Allred Inaugural Breaks Precedents

AUSTIN, Jan. 23, (P)—Although the inauguration of Governor James V. Allred went through without a ripple noticeable to the casual observer a few things occurred during the ceremony that caused some discussion afterward.

One was a last minute shift in the lineup of the inaugural procession. It was announced that Governor Allred would lead the retiring executive, Miriam A. Ferguson to the platform and that Mrs. Allred would be accompanied by former Governor James E. Ferguson.

The incoming executive escorted Mrs. Ferguson but Mrs. Allred entered on the arm of Dick Waters, a former assistant to Allred and his state campaign manager and close personal friend. A reason was given by Allred's secretaries for the change.

Michael J. WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. (P).—House Democratic insurgents Tuesday gained a compromise on the President's \$4,880,000,000 relief program at a party caucus after Speaker Byrns promised that Secretary Ickes would not be the administrator of the fund.

The proposed gag rules, under which the measure is to be considered, was broken by the caucus when it was agreed that certain sections would be thrown open to amendment in order to curb the power given the President.



SUCCESS LIES IN HOPES THAT ARE FULFILLED

Representative John S. McGroarty of California, preparing to do legislative battle for the Townsend old age pension plan, is warned by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt that this plan is raising false hopes. To which he replies, somewhat caustically, that the whole New Deal program "has raised a hell of a lot of false hopes."

s raised a hell of a lot of false hopes."

It's too bad that we don't have a barber shop where all of the barbers are deaf and dumb. put his finger on the distinguishing feature of the present era—the thing which makes it both a more encouraging and a more potentially dangerous time than any in recent

It is an era of hope; of high hopes, some of them, held by people in all classes of society. The course that our society will take in the next generation may easily depend very largely on the extent to which these hopes can be satisfied.

It is no disparagement of Mr. Hoover to say that the final year of his administration was a time of discouragement. That happened because of the inexhorable march of events. Everything seemed to be sliding down hill.

We actually got so that we took a kind of morbid delight in pessimistic forecasts. No one dared look to the future with true confidence.

Then, for one reason or another, our mental attitude changed. The greatest gain made in the last two years has been based on that change. We became hopeful

We stopped expecting everything to go to pieces day after tomorrow, and started to comfort ourselves with fine dreams in the old American tradition-dreams about the great things that were about to be done in our

But if this has been a great gain, it has also carried with it the seeds of great risk. When many hopes are aroused, it is inevitable that some of them must be false ones. Not everything can be set right overnight.

Not all the schemes for self-betterment can be

sound. Someone has to be disappointed. And in this inevitable dismusionment lies danger. The greatest responsibility that lies upon the administration today is to see that there is as little disillusionment as possible; to fulfill, wholly or in part, as many of the

new hopes as may be humanly attainable. Which is just another way of saying that the government, now as never before, must be responsive to the desires of the people. Its success or failure will be judged, eventually, by the percentage of these hopes that it has been able to satisfy.

AN ECHO OF THE TWENTIES

When you think of the giddy, dizzy days of the 1920's, with all their insanities both major and minor, one figure that comes to mind is that of Texas Guinan. Somehow Tex typified the whoopee spirit that was the mark of those days.

Expect Develop New McCulloch Oil Pool

BRADY. (A).-Development of the recently discovered McCulloch county oil pool on the White ranch, 20 miles north of Brady, is expected ty oil pool on the White ranch, 20 miles north of Brady, is expected to begin soon. A number of tests are contemplated in wildcat territory in the northern part of McCulloch and the southern sections of Brown and Coleman counties.

Oil was struck in the White well at a depth of 760 feet in three feet of sand December 14 while it was being drilled for water. It has been producing an average of 20 barrels of 36.7 gravity sweet oil daily since insertion of a one-inch tubing, about two weeks ago.

The well is 5½ miles west of Mercury, the nearest railroad point, and located on section 2, William Dennis survey about 2½ miles south of the Colorado river which forms the boundary line between McCulloch and Brown counties and a short distance to the north between McCulloch and Coleman counties.

G. R. and W. N. White, who own the 20,000 acre ranch near the center of which the well is located, have not leased any of their acreage although hundreds of oil men have besieged them with propositions, G. R. White stated.

A test has been spudded on the Cox farm about four miles northeast of the discovery well while across the Colorado river in Coleman county Bill Brookover of Fort Worth is planning to drill three tests. A test is to be spudded in on the Lee Roberts farm across the line in Brown county. Plans are being made for a number of tests on acreage in McCulloch county several miles south of the White well. Several tests are contemplated 12 miles east in San Saba county.
