Chamberlain Advises Britain Postpone Stabilization

LONDON, Dec. 21, (U.P.)-Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, expressed at his home today the idea that the United States government would be successful in achieving greater harmony between the dollar and the franc as a preliminary to monetary stabilization. In the house of commons today he said, "Great Britain must delay stabilization until the dollar and franc are in greater harmony."

The bangle pin committee expresses appreciation for the cooperation of supt. W. W. Lackey and the teachers in putting on the bangle pin sale in the schools.


