NEW ESTIMATE 9,195,000 BALES

'Babes in the Woods,' Quintuplets, in Best Care Available Through Science

This story, accompanied by hitherto unpublished pictures, is the second of two appearing exclusively in The Reporter-Telegram and other NEA Service newspapers, revealing what goes on behind the scenes in the Ontario home of the famous Dionne quintuplets, and telling the amazing "life story" of the babies. 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CORDELL, Ont., Aug. 8.—The coupe jounced and rattled as its lights picked out the rocky road from Callander. It was just short of 4 o'clock in the morning of May 28, and there was hardly a trace of coming dawn across the stump-dotted "bush" country.

Dr. Dafoe, at the wheel, was not put out by the bleakness of the hour. He was used to that. You don't practice healing for 26 years among the sturdy French-Canadians of this section without getting used to irregular hours.

Now he could see the kerosene lamp-lighted windows of the unpainted frame house of Oliva Dionne. Dr. Dafoe missed on the case before him. Too bad he hadn't been called earlier. Prenatal care is sketchy in this country, but still Mrs. Dionne wasn't in very good shape; he'd found traces of kidney ailment when Dionne had called him in a week before. So he insisted on "staying with" the case.

Dionne wasn't an unkind man. People here seldom call the doctor until things look pretty bad. And Mrs. Dionne's five children had all been delivered without any particular difficulty, and she back in the kitchen after three days each time.

"Near-Miracle" Disclosed
Dr. Dafoe pulled up to the cottage, and entered it—to find (and help bring about) a modern miracle.

Two babies already had been born, and lay in a clothes-basket hastily improvised as a cradle. A third, under ministrations of Mrs. Alex Legros, a neighbor woman who had come in to act as midwife, was in process of being delivered.

Mrs. Legros, herself a mother of many children and assistant at the birth of many more, was vastly relieved at seeing Dr. Dafoe. In fact she was visibly trembling. With relief, she left the case to cool, business-like Dr. Dafoe, and turned to the three children already delivered. She lit the stove, turned up the wicks of the kerosene lamps, and assembled the babies in a temporary crib built from a clothes-basket.

The mother was unconscious and Dr. Dafoe's problem was a difficult one. Each of the remaining two babes was found to be enclosed in amniotic sacs, moving about freely in the fluid which filled these membranes. Containers, and it was necessary for the physician to open these coverings and remove the tiny body from each.

The Dawn Baptism
Dr. Dafoe turned now to his desperate fight for the life of the mother, who had previously revealed a condition of nephritic toxemia, and who was now far down in the shadow of death.

As the gray sunrise light began to engulf the yellow glow of the oil lamps, Dr. Dafoe, a Protestant, baptized the children in the Roman Catholic faith of the parents, using the Latin ritual. He had often done it before, as it is sometimes difficult to summon a priest in this sparsely settled country, and this morning no one knew how near death might be.

In fact, early efforts centered on saving the life of Mrs. Dionne.

Few believed that all, or any of the babes could live, for no set of quintuplets has ever lived unbroken by death for more than a few hours. But Dr. Dafoe was not the kind that gives up. He took over all arrangements. The five older Dionne children were placed with neighbors. And the best hospital arrangements possible were rigged up on short notice within the little house.

The World Astounded
Dionne was thunderstruck when first told that he had five new daughters. "I ought to be put in jail," he muttered. Then pride came to his rescue. He thought something ought to be put in the papers about it. After all, five was pretty unusual. He had his brother call a local newspaper.

"How much would it cost," he asked, "to have an item put in the paper about five babies being born?"

How little it cost was soon clear. For the newspaper flash brought an immediate deluge of telegrams, inquiries, congratulations, suggestions, pouring into Corbelle. Within 24 hours two of Mrs. Alex Legros, a neighbor woman who had come in to act as midwife, was in process of being delivered.

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Deaths Narrowly Averted
When first weighed, on a rusty old potato scale, the five little sisters together weighed well under 10 pounds. They were all between a foot and 13 inches in length. All looked exactly alike, and no one knew which was the oldest, for Mrs. Legros had had too much on her hands at their birth to do any tagging. Once one of them began to turn blue, and a drop of diluted rum was added to its ration of milk. Several times this expedient appeared to be all that saved one of the tiny ones from death.

Four days after the birth, Dionne signed a contract for appearance of the quintuplets at the Chicago fair. He was offered a sum to him fabulous, for he was a man with 10 children, over whom hung like a pall a mortgage debt of a few hundred dollars.

Dr. Dafoe balked, and when the quintuplets all developed unmis-

DEPUTY ARRESTS FUGITIVE DRIVER FOLLOWING THRILLING RACE, WRECK

A man who gave his name as Jack Leflar of Waxahachie had his lucky stars to thank Tuesday that he was in jail, and not in a hospital or a morgue.

Leflar, who assertedly told Odessa authorities his name was Laffey, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Fisher Pollard Tuesday afternoon following an exciting automobile chase that was suddenly terminated by Leflar's car going out of control on the lateral road south of the old Takhoma club and turning over several times. Only the steel body of the automobile saved him from serious injury, officers believe.

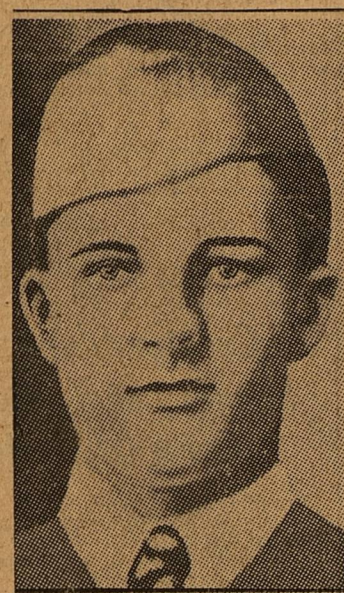
Former Resident In Touring Group

RESTRICTIONS ON BUSINESS LIFTED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8. (UP)—Administrator Hugh Johnson today lifted almost all code restrictions on 17 kinds of small town businesses today. The only restraint continued was that on child labor and fair practices except price fixing. It applies in towns of 2,500 or less population, exempting from hours, wages, operations, price posting and code authority agreements.

GOVERNMENT FIGURE MAKES COTTON JUMP

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8. (UP)—The drought has burned the 1934 cotton crop to a low level of an indicated 9,195,000 bales, the government forecast showed today. The estimate was well within the tax exempt limits of the Bankhead cotton control act of 10,460,251 bales.

HUGHES IMPROVED

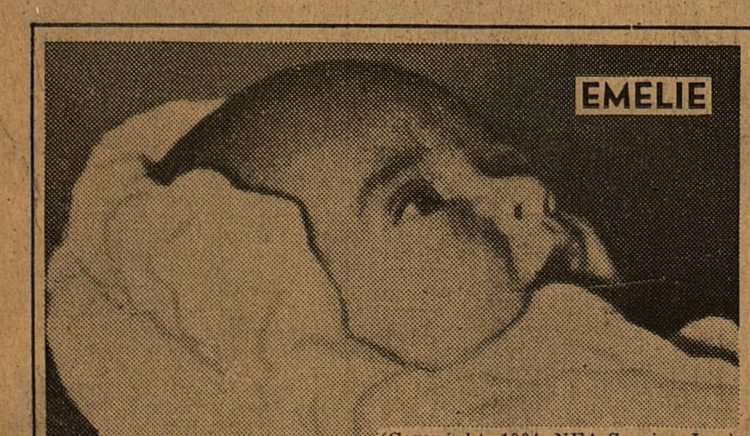

Annette studies intently and with curious interest the face of the nurse who is lifting her up for this portrait. Note her fine head of hair.

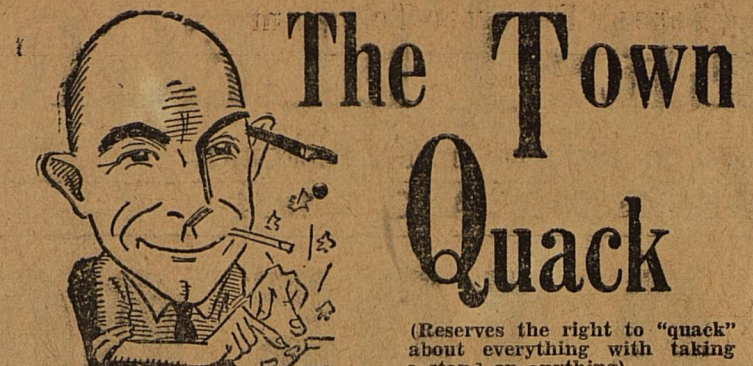


Yvonne, huskiest and strongest of the babes, doubles a fist which she inserted smartly in her mouth a moment later, just like any other baby.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 41
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Ex-Sheriff Goes to Penitentiary by Self
SALEM, Ore. (U.P.)—The state penitentiary today received a prisoner who arrived unaccompanied and brought his own commitment papers.

shall ever be lawful for any one year which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (2 1/2%) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two per cent (2%) thereon, provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every twelve (12) months.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That there be added to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be numbered Section 2-A and to have five (5) lettered subdivisions and which section shall read as follows:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 1 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 1. The Legislature shall have the power to create counties and to divide or to combine counties, subject to the following provisions:
First. In the territory of the State exterior to all counties now existing, no new counties shall be created, and no territory shall be divided into counties, unless by the pre-existing boundary lines. Should the state lines border counties, the area may be less. The territory referred to may, at any time, in whole or in part, be divided into counties in accordance with the provisions of this article, for judicial and land surveying purposes, to the most convenient or organized county or counties.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 42
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 30, Article IX of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its Charter as provided in Section XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers, and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment go into effect shall hold office as follows: one shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years; their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said office by appointment until the next General Election."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 1 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 1. TAXATION TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO REAL PROPERTY AND TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO ALL REASONABLE CLASSIFICATIONS OF PROPERTY; AND OCCUPATION AND INCOME TAXES, EXEMPTIONS, LIMITATIONS UPON COUNTIES, CITIES, ETC.

Section 61. All district officers in the State and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal census, shall hereafter be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties of this State the authorized officers shall be compensated to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis. All fees earned by district, county or precinct officers shall be paid into the County Treasury where earned, for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where paper's outfit is provided, the County Treasury, when collected, and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis, such fees may be retained by such officer, and the County Treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, County Surveyors and Public Auctioneers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified voters of this State at a general election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election all voters favoring said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article VIII, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether county officers in counties containing less than twenty thousand (20,000) population shall be compensated on a fee basis or a salary basis; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court in all counties of this State to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect, including such taxes, licenses, permits and fees, (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except the amount of revenue to be retained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided, however, the total amount of such revenue which may be collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expense of the State shall be paid from the revenue to be collected from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided, however, that the population of the State (as determined by the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when compared with the Federal census of the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census, said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots or insurrection, or a statewide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or other immediate and serious threats the health of the citizens of this State, the Legislature shall have authority, by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period this constitutional limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected, and expended during the biennium."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 16, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the State, and to be sold, shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be sold for the purpose of raising the amount fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the same land; and provided that the University of Texas from the University Available Fund, shall remit annually to each of the counties an amount equal to the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, licenses, permits and fees or extended from the revenue thus obtained shall be determined by the State Tax Board, and the revenue to which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has elapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when compared with the Federal census of the last preceding Federal census, said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots or insurrection, or a statewide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or other immediate and serious threats the health of the citizens of this State, the Legislature shall have authority, by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period this constitutional limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected, and expended during the biennium."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2
Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 61, which shall read as follows:

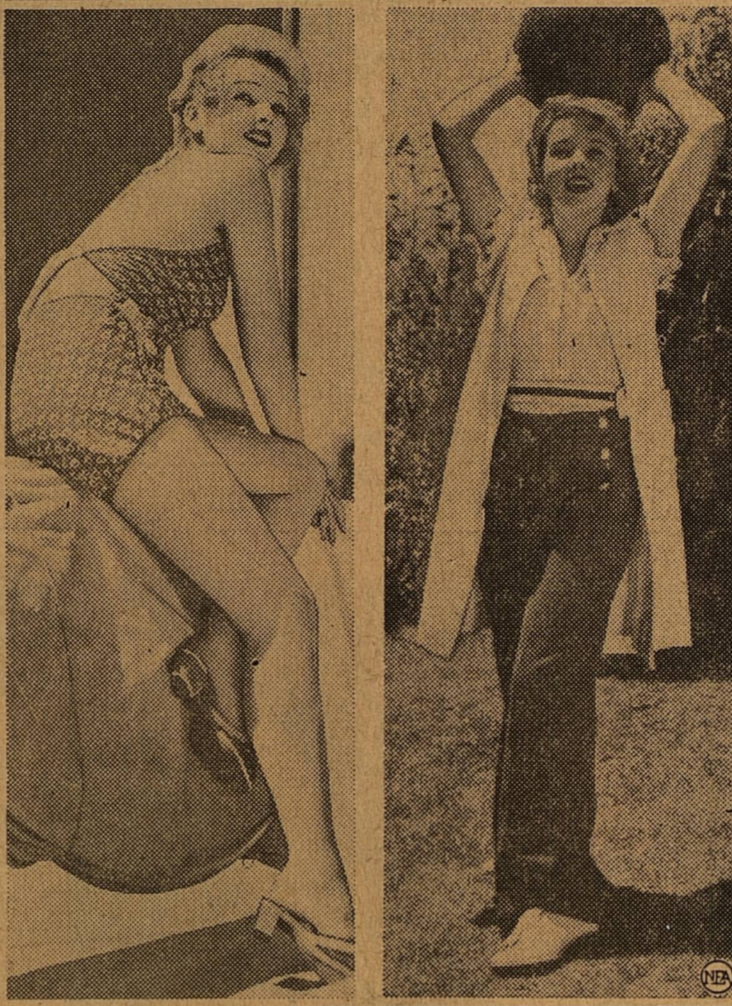

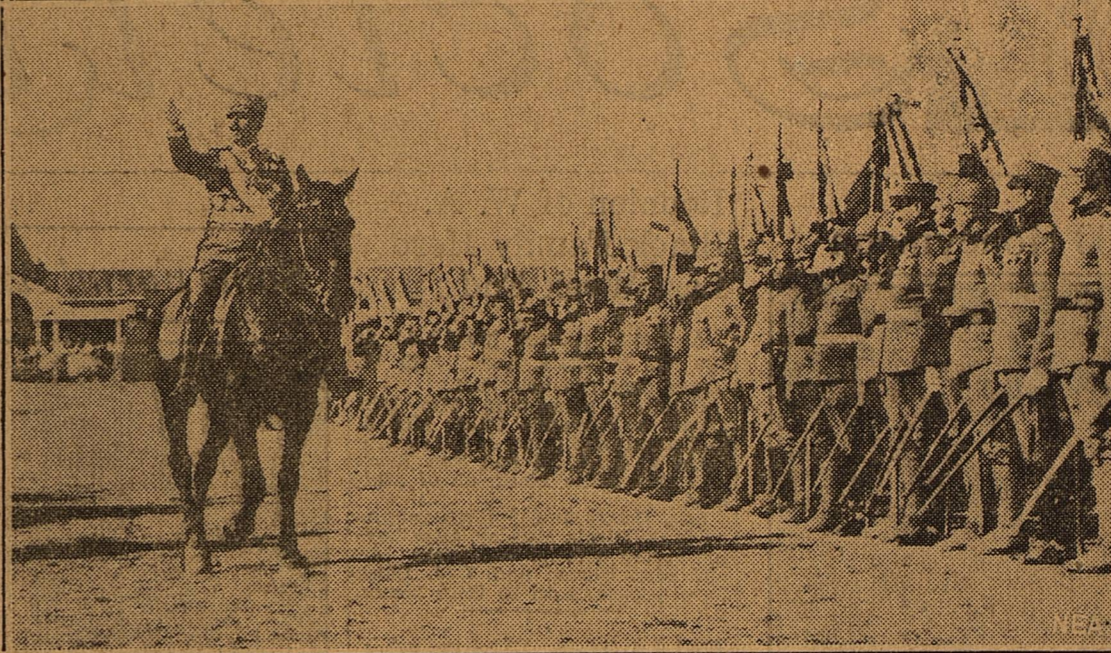

Throw out False Gods, Minister Pleads, Promising to Pray for Rain and Get It

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a continuation of a sermon preached by the Rev. Winston F. Borum of the First Baptist church Sunday night, in which he explains why a man should be done before churchmen can pray for rain with expectation of receiving it. The article is reprinted by request.

Again, we refer to another promise in the Bible, much like the one just quoted, showing the unlimited possibilities of prayer. John 15:7 says, "Ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you." Could anything be more all inclusive than that? Surely that means also that we can pray for rain. And the Greek word here translated "ask" doesn't mean slipping humbly up to God's back-door like a bum and begging for a handout. It means coming right in the front door without knocking, like a member of the family, running into the very throne-room of the King, climbing on His knee as His child, putting our arm around His neck, and whispering in His ear, and telling Him what we want—and we shall have it.

But this promise is like all others in the Bible—it has a condition, and until we meet the conditions of any promise we cannot claim it as our own. The first part of the above quoted verse says, "If ye abide in Me, and My words abide in you" and then, "ye shall ask what ye will and it shall be done unto you." Again we see that a non-Christian cannot claim this promise—cannot pray for rain, cannot pray for anything but salvation.

But there are many Christians that are not abiding in God tonight, nor have His Word abiding in them—so neither can they claim this promise. To abide in Him is to recognize Him as the most important Person in the universe; is to recognize spiritual matters of primary importance. For His word to abide in us, is to recognize its authority above everything else. Where are the people of Midland tonight? I'm not talking about the spiritual riff-raff, the bootleggers, the immoral, nor even the moral honorable citizens who do not trust Christ. All these come under Peter's edictment, "ye have neither part nor lot in this matter." They cannot pray for rain, nor for anything save as the Publican prayed, "Lord, be merciful to me a poor sinner."

But where are the Christian people tonight? Some are here, and some are in the other churches of the town—but where are the majority? Some are in the churches, yes, you'll find the cars flocked around them tonight. Others are listening to the radio, reading books or papers, riding here or yonder in automobiles. I am saying nothing about these things, innocent in their time and place—but hasn't God given us enough time through the week to look after our pleasure and business interests of taking the evening of His holy day, at the time set apart for worship to seek these things. Do you think such people are abiding in Him, and His word abiding in them? Emphatically, No! His word says among other things to Christians, "Neglect not the assembling of yourselves together, as the manner of some is; yet they say absolutely no attention to God's word as it speaks. Do they then expect God to hear them, when they cry for rain? Some churches in some places have abandoned Sunday night services, finding not enough interest on the part of their members to continue. Its mighty disheartening to the preachers of this town to see the indifference of professing Christians—how it must grieve the heart of God.

Again let us notice another scripture, James 5:17-18, where the writer is talking about the effectiveness of prayer has just said, "the effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." He goes on to use the illustration, "Elijah was a man subject to like passions as we are, and he prayed earnestly that it might not rain; and it rained not on the earth by the space of three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth brought forth her fruit."

Let's notice the details of that illustration as given to us in I Kings 18:36-45, and the context passages. We find that Ahab reigned as King of Israel, a man "who sold himself to do evil"—together with his wife, Queen Jezebel, one of the wickedest women that ever lived. Ahab, in his weakness had allowed her to establish the heathen worship of Baal in God's country, and import 450 prophets to conduct the worship. Elijah, prophet of God prayed for drought and it didn't rain for three and a half years. They looked everywhere for Elijah, but couldn't find him. At last he

appeared, and sent for Ahab, who came, and when he laid eyes on the prophet of God cried out, "Art thou he that troubleth Israel?" Yes, there are lots of people that think the preacher is the one that troubleth the people, when, as a matter of fact, it is he that has the best interests of the people at heart. It was Ahab that was the troublemaker of Israel, leading them off into sin. The preachers of this town are more interested in the welfare of the boys and girls, and citizens at large than lots of the parents themselves.

So Elijah prayed for rain, and it rained—yes, but not at once. He called all the people together to discuss the matter, and they came—good start. The people are not to this point in Midland yet. I announce I am going to preach about praying for rain, and do they flock to God's house to hear a discussion of the matter based on the teaching of God's book? No. About the usual Sunday night crowd is here. There are Christian men in this town who no doubt worry constantly about the matter, and lose sleep at night—although that won't do any good. Yet they won't come to a Sunday evening service to hear what God says about how to get rain.

If a man came to Midland saying that he could make it rain for a certain amount of money, and convinced the people that he could do so, as I know the liberality and the fine public spirit of its citizenship, I know where are men in this town and around who would give thousands of dollars to such a fund—yet they wouldn't subscribe a faithful consistent Christian life to a spiritual fund for rain. If they think about this service at all, they hope that we will pray for rain, and that it will do some good, but that's all. No, Midland needs for the Lord to spank her some more.

But the people responded to Elijah's call to talk about the drought and the matter of praying for rain. They flocked that day to Mount Carmel. Elijah even made them bring the 450 prophets of Baal, and he made them a proposition. "Here's a couple of bullocks. You take one and I'll take one. We'll each prepare our bullock on an altar and sacrifice it to our God. All but the fire. We'll pray for our God to send the fire to burn the bullock. You know the story of how faithful was their effort, for of course Baal couldn't answer. And how Elijah ridiculed them, and their trust in Baal. Yet the idle worshippers of laughable if it wasn't so tragic.

"Come on now you people, be reasonable," says Elijah, if Jehovah be God, then worship him. If pleasure be god, then worship—I mean Baal. If business be God, serve him—if ease and idleness be god, serve them—if fashion, style, or the majority be god, then serve them. But if Jehovah be God, then serve Him. Why halt ye between two opinions. Why straddle the fence—why be lukewarm, neither hot nor cold—may make professions and give the lie to them by your life. If Jehovah be God, serve Him."

So Elijah prepared his sacrifice on an altar of twelve stones representing the twelve tribes of Israel, and then dug trenches all around it. Then, in order that there be no suspicion of trickery, he commanded four barrels of water be thrown on the sacrifice. Scarce as it was he used them, then four more, and again until twelve barrels of water had drenched the sacrifice, the altar, and filled the ditches all around. Then Elijah stepped back and prayed to his God to declare and prove Himself. In answer the fire came down and burned the sacrifice, the altar of stones, and licked the water from the trenches.

In amazement the children of Israel fell down and cried, "The Lord, He is God." "Who?" "The Lord, He is God." Over and over they cried it. "Do you believe that Hebrew children? Do you believe the Lord of Heaven is the true and only God?" "Yes! Yes!" "Alright prove it—take all these 450 prophets of Baal down by the brook and kill them. Don't just imprison them, where they can be pardoned and turned loose on society to work havoc again—kill them." They shouted God's praises and showed their sincerity by killing the false prophets. Now we are getting somewhere! Then the prophet began to pray. He got down and put his head between his knees for rain, and it came—glorious, abundant, refreshing rain, and it liked to have drenched them all before they could get home. Yes, they prayed for rain, and got it.

And you people of Midland, and surrounding country you get right with the Lord, and I'll pray for rain, and we'll get it too. You Christians come together in the churches for the Glory of God and sing and shout His praises. Go back to

lakable symptoms of jaundice on June 3, when they were less than a week old. Dafoe put his foot down. They were not going to be moved, he ruled.

All Records Broken As the infants turned their first week of life, they had already broken all records for quintuplets, and eager inquiries from medical men of several countries were stuffed in the pockets of Dr. Dafoe.

By this time a guard had to be established about the little house, for visitors refused to respect the signs of "Private" and "No Admission" that had been posted. Neighbors helped shoo away the curious, but the rush of promoters having business propositions to offer the Dionnes was so great that Dr. Dafoe threatened to have the babies taken to a hospital if it did not stop.

His brother, Dr. William A. Dafoe, outstanding Canadian obstetrician of Toronto, visited the quintuplets at this time, and expressed amazement that either mother or children was alive. But they were, and beginning to show definite gains.

While the Ontario highway department was repairing the mud road between Callander and Corbell to help Dr. Dafoe's daily trips to the cottage and insure that he could make them in bad weather, the doctor was saving the quintuplets' throats from the size of jaundice, and they began to gain weight more consistently.

New Incubators Installed Through the Canadian Red Cross and a Toronto newspaper, new incubators were rushed in, one for each baby—old-fashioned incubators heated by hot water, for modern electric boxes could not be used where there is no power.

And on June 9, the 12th day of the quintuplets' lives, they were named: Marie, Yvonne, Ethel, Coelle, and Annette. Marie, first of the babes, showed a definite gain in weight on this day for the first time. Three permanent trained nurses went on duty, Madame Louise De Kiriline, Marie Anne Cloutier, and Yvonne Leroux.

Now Mrs. Dionne for the moment held the attention of Dr. Dafoe. On the 15th day she contracted fever, and for 24 hours gave the gravest concern. But she threw it off, and within 48 hours was improving steadily.

As the fourth week approached, strong efforts were made to get rid of the binding contract that called for the babies' appearance at the World's fair. Medical opinion by now united in the view that it would be highly unwise to move them.

Four Guardians Named The tumor on the leg of Marie began to give some concern during the fifth week. Dr. Dafoe had not considered it dangerous, and Marie scarcely minded at all, but specialists were called in for safety's sake. All agreed that radium treatment later would eliminate the growth without any great difficulty.

Efforts were being made now to have the Children's Aid society made guardian for the quintuplets, but this proved impossible, for there had been no neglect on the part of the parents. So Attorney General Arthur W. Roebuck of Ontario resorted to his powers as parens patriae (father of the country) and obtained a judicial

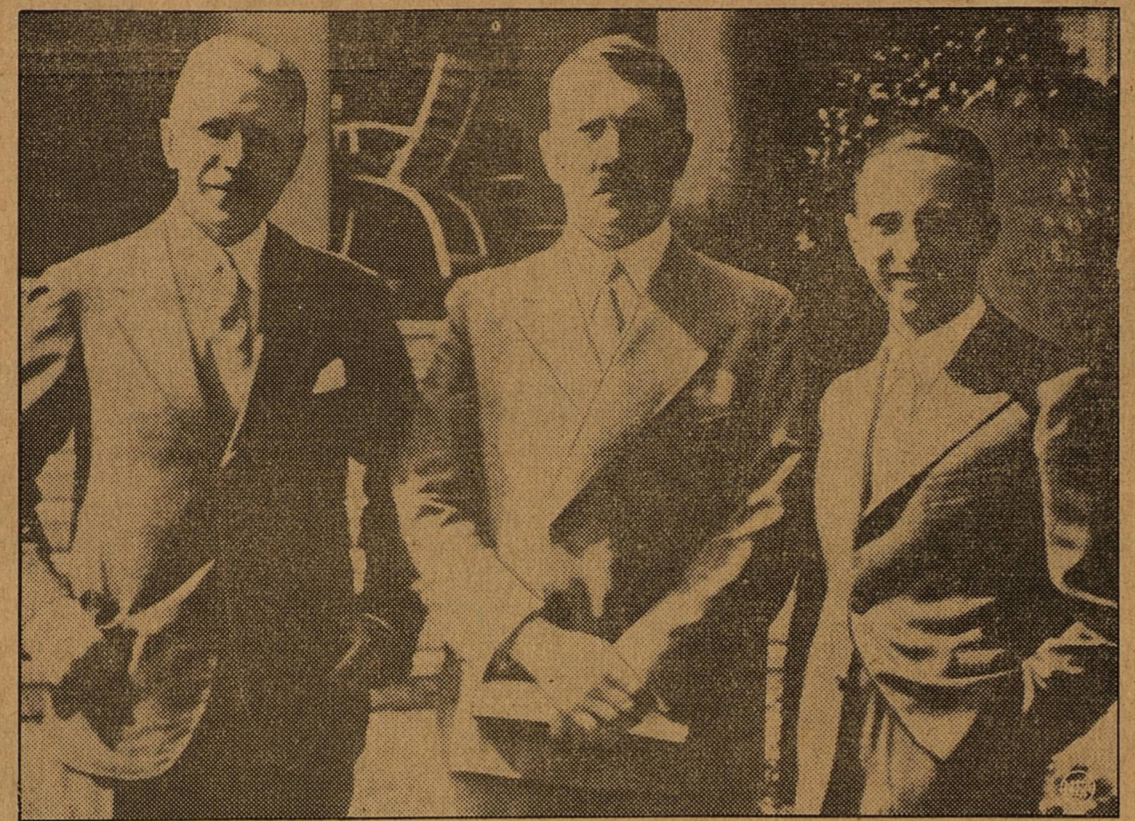

order appointing four official guardians of the infants. This invalidated the contracts formerly signed by the father, Oliva Dionne, and left the father literally without legal authority over his own five tiny daughters.

The period of climax was approaching. Dr. Dafoe had said from the first that if he could pull the quintuplets through a two month period they would have a good chance of survival. That would enable them, he felt, to overcome the handicap of their premature birth, which came two months earlier than normally. And they continued to gain, but slowly, very slowly.

"Operation" Is Performed The two-month period arrived. And on the prophylactic and delicate scales that had replaced the Dionnes' potato scales, the test was made. All were below the normal standard still, but consistent gains in later weeks gave hope that they might well go on to maturity.

Every hour, it might almost be said, has been a climax for the quintuplets, for despite their remarkable progress during two months, they are not as far advanced as many children are at birth. So it was another climax when on the weekend of Aug. 5, it was decided to treat Marie's spreading leg tumor, in fear that the blood-filled swelling might break. That would almost certainly be fatal to so tiny a baby.

The "operation," one of the strangest in patient and surroundings to be recorded in medical history, was successful. Marie and her sisters slept throughout the proceedings. Marie waking with a jumpy yell when adhesive tape was removed which had bound a radium container to her leg. For the "operation" performed by Doctors Howard and Edmund Kelly of Baltimore, Mr. Dafoe consisted of exposing the tumorous growth to radium emanations.

A score or more of French-Canadian farmers and their wives, sons, and daughters had gathered in their Sunday best outside the wire fence that shuts off the nursery-farmhouse from the road. Solenn-faced motorists scattered dust on the rutty one-lane road from Callander to Corbell as they passed leaning out to get a look at the most famous farm-house in the world. All were as unconscious of what was going on within as were

the sleeping quintuplets themselves.

\$60,000 Worth of Radium Dr. Edmund Kelly had brought from Baltimore a lead casket the size of a man's fist. It held emanations from one quarter of a gram of radium—\$60,000 worth in gaseous form.

Handling the casket gingerly, Dr. Kelly extracted the gases, contained them in a brass case. Marie was lifted by Nurse De Kiriline out of her incubator to what had been the Dionnes' dining room table. Adhesive tape bound the brass case to Marie's leg over the tumor. Then the nurse promptly returned the baby to her incubator and sleep. At the end of 44 minutes, Dr. Edmund Kelly looked at his watch and issued a crisp order. Tenderly Doctors Howard Kelly and Dafoe removed the adhesive tape that held fast the brass case. Marie opened her mouth and shrieked, moving her grandfather. Oliver Dionne, who was leading gave hope that they might well go on to maturity.

"She's got good lungs, anyway!" Dr. Edmund Kelly, son of Dr. Howard (together they run a radium hospital in Baltimore) described the tumor in the medical term "angioma," a growth resembling a birthmark, liver-colored, and a little more than an inch in diameter. A relatively rare growth, it has been spreading rapidly, and it had been agreed that immediate treatment was necessary. But now it is believed that a few more similar treatments will insure Marie against danger from the breaking of the tumor.

The quintuplets' future should be assured. Celebrating the two-month victory, the guardians announced plans to launch a subscription fund to be placed in trust for the babies. The Red Cross plans to build this fall a miniature but modern hospital near the Dionne home and to assume the cost of medical care, food and clothing. Dionne has had offers of an adjustment on his mortgage. Mrs. Dionne has virtually recovered her normal health and strength.

The future, which must have loomed crushingly over them as they looked down on the five tiny forms in the clothes-basket, now looks hopeful and even rosy to the Dionnes.

Daily Production of Canning Plant 10,000

Wimpy, of the insatiable craving for ground cow and buns, could not help but be profoundly impressed by the array of meat products piled up in less than three weeks of operation.

Records Monday showed that 780 carcasses had been run through the plant to emerge in the form of hamburger meat. Some roasts and stew cuts are being canned now with the arrival and installing of two cookers. Previously it was necessary to process the meat into finely ground hamburger slice cooking had to be accomplished in the retorts and then run back through the retorts in the canning process.

The cookers will enable other forms of meat to be canned. Two more cookers are to be installed here but there is no indication as to when they will be received.

CCC Recruits Leave Tents for Barracks

BIG SPRING.—Two hundred and forty-eight men have moved into permanent quarters of the CCC camp at the Scenic Mountain state park site.

Captain H. J. Hubbard said Saturday that enlistment for the camp was completed and that the 16 local experienced men needed had already been recruited.

Friday the men engaged in moving from their temporary camp east of the permanent site and abandoning their tents in favor of barracks. Saturday the once imposing row of more than fifty tents had dwindled to four used in housing equipment.

The men have had access to the mess hall since Monday, said Captain Hubbard.

Construction work on 17 structures continued at a rapid pace Saturday with 12 of these structures under way or completed.

Structures already constructed or to be raised include six barracks, headquarters, kitchen and mess hall, infirmary, garage, foreman's quarters, officer's quarters, superintendent's office and tool storeroom, superintendent's garage, blacksmith shop, bath house and latrine.

Thompson R. Richardson, camp superintendent, has not yet received plans for development of

the park, but it is probable that the men will be engaged in improving the roadway pending reception of these plans.

Until this work starts, Captain Hubbard indicated they would be engaged in improving their camp-site.
