions of embryo insects which otherwise would have been killed.

In parts of eastern Oregon the grasshopper plague was reported to be the worst in many seasons. West of the Cascade mountains the Hessian fly, never serious before, was cutting great inroads into the grain yield.

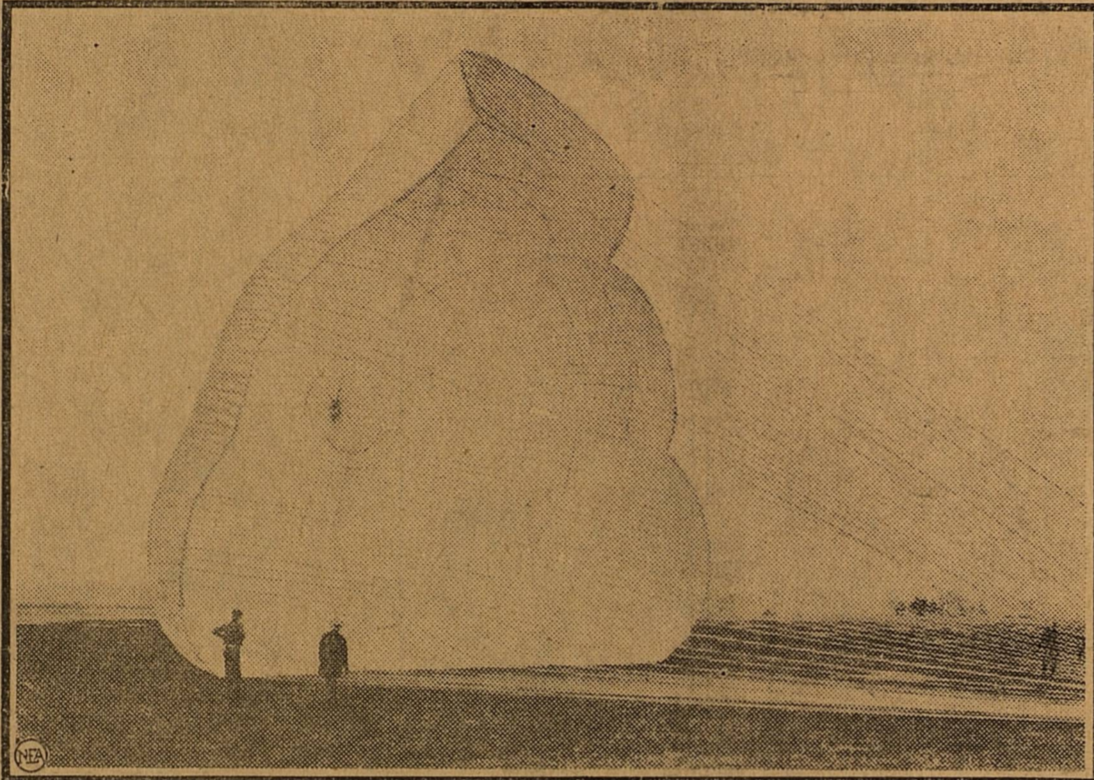

Here it is shown at Wright Field, in Dayton, O., being tested in the wash from an airplane propeller. The parachute will be lashed to the side of the balloon, to be released if disaster threatens.

Feed Loans May Be Arranged at Agent's Office

Persons wishing to borrow money for purchasing feed may make application at the county court-house. goats by the hundreds, but it may be a helpful animal in other localities where it lives largely on rodents and other small animals that may do more damage to crops or forests than the coyotes do to livestock, poultry, and game. To find out what coyotes in any particular area are eating the biological survey workers examine the contents of the stomach of coyotes that have been killed. By certain indications the examiners are usually able to distinguish fresh meat from carrion, and can as a rule determine whether the source of such material is cow, horse, or sheep.

In the case of prairie dogs, pocket gophers, mice, rats, rabbits and other small animals the coyotes fre-

quently do not eat the most readily identifiable parts. Teeth and claws would identify the prey, of course. But even without these the laboratory workers can solve the puzzle. They examine the hair and fur that the coyote gulps with the meat. Under the microscope the skilled worker can thus usually identify the coyote, prey and so can tell whether in a given area the coyote is doing more good than harm, or the reverse.
