WASHINGTON, Dec. 20, (U.R)-President Roosevelt has ordered a comprehensive study of federal, state and municipal taxes to work out a program eliminating overlapping levies, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau Jr. re-

The president expects to get enough data to call a general conference next summer and decide which governments can collect the taxes most economically. Federal, state, local and municipal tax experts will be represented, it was announced.



GUARDSMEN KILL 2 DURING NIGHT TO STOP RIOTS

Court House Burned As Enraged Mob Seeks Negro

SHELBYVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 20. (U.P.)—Local officials today believed mob violence was completely dispersed, after 300 national guardsmen entered Shelbyville early today to establish order and protect property from the mob which burned the court house and threatened destruction of other public buildings.

The military occupation followed a night of terror in which two members of the mob were killed in an attempt to take E. K. Harris, negro, whose trial on assault charges had been declared a mistrial

NATIONAL GUARDSMEN THWART MOB EFFORTS

SHELBYVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 20, (P)—A mob of several hundred persons, two of the number already slain and others wounded, milled about the ruins of the county courthouse last night as an army of national guardsmen hurried here to quell disorders growing out of a futile attempt to seize a negro.

Fed by gasoline, poured on by the mob, flames destroyed the \$150,000 brick building which a few hours earlier had held the object of the mob's fury—a negro charged with assaulting a 14-year old white girl.

The negro was whisked away, clad in a soldier's uniform, and wearing a gas mask, and taken to Nashville.

From over the state, 500 guardsmen were mobilized and rushed into Shelbyville under orders from Gov. Hill McAlister.

Angered by the ruse and apparnetly intent upon showing their wrath on guardsmen and the county officers, the mob allegedly sprinkled the 75-year-old Bedford county courthouse with gasoline and set fire to it. The building was a mass of ruins with the mob, estimated between 300 and 500, milling about the square. SHELBYVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 20.

Firemen said the mob hindered them in fighting the flames: Dynamite, which had been tossed into th ecourthouse building during the height of the disturbance in the day, exploded, but no one was injured.

Three bloody attempts of the mob to invade the courthouse and carry off the alleged assailant were stopped by the guardsmen. The mob members milled through the streets, menacing any negro who appeared. Threats to invade the negro section of Shelbyville were heard. The crowd burned four national guard trucks.

The negro, E. K. Harris, was ready for trial when Cirquit Judge T. L. Coleman ended the case at 3 p. m. yesterday by declaring a mistrial. The jury was dismissed and Harris hustled through the crowd to an automobile which sped away for Nashville.

Shortly afterward a Nashville photographer was escorted to the edge of town and ordered to return to Nashville.
