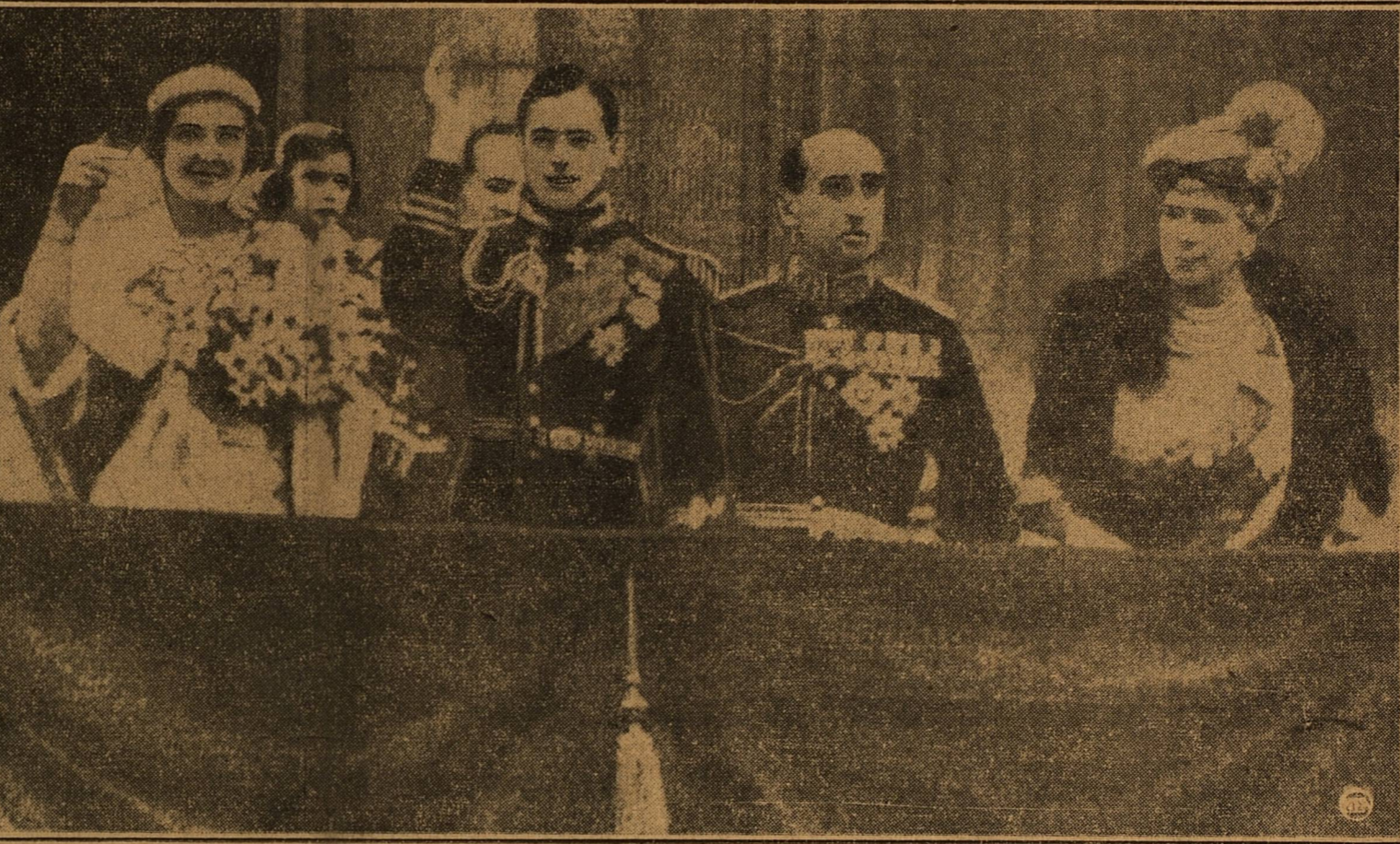
Federal Judge's Son Arraigned Today on Charges

WHERE THE FAULT LIES

Survivors of the Morro Castle disaster, and relatives of the people who perished in it, have formed what they call the Morro Castle Association; and this association has just passed a resolution condemning the federal steamboat inspection service because its report on the tragedy lays the blame on individual seamen rather than on the company which operated the steamer.

This is a sensible attitude to take, since it is a reminder that the basic trouble was a general condition rather than the dereliction of a few men; but it would be even more sensible to go still farther, and to condemn current practices in the American merchant marine as a whole rather than one particular company.

Until shipping companies institute working and wage conditions which make it possible to keep experienced crews and to maintain proper discipline and training, tragedies like that of the Morro Castle will continue to be possible. Not one man or one company, but the merchant marine as a whole, must share the responsibility.
