# **VETERAN SHOOTS** TWO AND SELF AS HE RUNS BERSERK

Mental Derangement Blamed on War Time Shock

STEPHENVILLE, Oct. 1. (A).-

STEPHENVILLE, Oct. 1. (P)—
Jess Salter, 40, World War veteran and highway maintenance operator; his wife, Mittie, 29, and their 4-year-old son, Robert Reed Salter, were killed Saturday night in the Johnsville community, 15 miles southeast of Stephenville, after, witnesses told officers, Salter had terrorized the entire neighborhood.

# **GRANTING ACTION** WOULD DISMISS 1 OF TEST CASES

Cases Challenge the Validity of Fed. Oil Control

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (U.P.)-Solicitor General Crawford Biggs moved today that the supreme court dismiss the appeal of the government from an adverse decision in the federal district court of Texas in the first of several test cases challenging the validity of crude oil production control.

The request, if granted, makes certain of dropping of the one case, inasmuch as the government lost in the lower court and must be the

The gapreme court last spring took jurisdiction in the case which was to have been argued next week. It would have furnished the first supreme court test of the administration's recovery policies.

The question not out of the court's hands, however, raised two other cases involving the validity of the recovery act provisions relating to petroleum production and orders of Administrator Ickes under the petroleum code.

The government was victorious in both cases in the fifth circuit court of civil appeals in suits by the Panama Refining company and the Amazon Petroleum company. The companies appealed and the government consented to meet the issue in court.
