# **NEW RELIEF PLAN ANNOUNCED TODAY**

New publicity methods aimed at those who assertedly are creating a new relief problem will be under-taken in the state press of Texas, according to the following com-munication received by all county administrators from the Texas Re-lief commission: The following resolution was assed at the meeting of the Texas Relief commission June 27, 1934: Whereas there has been and is great complaint from the citizens of Texas that the services of farm laborers and household servants are most difficult to secure, and is believed that persons on relier tolls have been offered and refused such employment but have contin-ued on the relief rolls, and Whereas the relief commission has freetofore instructed the director to notify all county administrators to give proper publicity to the fact that persons, physically, able to work who are offered employment at the prevailing wage scale in the boality wherem the work is to be performed, and who refuse to ac-cept same without good cause, shall to be furnished relief; but there is on indication that any publi-city has been given to this matter. The director shall have prepared




