Condon Unshaken Under Bombardment by Detense

REILLY EXPECTED FIGHT TESTIMONY OF JOHN'S COUGH

May Seek to Link it With Isador Fisch, Is Belief

FLEMINGTON, Jan. 10, (P)— The cross examination of Dr. J. F. Condon ended unexpectedly as court began its recess early this afternoon.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 10. (P).

Dr. John F. Condon, the state's star accuser of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, remained unshaken through continued hostile examination today.

His story that Hauptmann was the "John" who negotiated, collected the Lindbergh ransom money, and asked, "Will I burn if the baby is dead?" was withstanding the defense's heaviest pounding.

The state relies on his story as one of the strongest links in the chain of evidence by which it hopes to send the stolid German carpenter to the electric chair for the kidnaping and murder of baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr.

Defense counsel Reilly wanted to know if Condon told anybody on City Island, where he has a shack, that he thought a gang was responsible for the kidnaping.

"I can't recall," he replied.

Reilly pounded on the "hollow yough" the mysterious "John" had when he sat on the park bench with Condon for an hour discussing the cansom. The defense may contend that Condon talked, not to Hauptmann, but to Isador Fisch, who died of tuberculosis in Germany.

Hauptmann has claimed that the ransom money found in his possession was given him by Fisch for afekeeping.

BUILDING REMODELED

FELDORADO (P) — Among the many building projects under way in Schleicher county under the Federal Housing act is the remodelling of one of the county's oldest landmarks. The building, which served as the county's first court house and school house, has a history as colorful as West Texas itself.

It was contstructed by W. B. Silliman along before Schleicher county was or anized. The structure saw service as a school house, court house, community gathering place, and justice court during territorial days.

After organization of the county, a stone vault was added to house safely the county records and the building served solely as a court house was constructed. At that time Mr. Silliman, refusing to see the building stand idle, formed a partnership with Joab Campbell and R. A. Evans and established a land office. In that capacity the building was the scene of much activity during the hectic land rush days in Schleicher county.
