BELGRADE, Oct. 18, (U.P.)-Kings, a president, princess, statesmen and weeping peasants today accorded funeral honors to the late King

Alexander.

"The real objective of the cotton control program is to aid farmers by providing them a means of cooperation and thus helping them obtain a more equitable share of the national income. Unless a happy medium between production and demand is maintained, under present world conditions, a surplus will inevitably appear and prices will once more drop below production costs with ruin again staring the producer in the face. Disaster to the producer will also mean disaster for industry and labor.

"Until there is a great improvement over prices that have prevailed during the past few years, until the tariffs are readjusted and the purchasing power of the farmer restored, he must have the help of government agencies. We should, at least, carry on for a while the present agricultural programs since it tends to act in the farmer's behalf as a counter balance to the high tariff on manufactured products. The government's program compensates the farmer, in a way, for increased prices he is forced to pay for mainfactured products by reason of the prevailing tariff. It acts to some extent as a protective policy for the domestic production of cotton. Until we have something better, it is the part of wisdom to stick by the present program. wisdom to stick by the present pro-

wisdom to stick by the present program.

"I is contended by some, that the farmer's liberty is endangered, What kind of liberty has he experienced in the past? Working hard—early and late—he has sold the products of his labor at prices fixed by others for the profit of others only. It has been a peculiar brand of liberty, to say the least. The present program is entirely up to the farmers, working through their county control associations. Individual farmers do not have to cooperate unless willing to do so. Cooperation is entirely voluntary on the part of each producer. However, it will also be necessary to continue the Bankhead act, or similar legislation, to protect the interests of the cooperating farmers," Hubbard concluded.
