LOCAL MAN KILLED BY TRAIN

Testimony Starts Today in Lindbergh Kidnaping Case

DEFENSE DEMAND FOR A MISTRIAL DENIED BY JUDGE

State Charges Bruno Hauptmann Killed Lindbergh Baby

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 3. (AP)—The State of New Jersey charged today that Bruno Hauptmann killed baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh simultaneously with the kidnaping of the child 2 years and 10 months ago.

The State further charged that Hauptmann ripped the sleeping suit from the dead baby in order to perpetrate the ghastly ransom hoax upon the parents.

The speech of Attorney General David T. Wilentz was made in the presence of Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh.

The prosecutor told the jury that he would prove that the man who kidnaped and murdered the baby "sits in this courtroom."

Edward Jay Reilly, defending Hauptmann, demanded a mistrial at the end of the prosecutor's outline, charging that it was intended to "influence the jury."

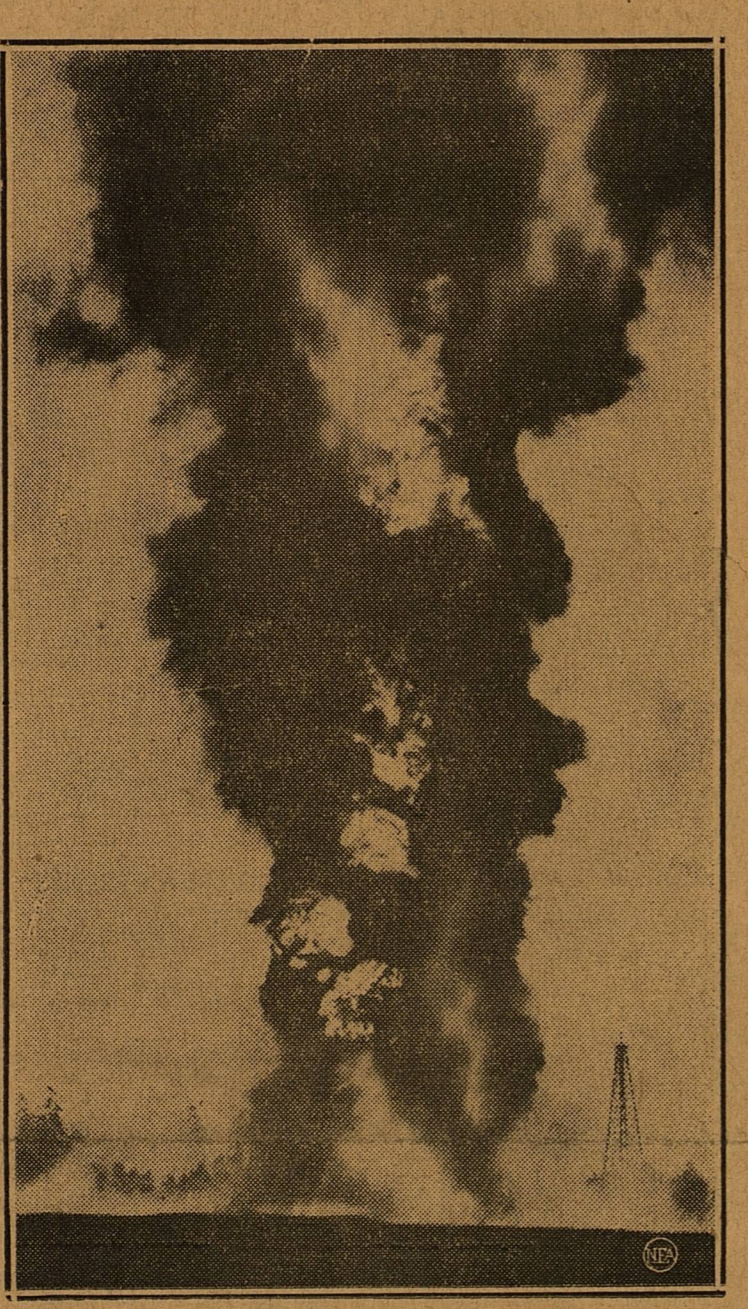
Judge Truichard denied the motion.

Mrs. Lindbergh sat with her head bowed and her eyes fixed on the floor while Wilentz described the gruesome murder scene when the child's "horribly decomposed" body was identified.

Perspiration appeared on Lindbergh's brow and the accused Hauptmann seemed to brace himself as he sat back in his chair.

Taking of testimony began immediately after the state had a witness describe the Lindbergh estate.

DEPUTY DIES OF GUNSHOT WOUNDS

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 3. (AP)—Governor J. Marion Furell today ordered a company of national guardsmen on duty after reports of threatened violence in the vicinity of Batesville where a deputy sheriff was slain in a lonely mountain section.

MIAMI, Okla., Jan. 3. (AP)—Deputy Sheriff Gerald Hodge, 36, died in a Picher hospital at 9:45 p. m. Wednesday from a bullet wound received in one of two gun battles with four outlaws in Picher.

The officers wounded were Under-sheriff William McIntosh, from Miami, and Constable Pat Bray of Trece, Kas.

The others wounded were "Buster" Cooper, a former convict now wanted for the \$300 robbery of the bank of Quapaw last week, and Bob Johnson, who has no criminal record as far as Miami officers were informed.

DEPOSITS OF LOCAL BANKS ARE \$1,688,110.09, BASED ON CALL FOR CONDITION STATEMENT DEC. 31

Deposits in both Midland banks registered further gains, over the last quarterly statement and over that a year ago, when released this morning after the call from the comptroller of currency, as of December 31.

A brief digest, showing deposits, loans and discounts and total cash resources of the two institutions follows: Midland National bank, deposits \$767,557.35, loans and discounts \$286,616.40, total cash resources \$470,095.72; First National bank deposits \$1,011,552.74, loans \$596,443.93, cash and bonds \$565,751.39. Their total deposits of the two banks amounted to \$1,688,110.09.

NATIONAL CALL IS MADE TODAY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3. (AP)—The comptroller of the currency issued a call today for the condition of all national banks at the close of business December 31.

A similar call was issued by the Deposit Insurance corporation insured banks not members of the federal reserve system.

BROWNFIELD AUTO DEALER KIDNAPED BY THREE YOUTHS

BROWNFIELD, Jan. 3. (AP)—Three youths kidnaped and robbed Luther Cruce, Brownfield automobile dealer, late Wednesday afternoon and released him unharmed near Big Spring two hours later.

Sheriff's deputies arrested three men in Cruce's stolen automobile at Colorado late tonight.

Sheriff Jess Slaughter of Big Spring said the youths, fitting descriptions of those who kidnaped Cruce after entering the automobile ostensibly for a demonstration, were arrested as they rode into Colorado.

Charges of kidnaping, robbery with firearms and theft of an automobile were expected to be filed today at Brownfield.

Cruce, released unharmed but robbed of \$125 and \$140, said an 18-year-old boy entered his place late today and said he wished to purchase an automobile.

"I took him out in the car, demonstrated it and he told me he did not have enough to pay cash for the car but would get his father and brother to return," Cruce said.

"Twenty minutes later the boy returned to the place with a companion about 26 years old. I let the younger boy drive and the other man got in the back seat by himself. Just as we got outside the city limits the boy driving saw another man, who he said was his brother, and they stopped and he got in the car.

"One of the boys on the back seat told me to look around and said 'We are taking you for a ride.' He held a pistol in his hand. We drove toward Big Spring and when about three miles from town they stopped, searched me and took all my money, between \$125 and \$140. Then they gave me \$5 and let me go. They were very courteous and did not attempt to harm me. I could not tell from their conversation where they planned to go after leaving me."

Sheriff Slaughter notified Colorado officers by telephone of the youths' probable flight in that direction and officers were awaiting their arrival. They did not resist arrest and were lodged in jail pending arrival of Big Spring officers.

Cruce said he had never seen any of the youths before.

Polo Tournament To Open Friday

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 3. (AP)—Opening matches of the Southwestern Circuit Cup polo tournament, twice postponed on account of rain, are now set for Friday.

El Rancho (Arlington), defending champ, drew a bye in the opening round. In the initial contest the Second Division will meet the San Antonio Blues; the Austin Polo Club goes against the Highlanders, and the San Antonio Yellow Jacks battle the University of Texas.

Twenty Grand went six furlongs in 1:11 1-5 and finished the seven furlongs pulled up in 1:26 3-5. The race Saturday will be Twenty Grand's first since he was retired to stud more than two years ago and was a prepping event for the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap to be run here Feb. 23.

Where Ambitions Clash in Africa



Reporting ten million feet of gas in limestone and anhydrite above the Delaware sand, the wildcat Cunningham et al. No. 1 Tiller test in Reeves county made the principal news of the day.

Total depth on the well is reported at 3,673 feet, and the gas is said to have cleaned the hole of drilling mud and water, which was encountered at 3,546 feet and 3,551 feet.

Top of anhydrite was reached yesterday in the Humble Oil and Refining Company No. 2 R. M. Means, northernmost location of the new Andrews county field, at 1,867 feet with the well waiting on cement at bottom hole depth of 1,905 feet.

The southern well, Humble No. 2 S. Means, is generally regarded as dry, failing to show commercial production on test.

Another Humble test, the No. 1 Walker, has received production gauge of 24 barrels in three and a half hours, to mark it the first producer of a new field listed as the Walker pool. Production is through tubing joints being a casing pressure of 1,475 pounds.

In Ector county, the Landreth No. 1 Johnson, wildcat between North Cowden pool and Odessa, has been officially gauged at 152 barrels in 24 hours to make still another new field, which may possibly contain the producing areas to the north and south.

In the north Cowden area, Atlantic No. 1 Kloh is carrying ten cubic casing at a total depth of 1,330 after encountering a barrier of water per hour at 1,126 feet and a hole full at 1,325-30 feet, while to the north, Amerasia No. 1 Holt is waiting on cement at 4,040 feet.

Shell No. 1 Connell, southern test of the Penwell area, has reported a show of oil at 3,444 feet and is drilling at 3,420 feet with 300 feet of oil in the hole.

Recent Buyer to Conduct His Own "Horse Auction"

Tom Nance, recently a heavy purchaser of Thoroughbred horses at the Lexington, Ky., auction sale, will conduct a "horse auction" of his own soon at Little Rock, Ark.

Nance has just returned from Alamogordo, N. M., where he bought 200 head of wild horses, including mares, colts and horses of all ages. They will be put in the stock pens, whereupon they become his property.

The first 110 head will be received and shipped from there Wednesday of next week. Shipping arrangements for unloading the stock for feeding at the Midland stock pens Friday, January 11.

Nance will go to Little Rock ahead of the horses and will conduct an auction series over a period of two or three days, selling them an animal at a time to the highest bidder. A recent visit to that section indicated a good market among farmers, negro livestock traders and citizens in general.

The New Mexico horses, many of which were seen on Nance's trip here last week, are "pretty good looking" stock, he said. When broken, most of them should make attractive and useful saddle horses, many of them large enough for work animals.

New Mexico ranchers, especially in the mountain sections, have such a surplus of stock horses that they pass up some seasons without rounding up and breaking a crop of colts.

Nance, before coming to Midland, formerly handled such shipments and sales of horses in various states.

RECORD FOR CAVERN

EL PASO, Jan. 3. (AP)—Visitors to Carlsbad Caverns National Park in 1934 totaled 92,397, setting an all-time record, the El Paso Chamber of Commerce was notified today by Thomas Bales, superintendent.

The number surpassed by 925 the previous record of 91,470, set in 1930, and was 36,395 greater than in 1929.

Texas led in representation, visitors from this state accounting for 41,989.

GRADE CROSSING ACCIDENT FATAL THIS MORNING

A. M. Collins Victim Of Crash With Passenger

A. M. Collins, Midland county farmer and worker on the state highway project, was instantly killed this morning when his automobile was struck as it attempted to cross the railroad in front of the west-bound number seven passenger train of the Texas & Pacific.

The accident occurred at the grade crossing at Front street, a few blocks east of the railway station, at about 8:40 o'clock.

Funeral services for the crash victim will be held Friday morning at 10:30, at the Barrow funeral parlors. The Rev. Winston F. Borum will officiate.

Mr. Collins is survived by his wife and eight children, the oldest a married daughter and the youngest a year old. He moved to Midland in 1928 from Honey Grove and farmed at the W. A. Dean place southeast of Midland for several years. He and his family had been living for the past few months in south Midland while he was engaged in highway work.

A half brother, Dr. T. M. Collins, lives at Big Spring, the father of O. C. Collins of Midland.

Eye witnesses at oil stations near the crossing said they were attracted by the whistling of the passenger train as it drew into town at its usual speed. Seeing that the driver of the automobile was attempting to beat the train across, Engineer Berry applied his brakes, bringing the train to a stop in about six car lengths, but the automobile, going to the south, was struck at the left rear wheel, completely demolishing it.

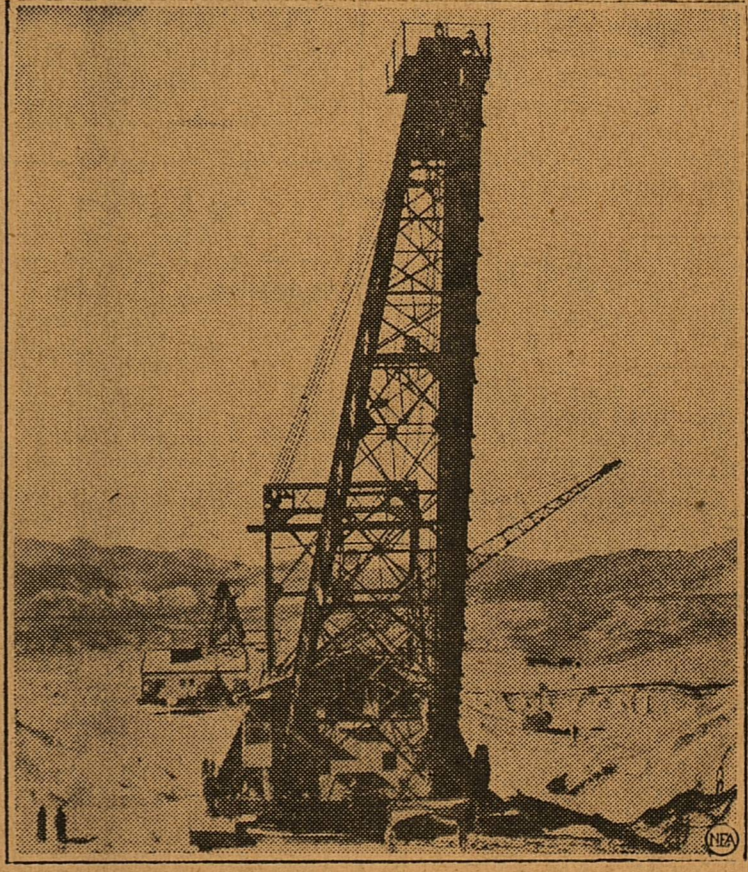
Mr. Collins escaped with less mangled of his body than would be expected from such an impact, without serious injury to his body.

An ambulance was quickly summoned but he was dead before aid could be rendered.

DEMOCRATIC CONGRESS CURIOUS AS TO F.D.R. SPEECH, ASSEMBLES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3. (AP)—Confronting an array of grave national problems, the strongest democratic congress in history convened quietly today, still in the dark as to what is impending in the new deal.

Overshadowing the formalities of the moment, was a throbbing curiosity over what legislation President Roosevelt will recommend tomorrow and thereafter on the relief question, N.R.A. budget, banking and capital and labor questions.

The first Tennesseean in 99 years to be speaker of the house, Joseph W. Byrns, gravely told the office with promise to further legislation in harmony with party principles and politics.

The republican leadership pledged itself not to be obstructive. Fidelity in a swallow tail coat, Vice President John Garner smiled and then was grave as he smashed down the senate gavel at noon.

Midland Sailor Now Centenary Visitor In Australian Port

Herbert Wood, former Midland boy now in the navy, is stationed at Melbourne, Australia, according to a letter received Wednesday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Wood, 804 S. Marientield.

Wood, whose ship is the U. S. S. Augusta, said he came here to represent America in the Australian Centenary. It's just like a world's fair.

He added that England, Australia, India, France, and Italy also have representative ships at Melbourne.

He enclosed a card of invitation to sailors on the visiting warships, issued by the Y. M. C. A. on behalf of the "Commonwealth and State Governments," offering free entertainment and accommodations to the visitors while at the Centenary celebration.

The Midland sailor said he had just come from a seven-day stay at Sydney, Australia, where there were "800,000 girls" and 700 sailors. "All the girls," he wrote, "were trying to go with American sailors."

Wood, who was reared in Midland and attended school here, has been in the navy about three years, his father said.

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A MEETING HAS BEEN ARRANGED

The trial of Bruno Hauptmann on the charge of murdering the Lindbergh baby offers the American people a fine chance to refrain from making a spectacle of themselves.

It is by all odds the most notable criminal trial of at least a decade, from the standpoint of public interest. Probably it is true that no crime in this century has so shocked the American people as did this one; certainly there has never been a case in which the ordinary citizen was so anxious to see justice done.

But it would be very easy for us to get pretty sadly mixed up as to the exact nature of this "justice" which we hope to see accomplished.

Justice isn't vengeance. It isn't the railroading of a man to prison through a farcical trial. It isn't a public holiday in which mass blood-lust is sated.

It isn't a chance for us to blow off the accumulated steam of our resentment over an atrocious crime through the spectacle of a man being put to death.

In other words, this trial of Hauptmann wasn't arranged for our collective edification. It isn't a spectacle, and it isn't simply a formality which has to be gone through before the executioner can be summoned.

It is, instead, the highly technical procedure through which society attempts to find out whether a man is guilty of a crime with which he has been charged.

Through the course of many generations, elaborate rules for conduct of this procedure have been devised. Taken by and large, they constitute the best means we have of determining the truth in such cases.

All of which means that it is foolish to form any hard-and-fast opinion as to Hauptmann's guilt or innocence in advance of the trial. It is equally foolish to permit ourselves to be swayed by extraneous sentimental considerations.

If we brood over the tragic fate of Baby Lindbergh and howl for the blood of the first suspect arrested, or if we meditate on the sad plight of Hauptmann's baby and grow maudlin with excessive sympathy for a man accused of murder, we create an atmosphere in which justice is apt to get bogged down in emotion.

In other words—let's take the Hauptmann trial in our stride, without growing unduly excited or raising any barriers in the path of justice.

Prosecution and defense seem to be in capable hands. We might as well relax and let the people who are being paid to do so settle the question.

NEW PROBLEM IN EDUCATION

Our school system will be one of the first institutions to feel the effect of our declining birth rate, according to Dr. Ellen C. Potter, of the New Jersey Department of Institutions and Agencies.

Dr. Potter told the Pennsylvania Emergency Child Health Committee the other day that in 1940 there will be 1,000,000 fewer children in American schools than there are now. As early as next fall the decline will be felt, she predicted, in fewer first grade registrations.

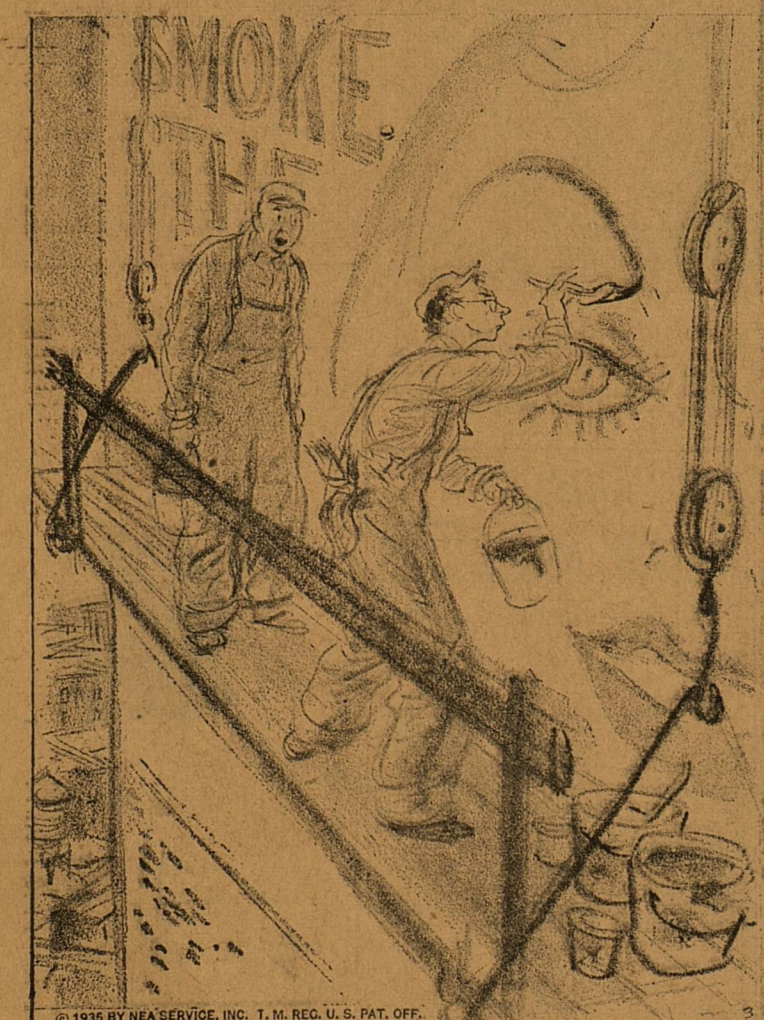
This will bring our schools a brand-new problem, different from any they have faced before. The average school board has had to meet a steadily expanding population. It has had the specter of over-crowding always on its horizon.

If, in the future, it must adjust its policies to a slow, steady decline in numbers, it will find that its whole program may need overhauling.
