WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. (AP)—Reports from an administrative source today were that President Roosevelt intends asking Congress to provide four billion dollars for what he termed the "American Plan" to get away from "this business of relief, and to put three and a half million unemployed to work."

Fourteen Completions in Permian for Week Boost Potential 150,000 Barrels

Fourteen wells were definitely completed to increase the Permian Basin daily potential by some 150,000 barrels and 20 more operations encountered pays of sufficient size to indicate early completion during the first week of the new year.

Indication of a new field was definite during the week when Landreth Production Company No. 1 Johnson, wildcat test midway between Odessa and the North Cowden area, gauged 152 barrels during the first 24 hours after shooting, the well flowing after a single run of the swab.

Other Ector county tests nearing completion are Empire Gas and Fuel Company No. 1 Wight, in the North Cowden area, which flows by heads with one hour test; and Shell Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Connell, southern outpost of the Connell pool, which is showing oil in commercial quantities.

Glasscock county recorded a single completion, but two more operations are nearing that stage. Luce and Perkins No. 2 E. A. Lee, 990 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the west line of section 20, block 33, township 2 south, T. & P. Railway survey, registered initial production of 80 barrels per hour on pump. Total depth is 2,188 feet, two feet into the pay.

Continental No. 3 Gilbreath was treated with a thousand gallons of hot acid and is preparing to test, and World No. 3-C McDowell has gauged 44 barrels on an hour and a half test. Both are in the Howard-Glasscock pool area.

Howard county scored two completions in Sinclair-Prairie No. 2-B Davis and FHE No. 2 Dodge Estate, and a failure for J. H. Mixon and Mel Roberts No. 1 Capps, Lucas. The Lucas test, located 2,510 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the west line of section 17, block 29, township 1 north, T. & P. Railway survey, encountered a hole full of water at 3,068 feet.

EAGLEPASS (AP)—Construction of a 49-mile gas pipe line from the Chilton wells, 19 miles east of Eagle Pass, to the town of La Pryor, has been started by the N. N. Saigh Construction company. LACK OF THOUGHT IN A MOB

Both the kind of firmness which officers of the law ought to show in time of stress and the utter irrationality which can pervade a mob were strikingly illustrated by the tragic events at Shelbyville, Tenn., where national guardsmen foiled an attempted lynching.

The bloodshed which attended that clash is, of course, an extremely regrettable thing. Yet it goes without saying that if officers of the law everywhere were as determined about protecting the prisoners in their charge as these Tennessee officers were in this case, lynching would speedily cease to be a disgrace to American civilization.

But it would be hard to think of anything much more senseless than the would-be lynchers' action in burning down their own courthouse. They will have to build a new one, and the money will come out of their own pockets. A more unintelligent way of venting their anger could hardly be imagined.

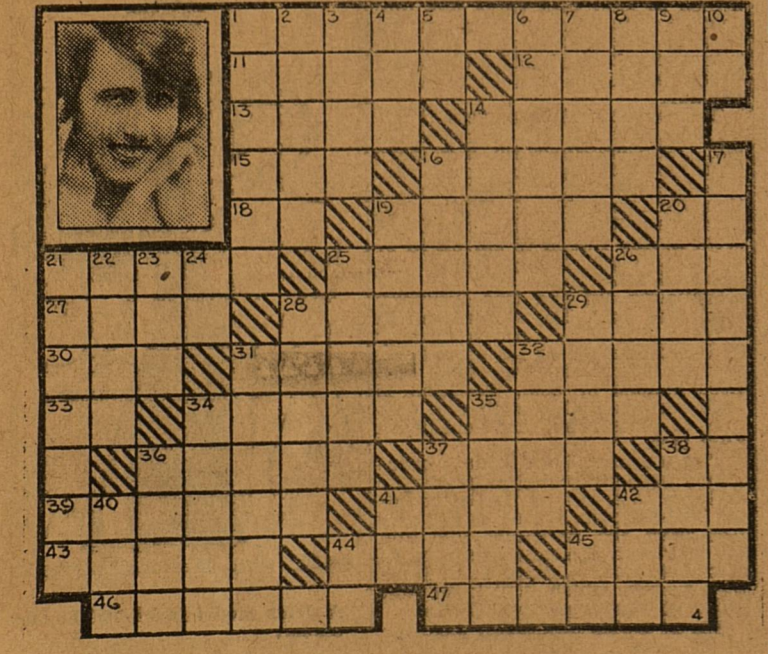
