GEN. JOHNSON IS IN FIGHT MOOD; HITS AT CRITICS

Will War for Those Principles He

Favors

BETHANY BEACH, Aug. 30. (U.P.)
General Hugh Johnson told the United Press today that he would fight to the finish for policies he believes should guide the NRA in efforts to restore prosperity.

"I am not going to allow the progress made thus far to be nullified by interests opposing me on any such silly pretext that my administration has been irascible and intemperate," he said. "If the accomplishment of codifying the whole of America's industry— with millions of separate units— is to be offset by somebody's appraisement of my personal characteristics, we are certainly conveying personality to an extreme." He refused to discuss specifically ecent controversies affecting the administration.

F. D. TO CONFER

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 30. (P). President Roosevelt and Upton Sinclair, successful California democratic gubernatorial nominee, arranged for a conference with the stipulation by the summer White House that it would be on a business and not political basis.

Sinclair, former socialist and author of the "epic plan" to end poverty in California, asked for the meeting. Marvin M. McIntyre, presidential secretary, said it would take place, but he stated the agreement must be that the president is not being drawn into a state campaign.

Meanwhile, the president after a luncheon conference with Norman H. Davis, American ambassador at large to Europe, ordered his return to London next month to seek some understanding with Great Britain and Japan for a successful naval limitations conference hext year.

SENATE TO START ITS INQUIRY INTO RELIEF HANDLING

Testimony Is to Be Taken Under Oath

AUSTIN, Aug. 30. (U.P.)—The state senate toted today to make extensive investigation of the relief administration and will meet as a committee of the whole at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning to start the in-

tomorrow morning to start the inquiry.

The resolution adopted today gives the committee broad powers in summoning witnesses and requires testimony under oath.

The senate will investigate "adequacy of present statutes to regulate properly the administration of relief funds." Senator Cecil Murphy of Gainesville, president protempore, will act as chairman of a committee to conduct examination of witnesses and a secretary will record proceedings.

Howe Explains Required Stamp

Every hunter of migratory waterfowl over 16 years old is required
to have in his possession a migratory bird hunting stamp, according
to Postmaster John P. Howe. This
is the requirement of an act of congress approved by the president and
designed to aid the program for
restoration of migratory waterfowl
by purchase of suitable breeding,
feeding and resting areas. The law
became effective June 16.

The stamps are sold for \$1 each,
at the postoffice. The stamps were
placed on sale July 1, and expire
June 30, 1935. They must be affixed
to the state hunting license or, if
no state license is required, to a

master.

Hunting waterfowl without a stamp is unlawful, and is punishable by a fine of not more than \$500 or by imprisonment for not more than six months or by both fine and imprisonment, says Howe. The stamp does not exempt the hunter of migratory waterfowl from complying with state laws and federal regulations, and is not transferable. It must be carried on the person of the hunter while hunting waterfowl. It must be exhibited for inspection on request of any officer

stamp early as, by doing so, the hunter is doing his part in providing funds for the early acquisition of marsh and water areas needed for restoration.

LONGVIEW, Aug. 30. (A).—William and Bessie Arrington, members of a Gladewater religious cult, today were indicted on charges of negligent homicide in connection with the death of their four year old daughter, Juanita.

While the child was gravely ill from pneumonia at Gladewater recently, Arrington refused the efforts of medical authorities to afford her proper hospitalization.

420,000 textile workers to leave their jobs at 11:30 Saturday night in the biggest strike since the New Deal was inaugurated.

The strike will affect only cotton textile workers but wool, silk, rayon and synthetic yarn members were standing by for further orders. Violence and bloodshed were predicted in the titanic struggle between capital and labor. The strike was called when mill owners rejected demands for a 30-hour week, maintenance of pay of the 44-hour week level and union recognition. A heavy enlistment in the strike was indicated.

"I suppose I could keep right on and always be safe from the law but I can't do it. So I've bought my ticket to prison. I just wanted you to hear my story first."

Released, he came to Fort Worth to live. Where he is now is not known.

EXPORTS PICKING UP


In spite of tariff barriers and other obstacles, America's export trade seems to be slowly regaining its health. Or, if that is too optimistic a statement, it is at least feeling better than it was a little while ago.

Official figures compiled in Washington show that during the first six months of 1934 the United States exported just a little more than a billion dollars' worth of goods—a higher rate than that shown by either 1933 or

If things keep on at this rate, exports for the year will run above the \$2,000,000,000 mark, which they haven't touched since 1931.

Lest we grow too jubilant, it might be well to point out that we are still far below the 1929 high-water mark, when we exported goods worth more than \$5,000,000,-000. But we at least seem to be on the way up.





The cotton, Gutierrez stated, is shipped to Mexico City and sold at prices equaling about 15 to 16 cents a pound American money.

The rate at which new land is being put in to cultivation in the Anahuac community, Gutierrez said, it is expected that 30,000 bales of cotton will be grown next year and that within the next few years the region may be producing 40,000 to 50,000 bales each season. Many farmers are also planting and growing big crops of vegetables on their irrigated lands in season, and at this time have small acreages growing in corn and wheat.

The Anahuac community or townsite is located about 30 miles northwest of the great Don Martin irrigation project. Several thousand families are located on farms and much virgin land is being put intocottom growing, with smaller tracts devoted to corn and other crops.

Water for irrigation, according to Teodosio Gutierrez, cotton buyer of Laredo, who returned recently from Anahuac, is carried through canals from Don Martin a distance of 30 to 40 miles to Anahuac. From the canals numerous sluices and ditches put the water on the land.

Gutierrez said the cotton grown in the Anahuac community grades 80 per cent strict middling and the stable is from one to one and one-eighth inches long. This is the second year cotton has been grown in that section, about 8.000 bales each season. Many farmers are also planting and grow-ing bit by longitude in their trigated lands in season, and at this time have small acreages growing in corn and wheat.
