# HAUPTMARN LAWYER ACCUSES

## PASS SENTENCES FOR 6 CONVICTED AT KANSAS CITY

Men Given 2 Years Each and Fined; Woman Paroled

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 5, (A)-Maximum sentences of two years imprisonment and fines of ten thousand dollars each were assessed four defendants for conspiracy in the attempted rescue of Frank Nash, convicted federal prisoner here June 17, 1933.

Richard T. Galatas of New Orleans, Herbert Farmer of Joplin, Louis Stacci, Chicago night club operator, and Frank B. Mull of Kansas City were those convicted. Mrs. Galatas and Mrs. Farmer, along with Mrs. Vivian Mathis, alias Mrs. Verne Miller, were also found guilty but were placed on probation after sentences of one year in the federal penitentiary and five hundred dollar fines had been assessed them.

Mrs. Frank Nash, widow of the slain convict, who was i ndicted along with the other defendants turned state's evidence and aided the federal men to get convictions had all charges against her dismissed. Maximum sentences of two years

missed.

Nash was killed as he was being returned to Leavenworth penitentiary by federal agents. Along with him and killed at the same time was four federal men. Men armed with a machine gun, later identified as "Pretty Boy" Floyd, Adam Richetti and Verne C. Miller were attempting to rescue Nash from the officers and in the ensuing battle Nash was killed along with the officers. Both Floyd and Miller are dead and Richetti is being held on a murder charge by federal officers.

## 4-BILLION FOR "AMERICAN PLAN" WILL BE ASKED

Roosevelt Would Put 3,500,000 Back On Jobs

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. (A).-WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. (P).—
Reports from an authoritative source today were that President Roosevelt intends asking Congress to provide four billion dollars for what he termed the "American Plan" to get away from "This business of relief, and to put three and a half million unempleyed to work."

As outlined by persons prominent on capitol hill this is the amount that would be necessary for the year's relief work beginning July 1. All the money would not be spent however if reviving business absorbed enough of the jobless.

While it is conceded that thousands now on relief are willing there are also untold members on the rolls who would rather not work and the new plan is an effort to solve this enigma.

## Hauptmann Not One Of Them, Reilly Declares

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jaan. 5, (A)
—Edward J. Reilly, Bruno Hauptmann's chief defense counsel, said
today that he would name four per-

mann's chief defense counsel, said today that he would name four persons next Thursday in the courtroom at Flemington and charge them with the kidnaping and murder of the Lindbergh baby.

"They are two men and two women and Hauptmann is not one of them," Reilly told questioners. Reilly declined to say whether he would charge Betty Gow, Lindbergh's nurse at the time of the kidnaping, as one of those guilty. Reilly denied that the defense would try to prove the body of the baby found in the woods near the Lindbergh home and identified as that of the kidnaped infant was not the Lindbergh haby. The defense concedes that proper identification was made but denies that Hauptmann was the kidnaper. Reilly announced that Hauptmann would be the first defense witness and the defense would construct its case on three groups of witnesses. A first group of witnesses, will be utilized to establish a complete alibi for Hauptmann at the time of the kidnaping, the second grap are handwriting experts by which Reilly hopes to prove that the ranson notes were not written by Hauptmann and a third group are fingerprint experts.
