TEXAS ALLOTTED 2 MILLION RELIEF

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2, (AP)—The relief administration today allotted \$2,000,000 to Texas for general relief for the first fifteen days of March. The money was also for transient relief, except for rural rehabilitation for the entire month.

Seven Completions Boost Potential 2,390 Barrels

Eight wells were completed in West Texas during the past week, and were replaced by 11 new locations made. Seven of the completions were productive, adding 2,390 barrels to the daily output. All but two of the announced operations are field developments, these two being wildcat tests, one in Ector county and the other in El Paso county.

Evidence of what reworking of old wells will accomplish toward boosting their potential rating was given by Gulf Production Company No. 9 Crier-McElroy, located 990 feet from the east line and 330 feet from the north line of section 186, block F, C.C.S.D. & R.M.G. survey, Upton county. Originally completed in March of 1932 for an initial production of 760 barrels in 20 hours, the well has been reworked with 240 quarts from 2,785-2,857 feet and the production thereby raised to 9,628 barrels daily.

First dolomite stringer was drilled yesterday in Ray Albaugh No. 1 Robinson, closely watched Dawson county wildcat test, datum of the 3,920 foot depth of the dolomite checking with predictions which have been the cause of an extensive lease play in the area.

Of the deep wells, Gulf Production Company No. 103 McElroy was approaching the record for deep drilling, held by General Petroleum Company on a California well which bored to 11,377 feet. The Upton county Ordovician test was last reported at 11,350 feet. A barrier trouble, should soon reach the record.

In the Means area of northern Garza county, Hamble Oil and Refining Company has dug pits for No. 4 R. M. Means, 654.3 feet from the south line and 1,997.2 feet from the west line of section 4, block C-45, Public School Lands. This location will test westward possibilities of the field being southwest of No. 3 R. M. Means which is now drilling with oil at a depth of 4,422 feet, with no shows recorded because of the oil drilling fluid. No. 3 J. S. Means, in the south end of the field, is making cement, 19 set around 10 inch pipe at 2,475 feet.

Northeast of the Means, York and Haver and Harry Adams, is drilling at 2,905 feet in salt, and in northwest Andrews county Stogner et al. No. 1 Richards and McWhorter topped anhydrite at 1,900 feet. A well is drilling at 1,623 feet. Fuhrman No. 2-B Boner is down to 3,960 feet, in limestone.

In the north Cowden pool, both Atlantic No. 1 T. P. Land Trust and Amerada No. 1 Holt are working to shut off water shows and complete the production of the pool. Fifteen miles west near the Red Davidson test, Landreth Production Company No. 1 Cowden Brothers and Sisters located 440 feet from the south and west lines of section 18, block 44, township 1 north, T. & P. Railway survey.

Forty Army Planes, on Last Leg of Flight Serviced Here Saturday

Forty planes of the 17th pursuit group landed here and were serviced at Sloan Field yesterday afternoon. Flight Commander, Ira C. Eaker, was the first to arrive at the port. He landed at twelve thirty and all the other ships landed soon afterward. All planes had been refueled and had departed from the field in less than two hours.

Marsupial of the Didephidae Found

CHICAGO, Mar. 2, (AP)—Desk Sgt. Edward Davis of Englewood Station knows his animals. So when policemen brought in a queer looking animal they had found on the street, he inhaled deeply and said: "That's a marsupial of the didephidae, of the kind commonly called didelphis virginiana. It is arboreal, nocturnal, virtually invulnerable—and it's good to eat. In the language of the street, it's possum." He plans to demonstrate the last thought, if no owner claims the creature.

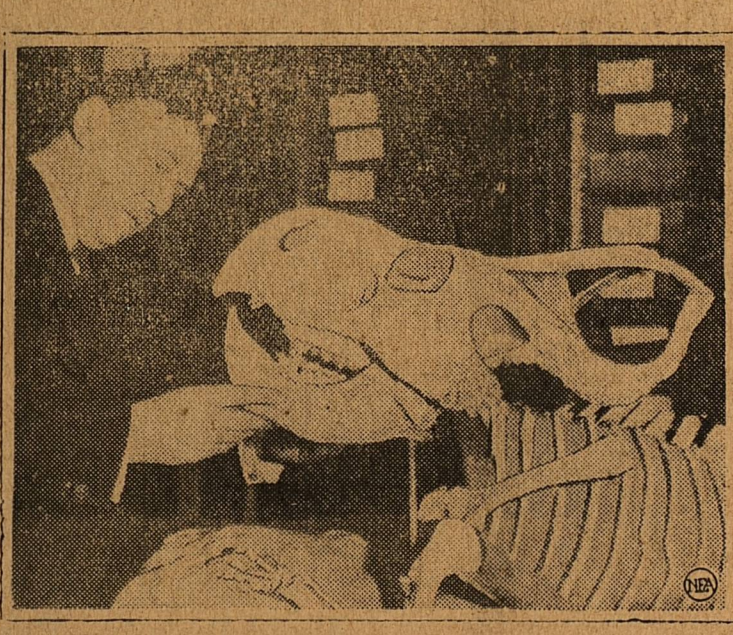

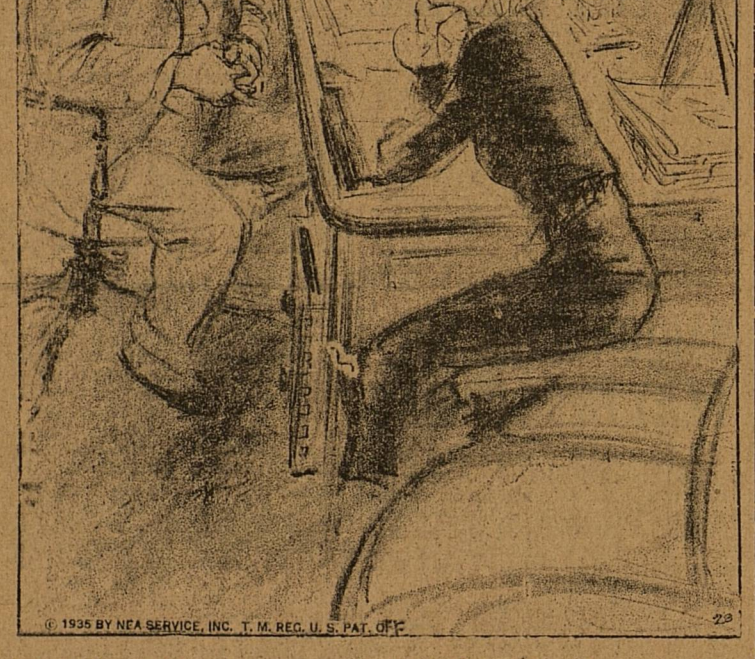

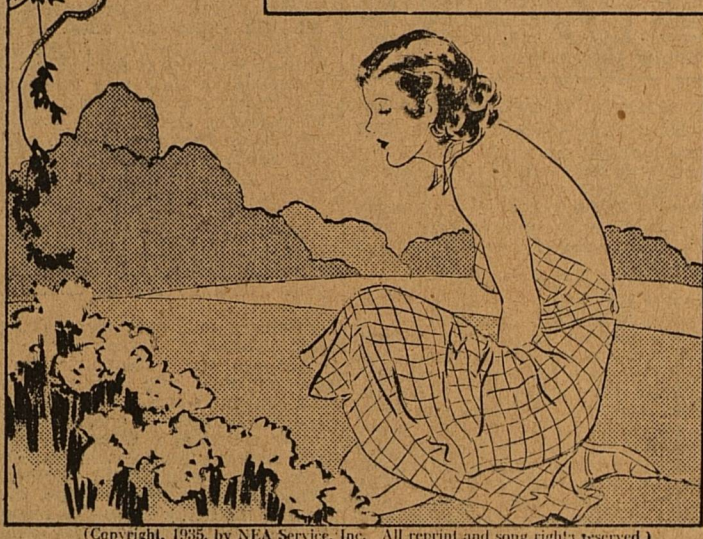

Woman-President Boom Starting Off with Bang

NEW YORK—A group of women who have made up their minds that what the United States needs is a female president are going to do something about it right away. Talk is all very well but it puts nobody in the White House unless backed by action, says Lillian D. Rock, dark-eyed, dynamic, woman lawyer, who made a speech last summer that started all the commotion. She has therefore launched an organization to transform words into action.

"The women of America could convert this country into a matriarchy if they wanted to assert their power," declares Miss Rock, who is vice president of the National Association of Women Lawyers as well as president of the just-formed League for a Woman President and Vice President.

Not that Miss Rock especially advocates a matriarchy. She does look forward, though, to seeing a woman president in her lifetime and she expects that there will be a vice president of her own

every state—this has already been done in New York, Indiana and Illinois—the field will be reviewed for likely material.

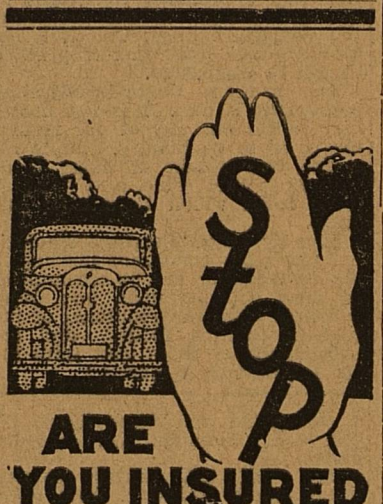
Miss Rock herself once mentioned Judge Florence Allen of Ohio as an interesting prospect, and the Literary Digest, commenting on the suggestion, put forth Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Josephine Roche. Many other prominent women have their backers.

Men Offer Their Help

The organization, according to Miss Rock, was really the result of concerted demand from both men and women all over the United States who heard of the idea and wanted a part in carrying it out. Hundreds of letters from everywhere pledging membership before the league was formed have poured in from people in all walks of life.

"More women than men want to help, but we have had plenty of offers from men, too," Miss Rock says. "There are to be no paid officers in the league. Membership dues will be five dollars a year and contributions to carry on the work will be gratefully accepted. We shall publish a magazine devoted to the activities of women. There will be speakers, local discussion clubs and every educational feature we can devise."

"We want more people to realize that about forty-nine per cent of our vote is feminine—that fifty per cent of our investments



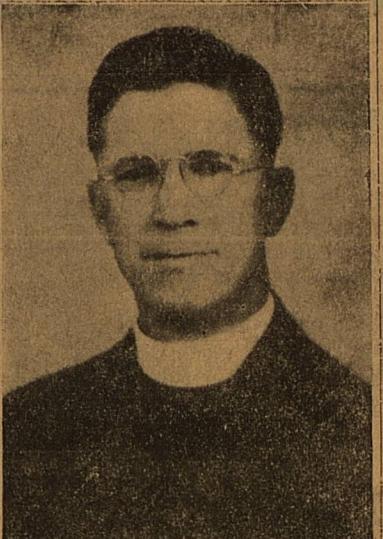
are made, by women. There seems to be a wide-spread notion that women stand up under effort less sturdily than men. I feel sure it is just the other way around. Women have greater endurance, physically than men. They reckon with dangers and conquer them."

Woman Sought Presidency in 1884

As a matter of fact, a woman once ran for the presidency. That was Belva Ann Lockwood, way back in 1884. She expected to be defeated and was. She ran merely to set a precedent. At the time, shocked women in the home formed a league against such audacity on the part of one of their sex. Miss Rock says there are rumors of a similar anti-organization headed by feminine opponents of her idea.

Miss Rock, still in her early thirties, is proud of the fact that she is a self-made woman. She was apprentice in a law office at the age of fourteen and is now head of

UTILITY BILLS BEFORE CONGRESS TERMED 'UNJUST'

The proposed legislation now before Congress in regard to public utility holding companies is "grossly unfair and unjust," and, if enacted into law, may "render valueless the investment of millions of security holders who invested their savings in public utility securities," states a letter to the stockholders of the Electric Bond and Share Company, jointly signed by C. E. Groesbeck, Chairman, and S. R. Inch, President.

Regulation, not destruction, should be the aim of legislation, it is stated, but if the present bill is enacted into law, it "will destroy a large and useful industry and public service, holding and operating companies alike."

Referring to competition with operating companies by the Government through "various government plants, and through leading Federal monies to municipalities, the letter says:

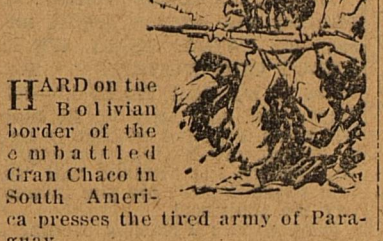
"When government superimposes competition upon regulation and at the same time decrees that its own operations shall be free of the regulations it imposes on private business it does something essentially unfair and un-American. Now it would go on further. It proposes not only to continue regulation to which it does not itself submit; to engage in competition, from from many expenses, such as taxes, which makes private business bear; but by the enactment of the proposed holding company legislation to force the dismemberment and dissolution of your Company and of others like it."

Pointing out that since January 1929, customer savings from rate reductions by companies in the Electric Bond and Share group in this country alone have aggregated over \$85,000,000, it continues:

"No criticism is directed against any of the companies in the Electric Bond and Share Company group alleging poor service, inadequate facilities, failure to respond to legitimate demands for extensions or for lack of adequate financial resources. This state of af-

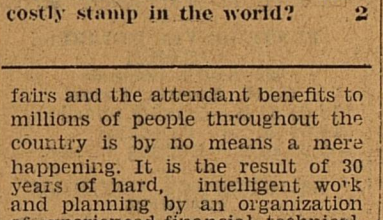


HEARD on the Bolivian border of the embattled Gran Chaco in South America presses the tired army of Paraguay.

economic, accounting, rate and new business and other experts, most of whom have had their training in actual operation and managerial work in the field operating companies at home and abroad.

The letter states that "The bills now before Congress are as difficult to understand for what they exclude as for what they include. Not all holding companies are to be destroyed but only public utility holding companies; Not all public utility holding companies are to be destroyed but only those engaged in the electric or gas business, or both. This seems to be in the highest degree discriminatory."

The question is asked if the holding company is prohibited in any one industry, why should it not be permitted in all industries?

The letter invites stockholders to compare the increase during the last twelve months in the cost of food, fuel and clothing with their total electric bills, which are no larger, and in some cases smaller than they were a year ago. It is stated that probably it would be found that the increase alone in the cost of food, fuel and clothing amounts to many times the total electric bill.

Concerning the question of geographic integration or concentration of operating companies, the letter says that "The continuous financing necessary to the growth and development of operating companies is, contrary to popular opinion, a far more important factor in the public interest than is the technical end of the business, and as to all but the few companies operating in the largest cities, this financing can best be done, and in many cases only be done, through holding companies."

While it is pointed out that the Electric Bond and Share Company has not itself been charged with most of the practices of which the public utility companies have been accused, a definite answer is given to the generalized criticism emanating from Washington. No company in the Electric Bond and Share Group, it is declared, manipulates securities; the undistributed earnings of subsidiary companies have never been taken into the books of the holding companies; all purchasing, tax and insurance savings effected by the holding company have been passed on to the operating companies; dividends have never been paid except out of earnings; and there are no up-stream loans.

No "water" exist in the Electric Bond and Share Company's capital structure; the actual cash invested in the Company, exclusive of accumulated earnings and assets acquired for stock, exceeds \$2.25 for each \$1.00 of capital liability on the Company's books. The Company is controlled by 143,000 stockholders, no one of whom has as much as 1.4 per cent of the shares of the Company. Finally, it is stated, that in furtherance of a policy of sim-

intermediate corporation in the group are being eliminated as rapidly as feasible when they no longer serve a useful purpose.

Not only the public utility holding companies but the operating companies are under attack in the proposed legislation, according to the letter. "If despite all the attacks now being directed against them, the operating companies should survive as private enterprises, you will have been forced, if the bills now pending in Congress become law," the letter states, "to sacrifice your interest in those companies for little or no compensation with the result that others may acquire those interests at distress prices and reap all the benefits that in more prosperous times in the future should accrue to you from the developments made and the progress attained in the industry as the result of the investment made in it by you and other present investors."

Corn-Heg Contracts Start

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP)—A heavy sign-up for 1935 Nebraska corn-hog contracts is anticipated by A. E. Anderson, state and federal agricultural statistician, because "of the unusual attractiveness of the contract." The program is so attractive this year because it permits farmers to produce small feed grains on the acreage taken out of corn production, Anderson explained.

DENTON—Miss Helen Langford, junior student at Texas State College for Women (CIA), has been elected president of the Texas Pan-American Student Forum to fill the vacancy left by Miss Amy Gibbs of Chihuahua, Mexico, who did not return to the college.

Miss Langford, whose home is in Sherman, will attend the Forum convention to be held in Oklahoma City March 21-22 with five other delegates from the college.

No. 30
Items Exempt From Tax
 Certain items are specifically exempt from the income tax and need not be included in the taxpayer's return of gross income. Among such items are the proceeds from life insurance policies paid by reason of the death of the insured. Amounts received (other than amounts paid by reason of the death of the insured and interest payments on such amounts) and other than amounts received as annuities) under a life insurance or endowment contract, which are less than or exactly equal to the premiums or consideration paid thereon, are exempt from Federal income tax. Any excess received over the consideration paid is taxable. Amounts received as an annuity under an annuity or endowment contract shall be included in gross income, except that there shall be excluded from gross income the excess of the amount received in the taxable year over an amount equal to 3 per centum of the aggregate premiums of consideration paid for such annuity (whether or not paid during such year), until the aggregate amount excluded from gross income for the taxable year 1934 or prior years in respect of such annuity equals the aggregate premiums or consideration paid for such annuity. There are also exempt from tax amounts received by gift, bequest, devise, or inheritance; interest on obligations of the District of Columbia, any Territory, State, county, or municipal-

ity; interest on certain bonds issued by the United States Government or its possessions, and on Federal farm loan bonds; amounts received through accident or health insurance or under workmen's compensation acts for personal injury or sickness, and damages received on account of such injuries or sickness. Pensions and compensation received by veterans are subject to tax unless such amounts are received under the World War Veterans' Act or the World War Adjusted Compensation Act. Pensions received from the United States by the family of a veteran for services rendered by the veteran to the United States in time of war are exempt, as gifts. There is also exempt from Federal income tax the rental value of a dwelling house and appurtenances thereof furnished to a minister of the gospel as part of his compensation. Other items excluded from gross income are alimony, and city jury fees.

Moscow Subway to Start Soon
 MOSCOW (U.P.)—The first section of Moscow's new underground railroad, the Metropolitan, is expected to start operation next month. This great engineering project was carried out in large part by voluntary labor of office and factory workers who contributed their "free days" to work in the subway.
