Austria's Glory Dimmed In Napoleonic Campaigns

This is the second of four articles that tell in brief the history of Austria from its beginnings in the days of Rome, through the centuries during which it rose to great power, and then its crash after the World war, a background study which will aid in understanding the critical situation in central Europe today.

At almost exactly the same time

At almost exactly the same time that Columbus was discovering America, Maximilian I was head of the Holy Roman empire, that strange, loose association of scattered states whose heads voted as "electors" for an emperor who should "rule" them all.

Many "weak sisters" were deliberately chosen as these "Holy Roman emperors" so they would not get so powerful as to threaten domination of the independent countries, duchies, marks, and other small units which made up the strange governmental hodge-podge which historians have maintained was "neither holy, nor Roman, nor an empire."

Maximilian was a horse of another color. He was a strong, talented, able ruler. And he not only established firm Austrian and Hapsburg domination over what is now Austria, but over pretty much of what are now Bohemia and Hungary.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10. (U.P)-President Roosevelt returned to Washington today, buoyant in

Washington today, buoyant in health ready to tackle problems facing the administration. His arrival ended a seven-weeks 10,000-mile vacation trip.

"Mighty glad to be back," said the president.

He arranged conferences with various cabinet members and prepared to plunge into work.

In the best health he has enjoyed during his administration, the president is a few pounds heavier than when he left.

CHICAGO, Aug. 10. (U.P)—Republican leaders today sought in Roosevelt's Wisconsin speech an answer to the question: "Is the president starting a third party movement?" Chairman Henry Fletcher of the republican national committee said, "Is the progressive party to be taken over as an adjunct to the democratic party or is there to be an amalgamation?" The query was prompted by Roosevelt's endorsement of Senator Robert LaFollette, republican bolter. Some observers saw the endorsement as indicating a third party movement while others as merely an assurance to bolting republicans that they would be welcome to participate in the New Deal.

COSTLY EXPERIMENT

The problems of the naval architect are many and varied. A new revelation of their toughness comes in recent news from Japan.


Japanese naval designers several years ago adopted a policy of making ships of limited tonnage more powerful than any other ships of the same size by giving them extra allowances of armament and engines. Thus a small destroyer of 820 tons, the Sawarabi, was given three 4.7-inch guns-heavier weapons than any other fleet ever put on so small a vessel-and an even smaller destroyer, the Tomozuru, carried three 5-inch guns.

But these experiments failed to work. The ships were made top-heavy. Both the Sawarabi and the Tomozuru capsized and sank. And now the Japanese navy is rebuilding many of its newest ships, cutting down on gunpower to increase stability.

The designers would have revolutionized naval warfare if their scheme had been sound-but it wasn't, and it cost Japan millions of dollars and the lives of several hundred sailors to find it out.
