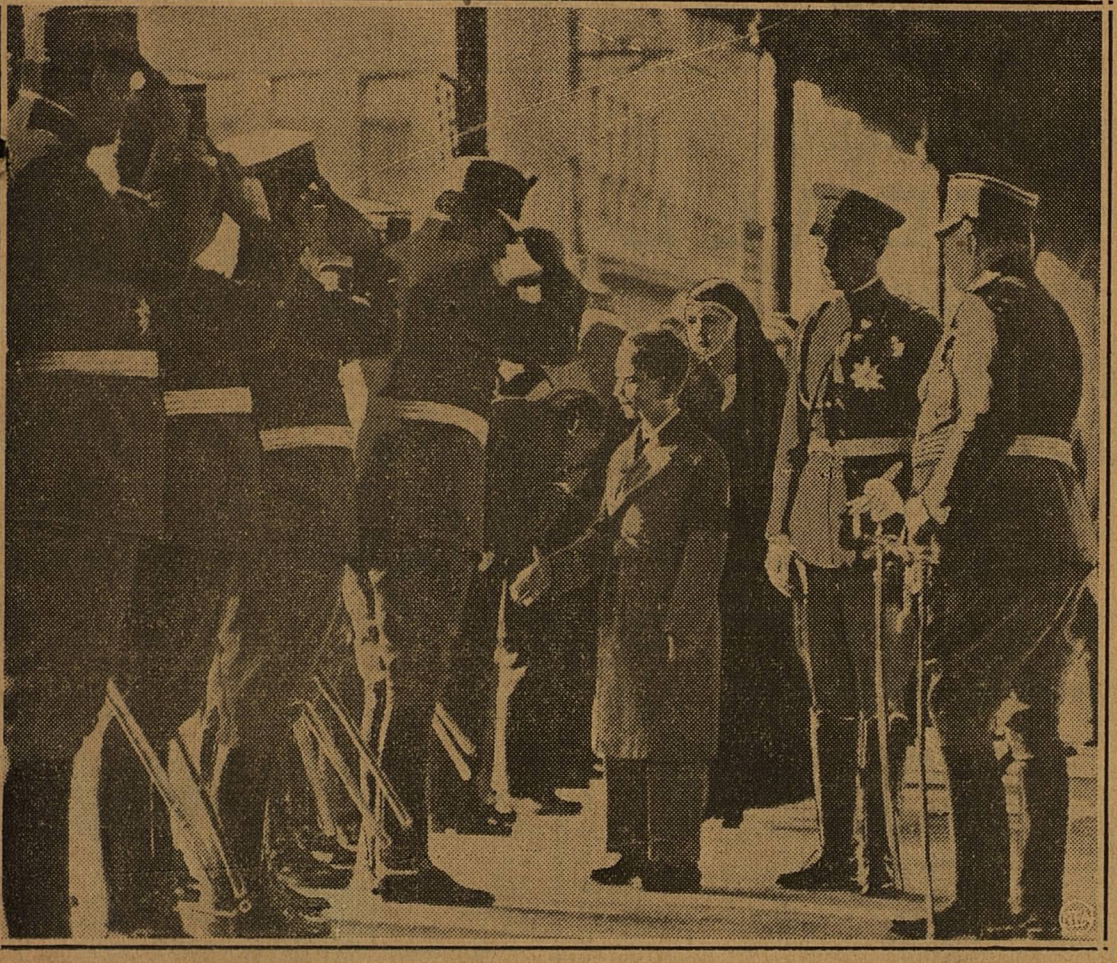

given something tangible upon which to base its hope, when Coach Maurice "Dutch" Baumgarten of the Midland institution told the Reporter-Telegram this afternoon, "The team that plays the hardest rushing game and takes advantage of the breaks will win."

The coach's statement, issued only a few hours before the rival squads were to dress for tonight's 8 o'clock rubber engagement at Lackey field, punctuated a period of great activity in local football circles, but was not entirely unexpected. It had been understood of the grapevine that something was up in the head mentor's sleeve beside a brawny forearm and a bulging bicep.

The announcement had the immediate effect of reinforcing hope of a Midland win—the only element needed to complete jittery pre-game expectations.

"I've been planning for this game since now—1933 year," the mentor said. "That was the day Wink beat my Crane club for the district championship. I didn't know where I'd coach this year, but I began laying plans. Tonight the Midland football club will be as ready as it could be; the men are in physical and mental condition, workouts have passed with flying colors, smoothness all week; the rival squads are nearly of the same weight, and there is no alibi whatsoever at what is happening in other words, Midland is not expecting to be run over tonight."

That was all Coach Baumgarten never noted in talking much, more there than ever, but along the grapevine came information his squad has developed a defensive strategy, as well as a defensive threat, for the Wildcats.

The grapevine also relates that Coach Lee Johnson's Wink squad, which looked like a million dollars to date, has some weak spots that the roving eye of the Midland mentor has detected, and may mire its special aerial game developed chiefly from a spread formation and carried to completion to a big end named Parks. Parks, well over six

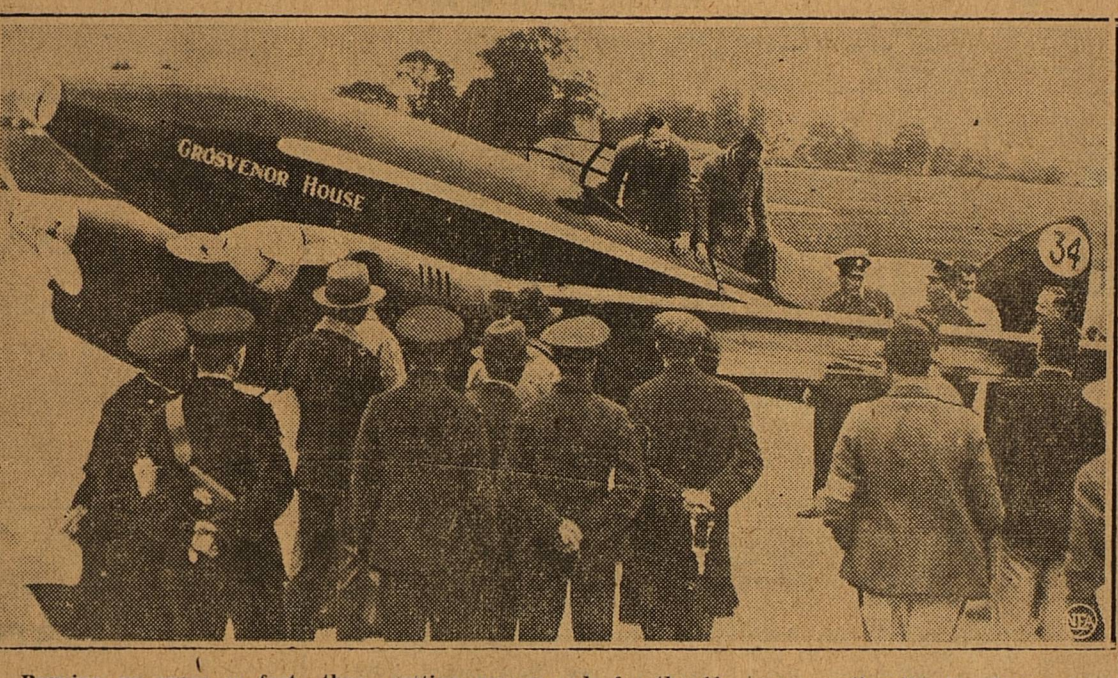

Game Tonight Is Rubber Affair Between Rivals

In the three football meetings of the Midland and the Winkler high schools since this correspondent showed up in the land of plenty of milk and little honey, Wink has won one game over Midland, Midland has one decision and one meeting turned into a deadlocked fiasco.

Over that period, Midland scored 45 points against the Wildcats, Wink 38 against the Bulldogs.

The 1929 game was a tie, 6-6. Midland took Wink in 1930, 39-0, the greatest scoring stampee in the history of the schools' grid relations. Wink avenged the loss three years later, after Midland had tried two annuums of Class A ball, with a 33-0 victory.

A check of the records shows that a hard-fought, back and forth game here in 1929 ended in a stalemate 6-6 decision after Midland apparently had sewed up the game when Loyd Burris snatched a Wink pass, cut to the left where he picked up a convoy of Midland interference and dashed goalward.

The Purple held Wink until the last two minutes of the game when employing unfortunate judgment, Burris elected to try an intricate scoring play that began with a lateral pass. A Wink end slipped into the breach, intercepted the flip and was away for a punt.

The 1930 affair was conclusively Midland's. G. B. Hallman, one of the best blocking backs who ever tucked Wink under his hips in this section of the mesquite brush, scored in the first 10 minutes, and markers began a dribble that went into a riot once the period, when four touchdown jaunts were chalked up.

The Bulldog forwards, charging low and wedging opposing linesmen out of the play, opened great holes for feet backs, and Hallman, Burris, Olen Fryar and Frank Midkiff galloped until their tongues lolled out.

Then came a prosperous year in Class A, topped by the epic holding of the Sweetwater champion Mustangs to a 7-0 score, after which came a year of blight. Wink was not billed those years.

Marking the resumption of grid relations, the Bulldogs journeyed to Wink last year to be chalked up as the 21st consecutive club to taste defeat at the hands of the Wildcats. Wink's scrapping contenders for the district championship, an honor they were destined to win along with the regional championship for the second consecutive year, drubbed Midland soundly, 32-0. Midland did not make a serious scoring threat, never penetrated the Wink 20-yard line. The Midland aerial attack could not function, as the Wink secondary batted the ball to the ground or intercepted it. Thrusts and sweeps were innocuous, effectively stopped by the more alert and harder tackling Wink lads. Wink rushed over 18 first downs, Midland 6.

Wink was superior in every department of play, and the club looked faster than it was the week before when it rolled up the astounding yardage of 400 yards against Stanton.

WOULD SET UP NEW PLAN FOR PERMANENT TAX

Committee Named by Both Houses of Legislature

AUSTIN, Oct. 26. (U.P.)—The Hornsby bill to establish a permanent tax collection policy permitting discounts for prompt payments and penalties for delinquencies went to the conference committee today.

The house had refused to concur in the senate's substitution of the Hornsby bill for the bill by Representative Sarah Hughes on the same subject.

Conference committees were appointed by both houses. The first conference report on a delinquent tax bill, already accepted by the house, was reported to the senate today. The report was ordered printed in the journal when it was discovered that no quorum was present.

Despite the lack of a quorum, the senate smuggled through a resolution requesting officials of Rice Institute to permit radio broadcasting of tomorrow's game between Rice and Texas university. The senators left to tune up their radios after adjourning until Monday.

COOPERATION OF BANKERS PLEDGED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. (U.P.)—Full cooperation of bankers throughout the country in the recovery drive was pledged to President Roosevelt today by Rudolph Hecht of New Orleans, new head of the American Bankers' association.

"I told the president we were all bank players who wanted to play our part in the recovery drive," Hecht said.

One Killed, Five Hurt in Crash

PECOS, Oct. 26. (U.P.)—One woman was killed and five others injured, including four members of the dead woman's family, critically injured in a head-on automobile crash fifty miles west of here Thursday night.

Miss Patsy Steel, about 26, of Tynah, Tex., was killed instantly. Her husband, employe of the Eppenauer Drilling company, and their three children received dangerous injuries. Austin Ellis of Kent, driver of the other machine, employe of the Lone Star construction company, suffered a severe head fracture and a fracture of a leg.

PINK BOLLWORMS APPEAR AGAIN

Bank Deposits of Midland Show Indices of Year 1927

Deposits in Midland banks approached the figures shown in 1927 and 1928 statements today when they were released following a call from the comptroller of the currency for statements of condition as of October 17.

It was in 1927 that M. C. Ulmer, cashier of the First National bank, remarked, "we have a million dollar bank." John P. Butler said that in November of 1927 their deposits were approximately \$1,500,000.

J. R. Martin, cashier of the Midland National bank, noted the loans and discounts item in the statement of October 17 of this year and said it had been reduced to approximately \$250,000 since that date, while the deposits were high in proportion.

CALL EXPECTED TO SHOW MORE STRENGTH
WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. (U.P.)—The comptroller of the currency today issued a national bank call of October 17. The call was expected to show a strengthening of the national bank structure and an increase in deposits.

AUSTIN, Oct. 26. (U.P.)—A call for statements of condition of state banks as of October 17 was issued today by the state banking department.

HOT OIL FIGHT SEES PROGRESS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. (U.P.)—Early court proceedings against hot oil producers in East Texas are in prospect, Attorney General Homer Cummings announced today.

KILGORE, Oct. 26. (U.P.)—First results of efforts by the government to curb the flow of illegally produced crude products in East Texas were apparent today. The establishment of a board to govern interstate shipments was believed a success.

Closing of 39 refineries in the field was attributed to federal activity.

Quarantine to Cause No Costs to Ector, Midland Farmers

Discovery of pink bollworms in Midland and Ector counties was reported to County Agricultural Agent S. A. Debnam this morning by representatives of the United States Biological survey.

Debnam advised farmers of the county that, although the county will be quarantined immediately, there will be no cost of fumigation or sterilization to either the farmer or the ginmer.

The farmer may go ahead with the orderly ginning and marketing of the crop, he said, probably by means of a highly sensitive machine used by the biological survey men in their regular rounds of gins. Needles of the machine, when attached to the gin equipment, show no sign as long as the bolls or seed are sound but, on the slightest indication of unsound seed or of worm injury to the boll, the needle causes a flash of electricity.

County Agent Debnam estimated that three-fourths of the county's cotton crop, which will reach probably 2,000 bales, has been ginned. He said the boll worm quarantine probably will last until no further evidence of the insect can be found in the county, as on the previous occasion.

Placing of the county under quarantine for several years cost the local farmers several thousand dollars for fumigation and sterilization, a part of the fund having been paid by the state recently after a long legislative fight.

Gas Reported in Andrews Wildcat

Gas estimated at 5,000,000 cubic feet was reported in the Humble Oil & Refining company No. 1 Walker wildcat in Andrews county. The gas was encountered at 4,203-8 feet. Location is in the southeast quarter of section 6, block A-43, public school lands.

ABILENE LAWYER KILLED BY TRAIN

ABILENE, Oct. 26.—Waldo L. Green, 35, attorney at Abilene and former member of the legislature from this county, was fatally injured yesterday at Douglas, Ariz.

Ward of the tragedy was recognized by his wife, a bride of eight and a half months, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Green, from Douglas authorities, who reported Mr. Green had lost his life in a train accident. Later, a news dispatch from Douglas added details, stating the Abilenean died thirty minutes after he was injured under wheels of train there.
