LONDON (U.R)-There will be a lot of squeezing in and tight pack-ing at Britain's principal airdromes when the 64 planes entered for the

when the 94 phases entered for the London to Melbourne air marathon in October arrive during the week preceding the race.

The contest itself will be started from one of the airdromes near here, of which there are about a half dozen.

It was intended originally to provide hangar room for all the competing machines at the airport from which the start will be made. The total number of entries is, however, far in excess of what was originally expected. Consequently, the Royal Aero club of Great Britain has announced that it will be impossible to provide accommodation for all competitors at the starting airdrome.

When the lineup for the race is made tiny single-seater Moths will be seen alongside huge multi-engined planes. It will probably prove impossible for all the contestants, however, to line up on the field at the same time. Owing to the large number of entries, and also as a precaution against accidents it is likely that the planes will be started at short intervals. The actual times will be checked en route.

Six important air posts have been selected for the use of competitors from abroad for assembling and testing their machines before reporting to the airdrome from which the start will be made. They are Gravesend, in Kent; Bristor airport; Hooton park, near Liverpool; Hanworth air park, 13 miles west of London; Barton air port, Manchester; and Atlantic Park airdrome, at Eastleigh, near Southampton.







Father and son were hopeful; this masterly retreat of the German armies back to the Hindenburg lines would show the world once again the striff the German soldier was made of. And in the meantime diplomatic negotiations for "peace, with honor" were under way, and the allies themselves were becoming weary of the terrible slaugh. coming weary of the terrible slaugh



Nevertheless, the domestic crisis in Germany advanced swiftly. Incidents multiplied; strikes broke out, even in munitions factories. Each night in his imperial, train, or in his headquarters at Spa, Wilhelm was compelled to hold counsel with himself alone. He could not hold back the Red deluge sweeping towards him, but perhaps he could avert it. On November 2 he signed the new constitution prepared by Prince Max von Baden, accepting a limited constitutional monarchy.

Too late! On Nov. 5 mutiny broke out on the warship "Kaiser," at Kiel and spread through the fleet. Garrisons began to revolt, disarming their officers and hoisting the Red flag. On Nov. 8 the social democrats tried to ride the whirlwind, demanded that the kaiser and the crown prince abdicate; simultaneously came the demand from the allies that the armistice terms be signed before 11 a. m. Nov. 11.

NEW YORK.—Modern parents are scared to death of their own children and it's all the fault of the big, bad psychologists who have made a bugaboo of complexes and conditioning.

That's the opinion, anyway, of Grace Adams, Ph. D., and well-known child psychologist, who has taken up the cudgels for poor frightened parents in a book which she has titled reassuringly "Your Child Is Normal."

"I don't think children are suppressed very much today—in fact I think lots of them are not suppressed very much today—in fact I think lots of them are not suppressed enough," confesses Miss Adams, who has done a great deal of work with problem and abnormal children as well as normal ones. Incidentally, she is an attractive dark-eyed Virginian with a drawl, and looks much younge than her experience would lead you to expect.

"Certainly I feel we are handling the problem child thing adwrong," she went on. "The emphasis is too much on the child. What the problem boy or gir's needs is to find a place for himself—to adapt himself as quickly as possible to a world in which he must sooner or later learn to take a slightly inferior position.

"Instead, we focus attention upon him and make him the center of everything, thus giving him an entirely false idea of what his later life will be like."

Miss Adams thinks that perhaps it was necessary to swing too far to the left on this question since a few generations ago, parents swing just as far to the right; but she hopes the balance will be restored before greater damage is done.

\* \* \*

Urges Parental Freedom
"I think it is high time American rights, specifically for the right to faise their own children exactly as they want to," she asserts, planting the banner of freedom of government for parents squarely in place.

"I would honestly say that for the past decade mothers of young children have been more and more the credulous and uncomplaning goats for the child training experts. Goodness, even the names were enough to frighten an inexperienced parent out of several years' growth.

"There were psychologists, psychoanalysts, mental hygienists, metal testers, food experts and a lot of others, all talking lengthily and dolefully about subnormal, undernourished, problem, badly-conditioned and complexful little ones until parenthood became one long racking auxiety.







GONZALES. (P).—The "Lexington" of Texas, Gonzales sometimes has been called because it was the scene of what is regarded as the first fight in Texas' revolt against Mexico. The only thing Gonzales has in common with the Massachusetts town, however, is that both are somnolent. The Texans who fought at Gonzales in 1835 under Valentine Bennett, one of the first officers commissioned by Stephen F. Austin, didn't see the whites of the enemy's eyes. The encounter occurred in a fog and the Mexicans retreated.

Preliminary to the fight Colonel

cettred in a fog and the Mexicans retreated.

Preliminary to the fight Colonel Ugartechea, commander of the Mexican force, sent Lieutenant Castenda to Gonzales to recover a cannon the Texans had borrowed for protection against the Indians. Andrew Ponton and Wily Martin, local officials, delayed the Mexicans until the cannon was buried in a nearby peach orchard. Subsequently the gun was taken up and mounted on a broad-tired wagon. Within 48 hours Mathew Caldwell rounded up enough men to increase the Texas force to 150 and the Mexicans then were notified to come and get their cannon. Stimulated by a patriotic speech delivered by Rév. W. P. Smith the night before the Texans met the Mexicans along the river several miles north of Gonzales in a heavy fog the morning of Oct. 2. Firing continued several hours and the Mexicans retired.







contractors are on the grounds ready to send for heavy machinery. A definite boom for Pecos, forcast several months ago when it became apparent the project would go through to completion, stands poised. Already the problems of a boom city are being experienced. 
