## CARDS WIN BEHIND DIZZY DEAN

### Hauptmann Goes to Trial in Bronx County Oct. 11

**ALIENISTS PLAN TO EXAMINE HIM THIS AFTERNOON**  
Officers Deny Story Printed in New Jersey Paper

NEW YORK, Oct. 3. (U.P.)—Bruno Hauptmann will go to trial Oct. 11 in the Bronx county court on charges of extortion of \$50,000 from Col. Charles Lindbergh, unless New Jersey moves to extradite him for prosecution on more serious charges.

Six alienists, two for Bronx county, New York, and two for the defense, will examine Hauptmann today to determine his sanity. Their opinions have no legal standing, and effect on New Jersey's extradition plan.

District Attorney Foley said the report printed in a New Jersey newspaper that an accomplice had been arrested and that he had confessed was entirely untrue.

**ADULT EDUCATION CLASSES PLANNED**

An emergency education program for adults has been made available to citizens of Midland county through the Federal Emergency Fund. It was learned today at a conference of school superintendents, relief administrator and county agent here with Miss Elina Lind, state supervisor of adult education.

Classes will be open to any person, 16 years of age or older, who is not in the regular school system.

Classes that may be offered under the project include literacy classes for those who wish to learn to read, trade and industrial education, home economics, agricultural education, vocational adjustment, workers' education, parent education, avocational training, hobbies, and handicraft classes, and others.

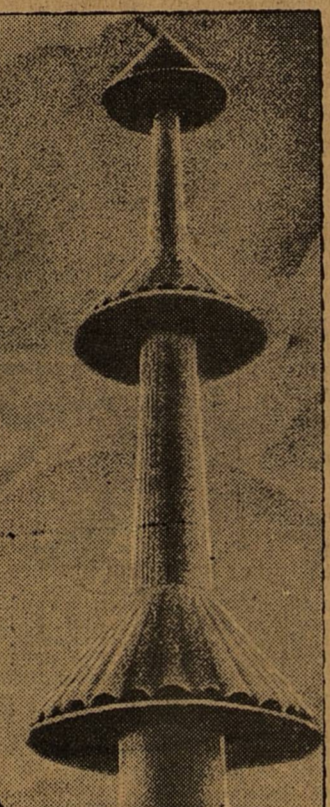
Such of these classes will be offered in Midland as the interest of adults justifies. A minimum of 10 applicants is necessary for the opening of a class.

Adults interested in attending such classes are asked to sign up at one of the four following places by Wednesday, Oct. 10:

At the county judge's office with Judge E. H. Barron  
With Supp. W. W. Lackey at the high school  
With Miss Dobbs, Mr. Debnam, or Miss Miller at the county agents' offices.

Teachers who are employed for these classes will not be required to hold teaching certificates. Those who are interested in obtaining places as teachers should see Supp. Lackey or Judge Barron and fill out the regular application form.

### Aerial Toadstool May Be Built for Defense of Paris

PARIS—Two French scientists have issued plans for a tower to be built near Paris, more than a mile high. It might be, by their reckoning, as much as six times as high as the Empire State building.

The purpose of the tower is air defense in case of war. Three mousinous platforms would allow the launching of airplanes by the score.

The point the Frenchmen make is that the speed of modern aircraft makes defense tactics useless if defense planes must take off from the ground. Where minutes, even seconds count, the time lost in climbing from the ground to a fighting position is fatal.

What Building Back High Brings Record  
Prestige also plays its part in the project. The French point out that when the Eiffel Tower was built in 1889 it became instantly one of the most famous structures in the world and was only eclipsed in height 40 years later with the completion of the Empire State building.

Officials Fear Enemy Would Make It Target  
Objections are raised in semi-official quarters on the ground that even if the scientists' calculations are correct, such a tower would be an easy mark for enemy sabotage even in time of peace. While in war, it would be a fine target for heavy artillery such as Germany's "Big Berthas" in the last war.

The specifications of the odd "triple-headed toadstool" now require it to be 2000 metres—more than 6,000 feet—in height. It would be approximately 650 feet in diameter at the base, and about 120 feet in diameter at the summit.

Three cone-like roofed platforms would sprout from it at even intervals, each one supplied with a circular row of openings like hangar-doors from which planes could be launched on inclines.

### CATTLE BUYING HELD FUTURE OF TEXAS AND N. M.

Bankruptcy Must Be Faced Unless It Is Continued

AMARILLO, Oct. 3. (U.P.)—Death by starvation of nearly a million cattle, or virtually bankruptcy of a great number of stockmen, is the outlook of the cattle and sheep industry in the Texas Panhandle and eastern New Mexico unless the federal government lends a hand this winter.

United Press survey indicated that continuance of the government's stock buying program is essential if the industry survives the winter.

"The future of the southwest for years to come is involved in the cattle buying program," said Dr. H. L. Kent, president of New Mexico A. & M. college.

### REVISED NRA TO MEET STIFF FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3. (U.P.)—Unqualified opposition to legislation for a 30-hour work week was indicated today at the NRA construction program. But Pres. Roosevelt prepared to fight just as hard to make collective bargaining the unquestionable right of all American workers. It is believed the essential of a permanent NRA is a flexible instrument, which it cannot be if congress fixed hours for all labor.

### Hunting Without License, Reported To Game Warden

Negligence or disregard of hunters has resulted in several cases of shooting birds without state hunting licenses, according to District Game Warden Frank Hampe.

"I will be compelled to file complaints if this continues," he said. "I do not wish to ask the law to act in such cases. The laws are well defined and there has been plenty of publicity setting out restrictions. I shall be compelled to enforce these restrictions."

Hampe said he had heard several complaints from land owners because of promiscuous shooting of those who have no licenses. Several cases outside this district have experienced similar disregard of the law, and several head of livestock have been shot down.

A letter from the state game, fish and oyster commission at Austin said a mistake had been noted in fishing licenses and that blanks at the stores and postoffices will be exchanged. Hampe informed those who have bought their licenses to keep them, however, as allowances will be made.

The following extracts were taken from federal regulations on migratory game birds, setting an issue which has not been understood:  
"Ducks (except wood duck, ruddy duck and bufflehead duck)—Twenty in the aggregate of all kinds, but not more than 5 of any one, or more than 5 in the aggregate, of the following species—elder duck, canvasback, redhead, greater scaup, lesser scaup, ringneck, blue-wing teal, green-wing teal, cinnamon teal, shoveller and gadwall; and any person at any one time may possess more than 100 ducks in the aggregate of all kinds, but not more than 10 of any one, or more than 10 in the aggregate, of the following species—elder duck, canvasback, redhead, greater scaup, lesser scaup, ringneck, blue-wing teal, green-wing teal, cinnamon teal, shoveller and gadwall."

### REVIVAL TENT ERECTED TODAY

First services in the new tent will be held tonight at 7:30, announced the Rev. B. B. Crimm, evangelist, early this afternoon.

Thirty-five women and 30 men worked most of the morning repairing tents in the 60x122 tent, which will hold an estimated crowd of 2,000. Stakes were driven and raised the canvas was due to follow about 2 o'clock.

The tent was the gift of Midland to Mr. Crimm, who will have painted a permanent sign informing all over the tent, "I got him and the tent, too, for the \$250 Midland contributed," the evangelist said.

Friday night's services will begin at 7 o'clock and be concluded at 8:15, in order that all may see the Colorado-Midland football game at Lackey field.

One hundred have joined Midland churches during the revival, an additional 100 having responded to the minister's invitation for reconsecration.

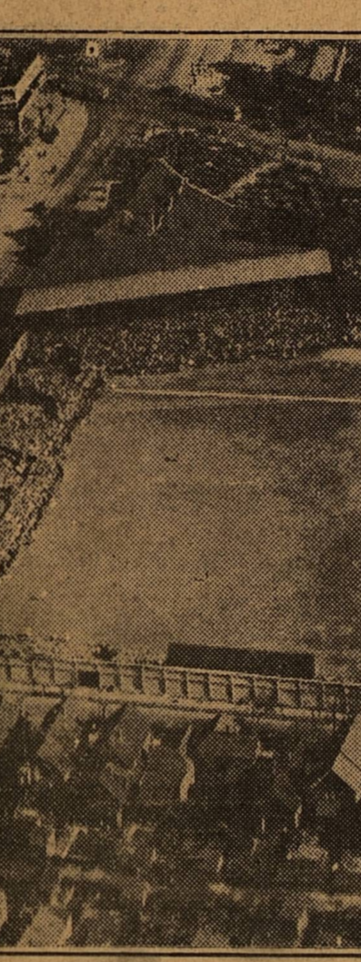

Even with temporary bleachers erected on the Tigers' lot, the series will find plenty of room to range in the Navin park, as the above picture indicates. Emergency stands in left field will cut the distance from home plate to 319 feet from 339 feet. The right field barrier remains 372 feet from the platter. A blow carrying 455 feet will be required to clear the center field fence.

### Days of "School Marm" About Gone

AUSTIN, (U.P.)—College graduates, capable of taking charge of some extra-curricular activity, are displacing the less versatile "school marm" of yesterday.

"I have had no difficulty in placing any teacher with a degree who could do something besides teach," said Miss Miriam Dozier of the University of Texas Teachers' appointment committee.

After analyzing demands of Texas schools for 1,000 teachers, Miss Dozier decided:

"That there is apparently a great need for teachers who can assume direction of some extra-curricular activity, such as playground work, music, dramatics, etc. They will find little difficulty in obtaining a place.

"More and more schools are willing to employ inexperienced teachers, provided they hold degrees and can do something besides teach."

"The teacher is needed outside the classroom as well as in it."

With these principles guiding selections, Miss Dozier placed one-third more teachers this year than last. But she attributed the high rate of turn-over to other causes. The act motivated many schools to prohibit employment of teachers without degrees, Miss Dozier said.

Another contributing factor was adoption of rules in many schools prohibiting married women from serving as teachers.

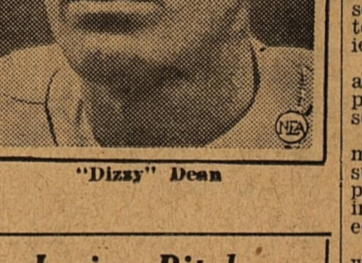

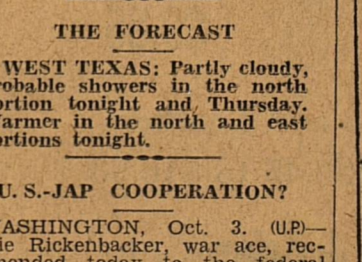

Russian Thistles Making Good Feed

AMARILLO (UP)—Farmers in the drought-stricken Middle-west and Southwest who used their resourcefulness in harvesting Russian thistles for feed have learned they were right.

C. W. Warburton, national director of extension work, has announced that the thistles make good feed.

"Russian thistles, if cut for hay before too mature, make satisfactory cattle and sheep feed when supplemented with a little cottonseed meal or similar high protein concentrate," Warburton told county agents. He added that the thistles are not as satisfactory for silage.

Many farmers in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas have harvested thistles this fall in view of combating a feed shortage caused by the long drought. Dr. R. T. Lee, Dallam county agent, said there is no question about the feed value in thistles. "Addition of about four pounds of salt to each ton of thistles improves the quality, makes them cure better and prevents moulding," Dr. Lee said. "Salt also adds to the flavor, apparently making the cattle relish the thistle hay."

Nomadic Tribes School Children

WASHINGTON, (UP)—Samoyed nomads are going to get their first taste of school life—and the National Geographic society fears truancy officers are in for a lively existence.

Seven little red tents have been pitched on the bleak tundra near Arkhankisk, northern Russia, marking the first Samoyed schoolhouses.

Although most numerous in the vicinity of Arkhankisk, about 20,000 Samoyeds live in a primitive state of culture from the eastern shores of the White sea along Arctic shores east to the Gulf of Khatanga, Siberia. They extend southward between the basins of the Ob and the Yenisei.

However, the Geographic society believes difficulties of American school teachers will seem small compared with problems to

be faced by Samoyed instructors. Illiterate and preserving their traditions solely in songs, the Samoyeds boast a sonorous language, resembling Finnish, which has three dialects and twelve sub-dialects. Although believed to be moderately intelligent, they have had little or no schooling, as most of them lead a hand-to-mouth existence by reindeer herding, hunting and fishing.

Of Mongolian origin, they possess straight black hair, oblique eyes, and yellow-brown skin. However, it was said their skin often appears darker, as they reputedly never wash. Men and women are hard to distinguish, as both wear reindeer skin tunics and trousers. "Some Samoyeds have become nominal Christians, but their veneer of Christianity is thin. Many of the natives worship the bear as a divine being in disguise and wear his teeth as amulets."

Italian Plan Wine Campaign

ROME (UP)—Some thousands of Italians will have their palates wooed with the finest wines of this country when the government sets about its campaign to make Italy more "wine conscious."

In order to put a real kick into its wine boosting efforts the government has ordered the construction of a motor truck equipped with the most up-to-date refrigerators and tasting booths, which will tour the country giving the Italian in the street a first-hand acquaintance with his native wines. The truck will be labeled with the slogan "Drink More Wine."

The most exquisite examples of Italian wines will be carried in the truck. The truck, which now is nearing completion, will begin its tour in September, starting at Padua and will finish up at Naples on Nov. 30. This propaganda tour is being organized jointly by the ministers of interior and agriculture.

### Dutch to Use Streamlining For Windmills

AMSTERDAM (U.P.)—When the number of windmills began diminishing rapidly in Holland during the last 25 years, Doctor P. G. van Tienhoven, of Amsterdam, formed a society called "The Holland Windmill," for the preservation of the Dutch windmill.

At first this society was not very successful. Then a A. I. Dekker, of Leiden, thought of making the old fashioned windmill more efficient by streamlining. He invented a streamlined wing, which is plated with aluminum or zinc. All sharp corners are rounded.

The result has been astonishing. Before, the mills needed a fairly strong wind to make the wings go round and when the wind dropped they had to fit on the "sails," to make the wings catch the wind. As soon as the wind dropped more the mill came to a standstill and had to wait for more wind.

Now the streamlined wings catch the wind so easily that the mills that have them can work practically under all conditions. As windmills in Holland are used not only to grind corn, but also to keep the water in the small canals at a certain level, the streamlining solved a problem.

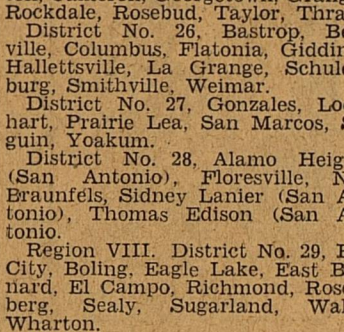
