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BUSINESS CONTINUES TO GAIN

Seasoned observers believe that the present upswing in business which the country is enjoying will continue. Evidence justifying this optimistic outlook accumulates from many sources. The market for durable goods is constantly improving. An enormous demand for goods of permanent use has been piling up during the past 5 years and when the buying starts in earnest a veritable boom is certain in the opinion of B. C. Forbes, widely known writer on business.

Discussing the problem created by curtailment in consumption in time of depression Mr. Forbes points out that when such things as food and drink and amusement are not indulged in normally the market is lost and gone forever.

"But the depression," he continues, "has caused less cutting down of such expenditures than of expenditures for things which last, for so-called durable goods. When houses, machinery, railway equipment, farm implements, furniture, floor coverings, tools, automobiles, refrigerators, radios are not purchased in normal volume, it doesn't mean that the business is lost and gone forever; it means, rather, that the demand for them becomes more pressing with the passing of time.

"We all know how light has been the buying of such goods during the last 5 years.

"When buying starts in earnest, a veritable boom is certain."

Mr. Forbes reports a conversation he had with Charles J. Hardy, president of American Car and Foundry in which that executive pointed out the magnitude of pent-up railroad-car requirements. Of 2,100,000 freight cars "in being, but not all in use," Mr. Hardy explained that 700,000 have become so obsolete that it would not pay to have them repaired.

"Their place should be taken, and doubtless will be taken, by some 300,000 new, modernized lighter-weight cars," he declared. "Placing of orders for approximately 100,000 a year would keep the car-building industry busy for 3 years. By the end of that time normal requirements would have to be met." Mr. Hardy added that he looked for distinctly heavier ordering of cars during the current years.

At the close of an extensive swing around the country P. Y. Danley, manager of the refrigeration department of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Co., estimated that his company would sell 1,750,000 domestic electric refrigerators during 1935. Last year his company achieved an all-time high of 1,400,000 sales.

"People now have more money to spend, more confidence, and more optimism—that's the condition I've found in the 10 States I've visited in the past 5 weeks from New Orleans to Philadelphia," declared Mr. Danley. "I didn't find a single black spot in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, the District of Columbia, Maryland, or Pennsylvania. Everywhere I found people encouraged about the outlook for business."

MORE LABOR TROUBLE AHEAD

The "labor front" in the United States was full of alarms and excursions last spring and summer. In one way or another most of the difficulties were finally smoothed over—the textile strike was ended, and threatened strikes in the steel and auto industries did not take place—but it becomes increasingly evident that the settlement was to a large extent temporary rather than permanent.

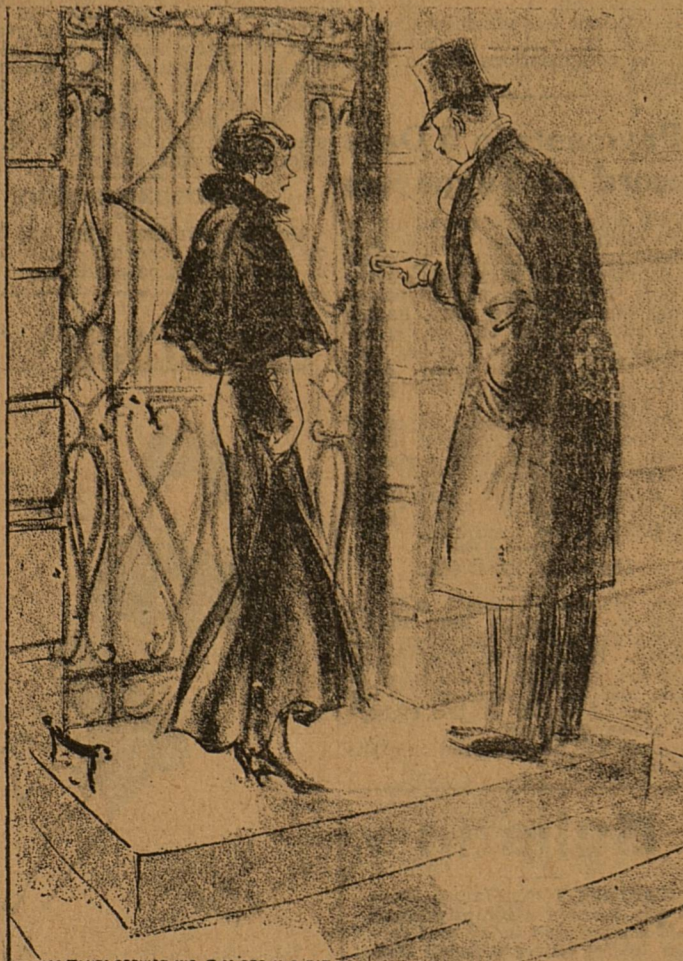
It is reported now that labor leaders are proposing an alliance among employes of five great industries—textiles, oil, steel, autos, and tobacco.

Sponsors of the move assert that employment in these industries are organized to fight unionization, and predict that the workers must be "mobilized to fight for their own interests."

All of which contains the possibilities of large-scale trouble. The administration would be well advised to start now to work out some plan for a peaceable solution to all difficulties.

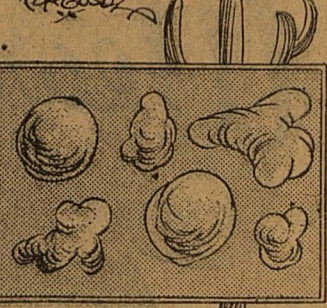

Checking Delinquents
 The Bureau of Internal Revenue has at its command many sources for checking up delinquent taxpayers. One of these is the "information at source" provision of the revenue act, under which persons, "in whatever capacity acting," are required to report to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue at Washington, D. C., payments to another in any calendar year of \$1,000 or more if the recipient of such payment is single. If the recipient is married, reports need not be made unless the payments aggregate \$2,500 or more. If the marital status of the payee is unknown to the payer, the payer is considered a single person for the purpose of filing an information return.

Fixed and determinable income includes wages, salaries, royalties, premiums, rent, interest, etc. A separate return of information for each employee is required of employers. The requirements are not limited to periodical payments, but a single payment must be reported. Corporations are required to make a separate report of dividends or distributions for each individual shareholder or partnership holder who was paid \$300 or more during the calendar year. It should be observed that the amount to be reported is the gross amount of the dividend without taking into consideration the amount of the excise tax of 5 per cent which was deducted at the source under section 213 of the National Industrial Recovery Act.

All persons or organizations acting at any time during the year 1934 as broker or other agent in stock, bond, or commodity transactions (including banks which handle clearing orders for depositors or custodian accounts) are required to file returns of information on form 1100 with respect to all customers, depositors, or accounts for whom or which business was transacted during the year. A separate form 1100 must be prepared for each customer, depositor, or account for whom or which business was transacted during the year, and must show the name and address and other information provided for in the form.

Information returns are carefully checked with individual returns of taxpayers. Thousands of delinquent returns and additional revenue amounting to millions of dollars have been secured as the result of the examination of information returns.

Kenamer Becomes Inmate No. 31420

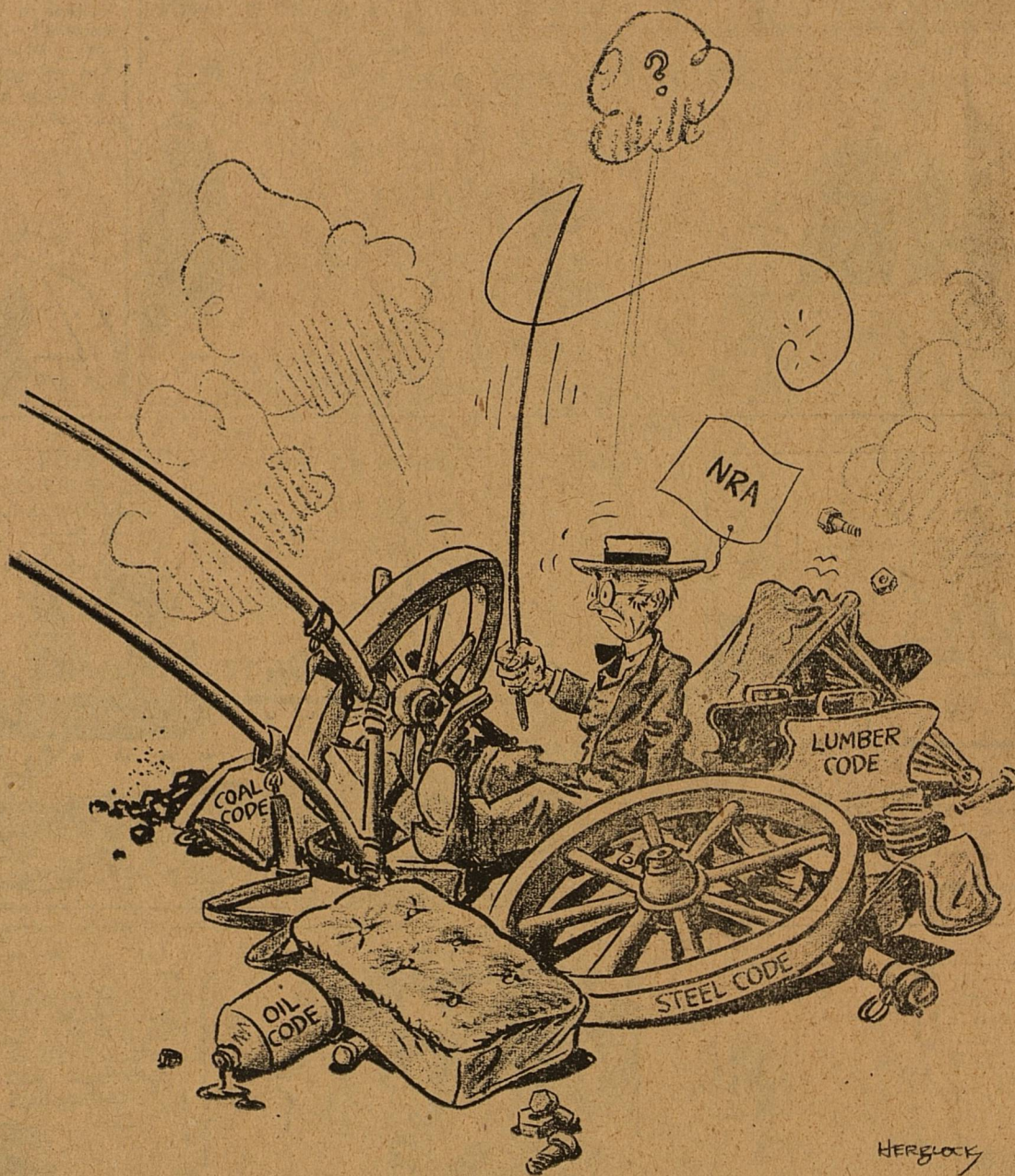

Plains Country Damaged by Wind

High winds and sandstorms damaged topsoil in the plains country north of here yesterday, according to Midland men and tourists who were in that section. Reports here today said Seminole, Seagraves, and the country to the north underwent damaging winds.

DUST COVERS AMARILLO AREA

AMARILLO, Mar. 5. (P)—For the second successive day a blustering dust storm swirled across the Texas Panhandle Monday, further damaging wheat crops and blowing away valuable topsoil.

A 35-mile-hour wind lowered temperatures to 39 degrees in Ama-

fillo and deposited a dense fog-like dust over the city. Visibility was less than a quarter of a mile.

Sunday's "duster," described by oldtimers as the worst they had ever seen, enveloped the city in complete darkness for several minutes. Breathing was difficult, and automobile headlights could not penetrate the huge clouds of fine dust which rolled suddenly from the southwest.

Walter Barlow of the Great West Mill and Elevator company estimated that wheat crops already had been damaged 10 to 12 per cent by wind erosion. Much young wheat is whipped to death, blown out entirely or covered up by the dust-laden winds, he said. He pointed out that a soaking rain would erode much of the damage.

CONQUEROR OF DISEASE



THE Panama Canal was made possible because an obscure physician in Cuba discovered that yellow fever, the disease which ravaged the tropics, was spread by a certain type of mosquito, the "stegomyia." The discoverer was Dr. Carlos J. Finlay, a Cuban.

By clearing up the swamps where this insect bred, Maj. William C. Gorgas, in 1914, reduced the death rate from yellow fever in the Canal Zone to six per thousand.

Today Dr. Finlay is honored by a Cuban issue of two commemorative stamps marking the centenary of his birth.

Coin Over 1,800 Years Old
 SARNIA, Ont. (U.P.)—Similar in size to a one-cent piece, a coin owned by Bruce Armstrong is believed by collectors to be over 1,800 years old. Markings on it indicate, they say, it was printed in Rome during the reign of Emperor Claudius, about 54 B. C.
