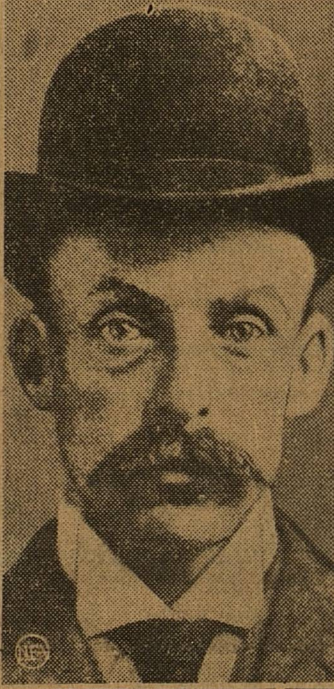
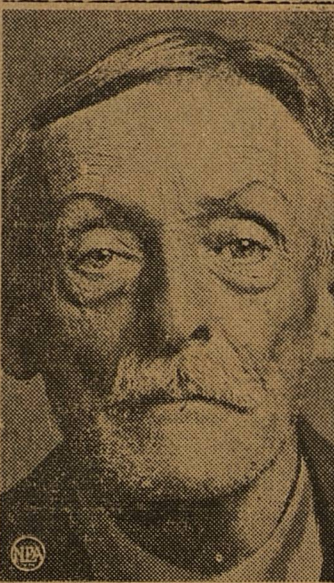

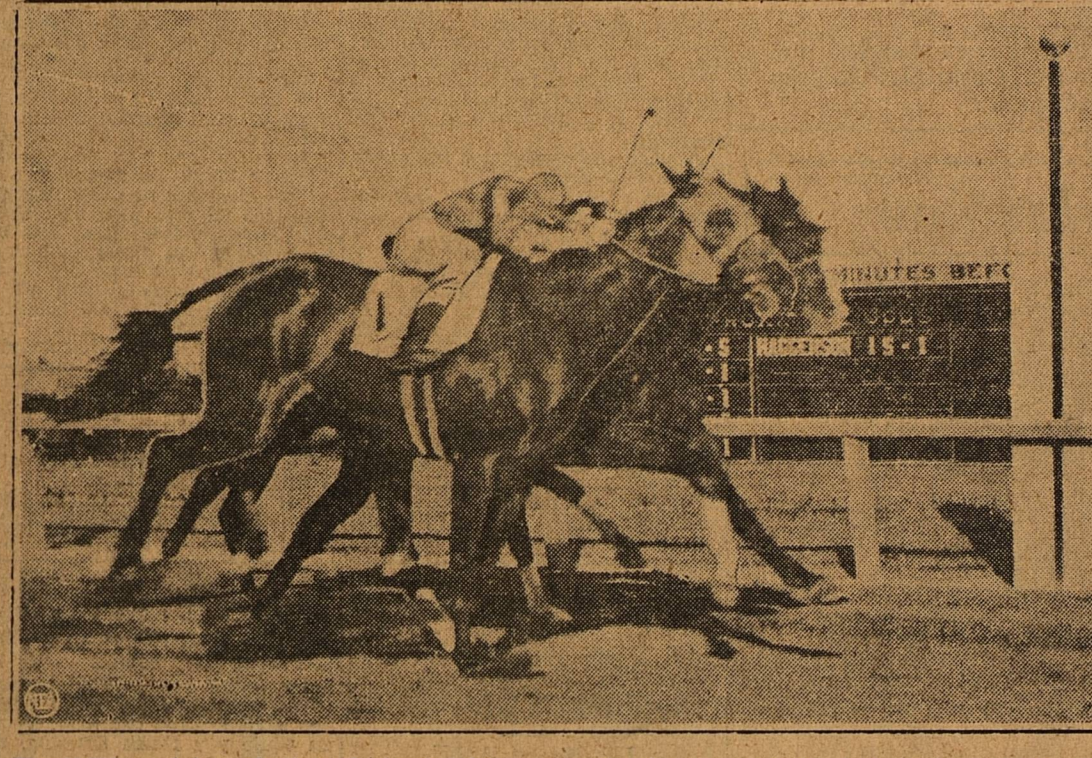

### Make-up Carefully If You Would Be Lovely at Christmas

The women who look smartest at holiday parties will be those who make-up to enhance their natural beauty. They'll apply cosmetics sparingly and with an eye to pointing up their most attractive features.

Remember that a good foundation lotion or cream is the basis of a perfect makeup. When it has been smoothed on face and neck, brush your forefinger across a bit of cleansing cream, dip it in cream rouge and carefully blend the color on your cheeks. Don't drag the rouge too far downward. If you do, your face will have a rather old, drawn appearance. Besides, the main purpose of artificial color on the cheeks is to form a flattering frame for the eyes.

Eyeshadow should be put on next. Select a shade that either matches or intensifies the color of your eyes. Use very little of it and don't extend it beyond the outer corners. When that's finished, pat on powder.

Use a large, clean piece of cotton each time you powder. You'll find that the powder will look much better and stay on infinitely longer if you press large quantities of it against the skin, leave it on while you finish dressing, then brush off the surplus. Actresses, you know, always follow this method, whisking off the excess with a baby brush just before they go on stage.

Mascara and lipstick are the final touches. Put mascara only on the upper lashes and be sure that the little hairs don't stick together, thereby looking caked and messy.

Lipstick should follow the natural contour of your lips. Apply a




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

**Wind Erosion on Plains Is Studied**

DALHART, Tex. (U.P.)—Heavy dust storms, such as those of last summer which put to work housewives from Texas to as far east as Kidney Pond, Mo., will be a thing of the past if experiments on wind erosion control are successful here.

The government, in a program known as the Dalhart wind erosion control project, is operating a 35,000-acre tract, 14 miles east of here. Plans call for a restoration of a vegetative cover for the soil, and to make the cover permanent.

The high plains areas suffered wind erosion because farmers removed grass and failed to provide a substitute. The cover which should have held the soil has been absent because of two years of crop failures, due to insufficient moisture. Moisture conservation is the basis of the program. Contour plowing and terracing to hold a four-inch rain will be made. Experiments proved that three-fourths of the rainfall drained off to low places. Terracing is expected to hold the moisture where it falls.

An educational program to eliminate the one-crop farmer is being conducted and enters into the program. For example, if after the wheat harvest there was insufficient moisture to give prospects for a wheat crop that fall, the farmer would leave the wheat stubble on the ground through the winter, insuring against wind erosion. If moisture fell during the winter, the farmer could plant what are known as row crops—corn, hedges, milo and the like—in the spring.

**King Ranch Gets Unique Charter**

AUSTIN, Dec. 20. (U.P.)—King Ranch has been incorporated by three of the heirs to the vast South Texas estate of 1,200,000 acres founded in 1853 by Capt. Richard King.

The corporation was capitalized at 75,600 shares of no par value, of which the three incorporators paid \$30,000. Alice G. K. Kleberg of Santa Gertrudis Ranch, Kleberg county, domicile of the corporation, subscribed and paid \$29,938.10 for 75,570 shares, while Richard M. Kleberg of Corpus Christi and Robert J. Kleberg of Santa Gertrudis ranch, each paid \$5.95 for 15 shares.

The three incorporators composed the board of directors.

Purpose of the corporation was stated to "raise, buy and sell live-stock." The charter's term was for 50 years.

Transfer of certain personal and real property, the value of which was not disclosed, was indicated in an agreement made a part of the charter, which stated:

"The incorporators have also agreed to convey to the corporation certain real and personal property, the title to which has not yet vested and will not vest until some time after the incorporation and the same is therefore not included in any valuation for the purposes of this statement, said title having no value under the incorporation laws, since it can not vest in the corporation at this time."

**BARN HOUSES 100 CATTLE**

MONROE, Wis. (U.P.)—One of the largest and most modern dairy barns in the country has just been completed to replace one which burned recently on the 600-acre L Ranch Farm near here.

The barn, capable of housing more than 100 head of cattle, is 170 feet long, 40 feet high and 36 feet wide. Each stallion is equipped with a private drinking and feeding compartment, which is filled automatically by a system of unique chutes.

### FIRST HAND DATA GIVEN ALLRED ON WASHINGTON TRIP

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. (AP)—Governor-elect James V. Allred of Texas obtained a better picture of the administration's relief setup Thursday as he hurried about the capital on a round of conferences and sought to determine how it could be better applied to his state.

He conferred with Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator, and Lawrence Westbrook, rural rehabilitation director, and learned that Westbrook would go to Dallas Dec. 28 to explain the program further to the incoming governor and his assistants. Westbrook formerly was Texas relief director.

Both Allred and Hopkins said financial aid for the state was not mentioned.

"We talked about his family hunting, Texas politics, his job and mine," Hopkins said.

"I told Hopkins I was proud of the fact that the democratic state convention at Galveston last September went on record as favoring work relief instead of direct relief," Allred said. "The national government's attitude will not be known until congress meets and the state's program has to be harmonized with that."

Westbrook said he and Allred discussed rural rehabilitation work in Texas and added he thought the administration would be able to work out a "road program."

Rural rehabilitation and settlement will be one of the principal aims of relief work in Texas, Westbrook said. One such project al-

### Johnson Test--

Completion of a wildcat oil producer in Winkler County in the sandy lime belt east of the Hendrick pool was predicted by many Thursday following a rainbow showing of oil with an increase in gas in Fox-Butler and Jeffries No. 1 Brown & Altman which had drilled to 2,795 feet in broken sand and lime. The prospective wildcat producer is in the northeast corner of the southwest quarter of section 8, block B-6, public school land. Drilling was resumed late last week after operators replaced derrick which was destroyed by fire when the hole was drilled to 2,665 feet.

Southwest of the Fox-Butler et al. wildcat test, J. C. Maxwell, Inc., No. 1 Oscar Clapp, 2,310 feet from the north and 330 from the east line of section 27, block 26, public school land, is drilling with hole loaded at 2,648 feet. The heavy gas pressure has been effectively controlled by use of heavy mud and operators are continuing to the expected pay horizon.

Sinclair Prairie Oil Company No. 1 H. E. Cummins, 2,310 feet from the north and 330 from the east line of section 11, block 26, public school land, a diagonal northwest offset of Sayre Oil Company's discovery producer, has so far failed to show oil in drilling to 2,942 feet. Operations are suspended at 2,942 feet and operators probably will run tubing and blow the gas to give the section of lime showing oil in drilling a chance to produce.

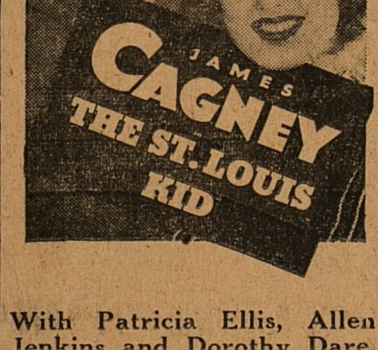
