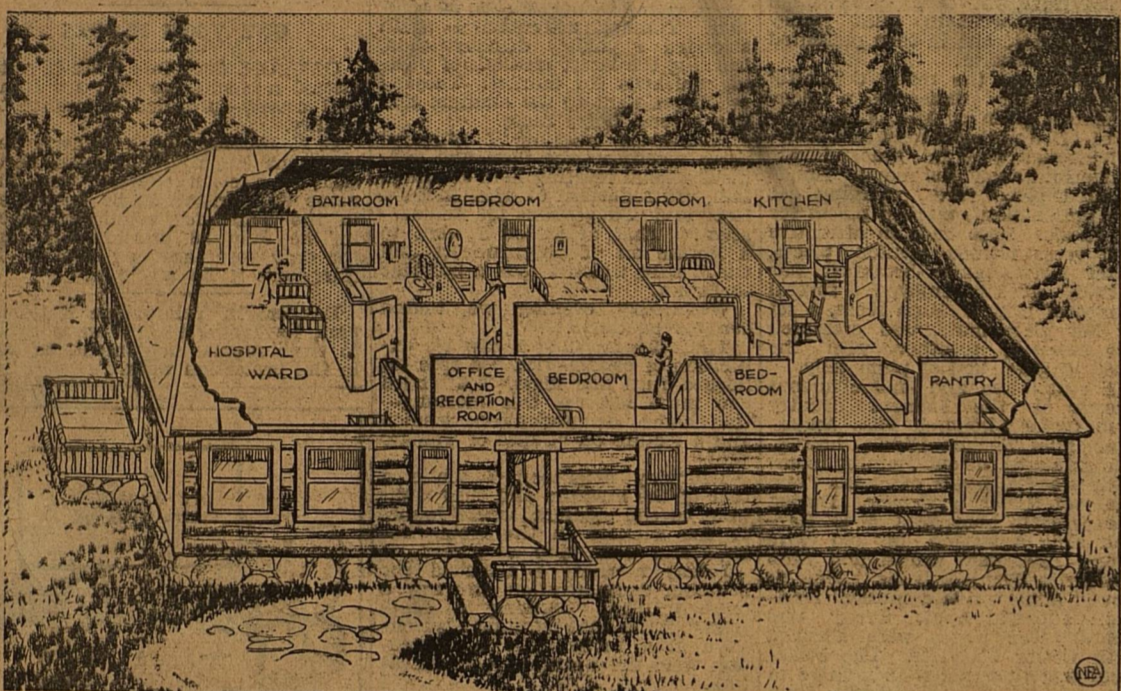

CATTLE BUYING IS RESTRICTED

New limitations to the cattle buying program were announced from the office of Farm Agent S. A. Debnam this morning. Not more than 150 cattle a day will be bought from any one applicant, and not more than 450 a week. Government agents will work Midland county on the first three days of the week. This is necessary because of the numerous applicants who have not had a chance to sell any of their stock because of the slowness in completion of work with the big herds on other ranches. There are 80 applicants in Midland county and 120 in Martin county who have sold no cattle to date.

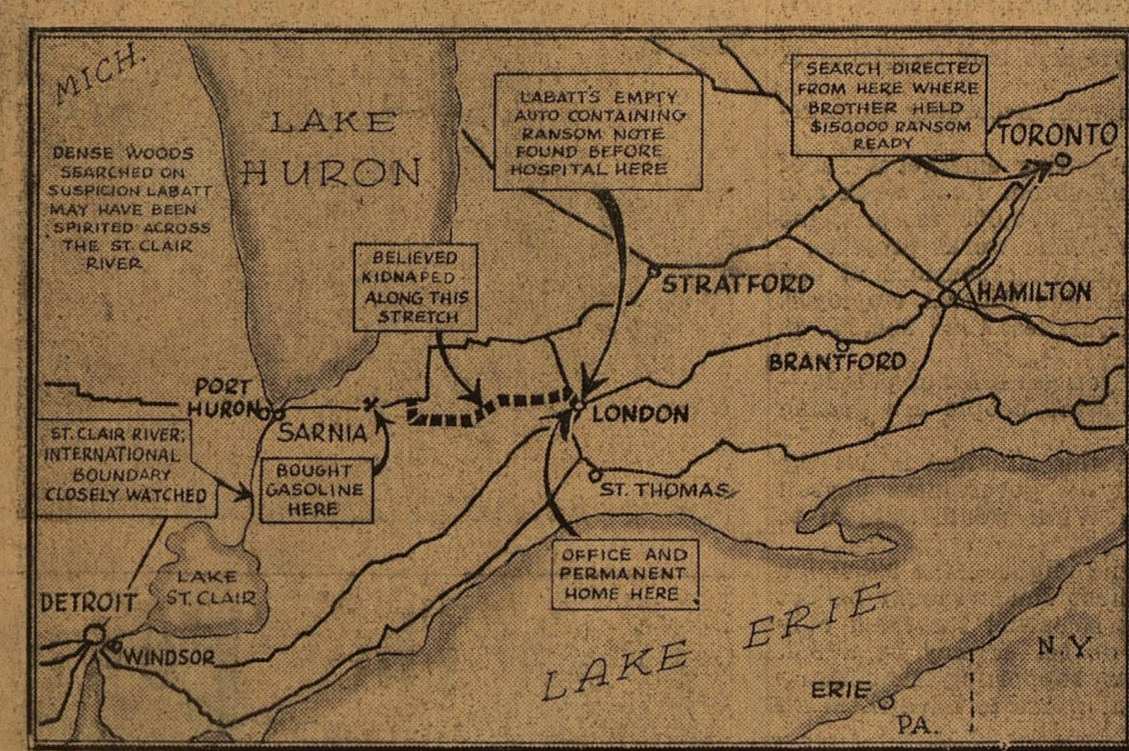

NEW YORK, Aug. 17. (UP)—The self-styled Robert Jones, erstwhile steward of the liner Lady Nelson, admitted Thursday when he landed in New York that he is Arthur C. Wilson, charged at Van Horn, Tex., with slaying M. Irene DeBoll, Cleve and O. widow, on the desert Nov. 5.

In the custody of Dist. Atty. Roy Jackson of El Paso and Sheriff Albert Anderson, Culberson county, Tex., Wilson arrived in town aboard the Munson liner Pan-American from Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, where he lost a two-month fight against extradition.

Mr. Jackson, Sheriff Anderson and Wilson left New York at 1 p. m. (EST) for El Paso. They will arrive at the El Paso Union depot at 6:15 a. m. Sunday.

The 30-year-old former Cleveland steel chemist stepped from the boat wearing a neat brown suit. Dark glasses shaded his eyes. He smiled cheerfully and answered questions reservedly.

"I guess I'm in a spot," he said, "but I want to ask one question—what would I have gained by murdering this woman?"

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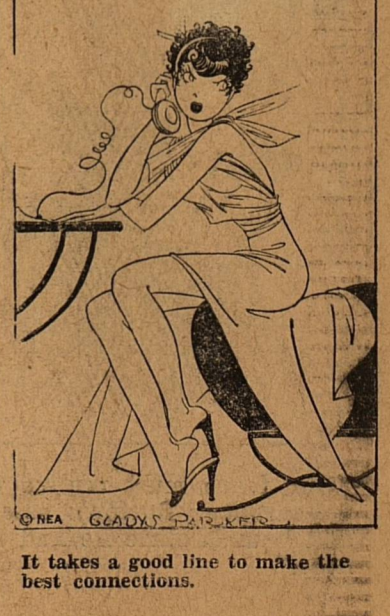
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Margie Neal Won't Resign as Senator

FAULTY U. S. AID PLAN BETTER THAN FAMINE

If this summer hasn't given you enough things to worry about, you can always work up a fever over the wholesale way in which Uncle Sam has been adding his nephews and nieces to the federal payroll lately.

Some sort of all-time high was reached this month when it was disclosed that more than 7,000,000 adult Americans are getting federal checks regularly.

This includes practically everybody—regular government employees, members of the army and navy, people getting pensions and veterans' compensation funds, those hired for public works projects and recipients of direct relief.

It breaks down about like this, according to a recent United Press tabulation:

Some 3,600,000 people are getting emergency relief in the shape of food, money, and so on. Road work and other emergency jobs account for 970,000 more. Some 600,000 are employed on other public works projects.

There are 918,000 people drawing pensions of one kind or another. There are 911,000 federal employees, 280,000 in the CCC camps and just less than 260,000 in army, navy, and marine corps.

Add them all together and you get a lot of people—so many that it is no wonder some people are getting pretty worried about it all.

But the important thing in this situation is not the number of people who are on the government payroll so much as it is the question, What would happen to them if they were off of it?

It isn't pleasant to picture the plight of the 3,600,000 on direct relief, if all government funds should be cut off suddenly. The government is caring for them only because no other agency can do so. It may be a bad thing to have the government supporting that many people; it would be a good deal worse to have them all starving.

You can say much the same thing of the people who are at work on public works jobs, of those who are getting emergency employment relief, and of the lads in the CCC. The growth of the federal payroll may be a dismaying phenomenon, but it has meant the difference between hope and disaster to them.

It is, after all, pretty silly to complain about the way in which Uncle Sam is supporting his citizens, unless you can also show some other way in which those whom he is supporting could be cared for.

TORYISM STILL LIVES

Sir Percival Perry, chairman of the Ford Motor company of London, seems to be one of those old-school Englishmen who feel that the world's shipping and export trades belong to England by divine right and that it is somehow impious for other nations to presume to have a share in them.

Speaking at a meeting of the Anglo-American club in London the other day, Sir Percival criticized the United States for subsidizing its shipping lines (a stunt England has employed for generations), declared that American exports should be limited to such raw materials as tobacco and cotton, and complained that it is unfair for the United States to try to keep those South American and Far Eastern markets which she took away from Britain during the World war.

One had supposed that old-fashioned Toryism of this kind had just about died out in England. Apparently it still has a survivor or two.

Love is not such a torrid affair in Spain, after all. A Madrid butcher, closing his icebox when he suddenly returned home at night, opened it the next morning to find a male friend of his wife there, frozen to death.

Callender 2 1/2 miles away. The Ontario Hydro-Electric commission is to erect poles to bring electric current to the new hospital and telephone connections are to be installed.

The hospital will have the latest in burglar alarms and two special constables have been sworn in to give 24-hour protection to the quintuplets.

Dr. Dafeo admits he is pleased with the progress the babies have made. Asked if they were flourishing as well as might be expected, he answered, "Better."

"But," he added, "our guard must not be relaxed for a moment. We must maintain an absolute embargo on germs."

They Develop Personality
Described by a neighbor as looking like "skinned squirrels" at the time of their birth, the five babies have already begun to display personality, according to those entrusted with their care.

Annette is peaceable and usually quiet. Yvonne likes to wave her arms about, wrinkle up her little face, and is likely to kick and struggle in her bath. Marie, the tiniest, is also the prettiest. Emelie makes the least commotion at meal time. Cecile also is usually quiet.

PRINCIPALS SEEK LOSERS' STRENGTH

AUSTIN, (AP)—What per centage of his support a candidate defeated in the first primary can swing to one of the participants in the runoff is a topic for major speculation in political circles these days.

The outcome of the approaching runoff between James V. Allred, attorney general, and Tom F. Hunter for the democratic nomination for governor will depend on the votes of those who backed unsuccessful candidates.

An analysis of the official tabulation issued by the state democratic executive committee on the first primary showed that Hunter and Allred accounted for approximately 54 per cent of the total vote. Allred received about 30 per cent and Hunter 24.

This leaves 46 per cent scattered between the four unsuccessful contestants. Allred must obtain approximately 21 per cent of the total scattered vote to win and Hunter approximately 27 per cent.

C. C. McDonald, who polled about 20 per cent of the vote, has announced he would actively support Hunter. Clint Small, who ran fourth, has said he personally would vote for Hunter but would take no hand in the election.

Neither Edgar Witt, who was fifth, nor Maury Hughes, who trailed the field, have indicated a preference and are not expected to attempt to influence the choice of their supporters in the runoff.

McDonald, instead of advising his adherents how they should vote, announced he would follow their decision as expressed by a poll. The poll showed Hunter to be a favorite in the McDonald camp and McDonald forthwith erred himself for the fray in behalf of Hunter.

How many of the McDonald-Percurson votes will go to Hunter is a question to which the political prophets would like to know the answer. They also would like to be informed what effect Small's non-committal attitude will have on the Amarillo senator's followers and the preferences of those who followed Witt's and Hughes' banners.

Hughes apparently took his defeat good naturedly. Shortly after the returns showed he was last, and Witt was fifth he called Witt's campaign headquarters and joked about keeping Witt out of last place.

Callahan County Village Has Two Claims to Fame

COTTONWOOD, (AP)—This Callahan county village has two claims to fame—its justice of the peace and a water well in the middle of the street. At the well curb the justice drinks cool water and injects no little life into the conversation when the villagers and rural folk gather on Saturday afternoons to have their corn ground and buy supplies at the general store.

Judge Henry Robinson, an old settler in the West and a former cowboy, is serving his thirty-first year as justice of the peace. Despite this long period of service the judge but once has gone to the expense of placing his name on the ballot. That was the second time he ran for the office. Since then his "friends have just written my name on the ticket."

"If they don't want me to serve them," the judge said, turning on a stool in his little office and pushing back his big, white hat, "they don't have to vote for me. But some of them always vote for me."

Judge Robinson said he had opponents two years—"a long time ago and this summer." But in those years he did have his name on the ticket, depending on friends to write it on the ballot. They did.

Being an old settler and having seen Cottonwood spring up as a live frontier town with many acres of business and then dwindle in recent years to the general store, Judge Robinson frequently tells tales of other days when Saturday crowds gather at the well curb. The well, possibly the only one in the center of any town in Texas,

claims a distinction other than being in the middle of the town's main street. The water is good. "Nobody ever comes through Cottonwood," Judge Robinson explained, twisting at his thin, gray moustache, "without stopping and getting a good drink out of this well. I'll tell you, it's the best water on earth."

Other residents agree with the judge on that point but there are persons who sometimes disagree with him on points of law. To settle such arguments the judge goes to his little office, takes a dusty book from the shelf or a court ruling from a cigar box file and settles the question. The judge has never been known to lose an argument.

As far as the oldest resident can remember, Judge Robinson hasn't missed a day being on the streets of Cottonwood in 40 years—and each of those days he refreshed himself at the town's well.

NEW MEXICAN TOWN
EL PASO, (AP)—A new town, Las Delicias, has sprung up 40 miles south of Chihuahua City on the National Railways of Mexico, and was reported doing well.

The town, a result of establishment of a new irrigation system in the Bouilla dam area, now has 8000 inhabitants, said J. V. Rivero, federal agricultural agent in Juarez.

Rivero said that 20,000 acres have been brought into cultivation and that anyone may purchase land there from the government on easy terms—10 per cent down and the rest over a period of 20 years.

Cotton, wheat, grapes and fruit are among the products to be raised near Las Delicias.

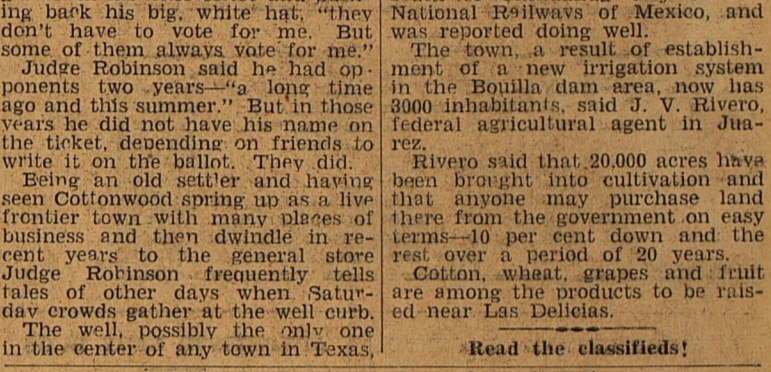
