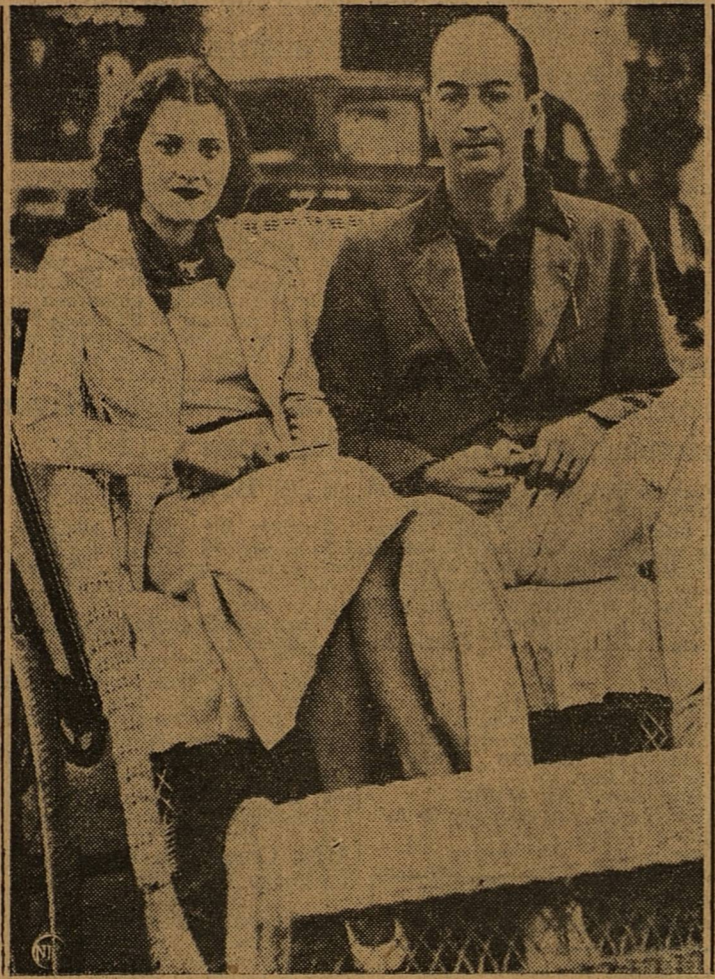

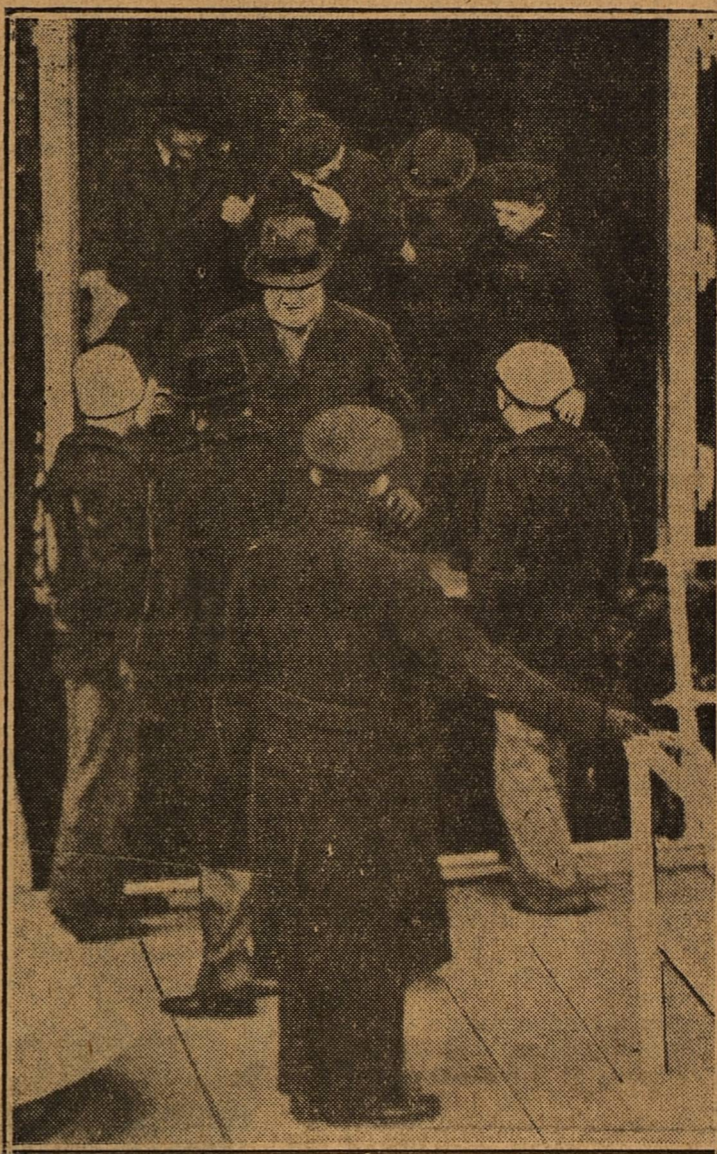

Outbreak Comes as Neighbor Testifies To Conversation  
FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 18. (AP)—Upon request of the prosecution and defense counsel, Justice Trenchard decided this afternoon to adjourn court over Saturday.

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 18. (AP)—Anna Hauptmann's nerve broke today at the trial of her husband, Bruno Richard Hauptmann, for his life.

"It's a lie," she shouted at Mrs. Ella Achenbach, Bronx neighbor and surprise witness for the state, who testified that Mrs. Hauptmann came to her two days after the Lindbergh kidnaping and said she and her husband had just returned from a trip.

"You lie, Mrs. Achenbach, you lie," Mrs. Hauptmann flared.

Sergeant John Wallace of the state police related again the story of Hauptmann's arrest last September 19. He substantiated previous testimony that a \$20 gold note, a part of the Lindbergh ransom, was found on Hauptmann when the officers overtook him.

PRODUCERS MAY ENJOY NEIGHBORHOOD MOVIES

Somehow or other the people of the United States, the common people who go no farther than the neighborhood movie house for their entertainment, seem to be a class entirely apart from those great industrialists to whom they look for their future welfare and morals.

Take the movie industry, as an example. High up in the steel towers of New York, or out in the guarded studios of Hollywood, sit the Mayers and the Warners and the Goldwyns with no other contact with the millions who daily enjoy their products than the money that comes streaming to them through long devious channels.

All they know about the likes and dislikes of their patrons comes to them only through reports of their hirings or criticisms in the newspapers. Direct contact with the people themselves, where they may hear and feel the truth about their pictures, these potentates of the screen rarely if ever attain.

For it is only through the neighborhood movie house in the larger cities, and the one or two theaters in the smaller towns out in the country, that the reactions of the American people to the new productions can be gauged properly. Such little theaters are in the majority in this country and these most of us common folk attend.

Let one of these chief executives visit a neighborhood movie theater on a Saturday or Sunday afternoon or any evening of the week, and he will have a far different feeling than any he might have had at the premiere of his latest production on the city's leading screen.

The reason is that children attend these neighborhood shows, with their parents, and children are the most natural and outspoken of critics. They give vent to their emotions by yelling and applauding and booing; and if you will just analyze these reactions, in the light of the pictures presented, you will find that the young ones are pretty fair judges, at that.

You will find that the children boo down the pictures which their elders have been trying to have outlawed or restricted in deference to the moral education of these same youngsters. You will find that pure entertainment, with a loud and hearty laugh, is most to be desired.

And you'll find finally what Hollywood only lately has discovered, that those undying children's classics like "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch" and "David Copperfield" and "Little Women" are far more enjoyed than any picture Mae West could give us.

Perhaps, after all, those sitting atop the movie towers are noticing this truth, or are heeding those who have, for word comes that we shall see more of the older classics and less of the sexy stuff.

... WHICH IS ABSURD?

In the days when we struggled through geometry, we all met that method of disproof which led up to a final conclusion "... which is absurd."

The kind of dictatorship which insists that people shall have only such plays, books, movies, and newspapers as the rulers believe are best for them, always runs afoul of these absurdities in wholesale lots.

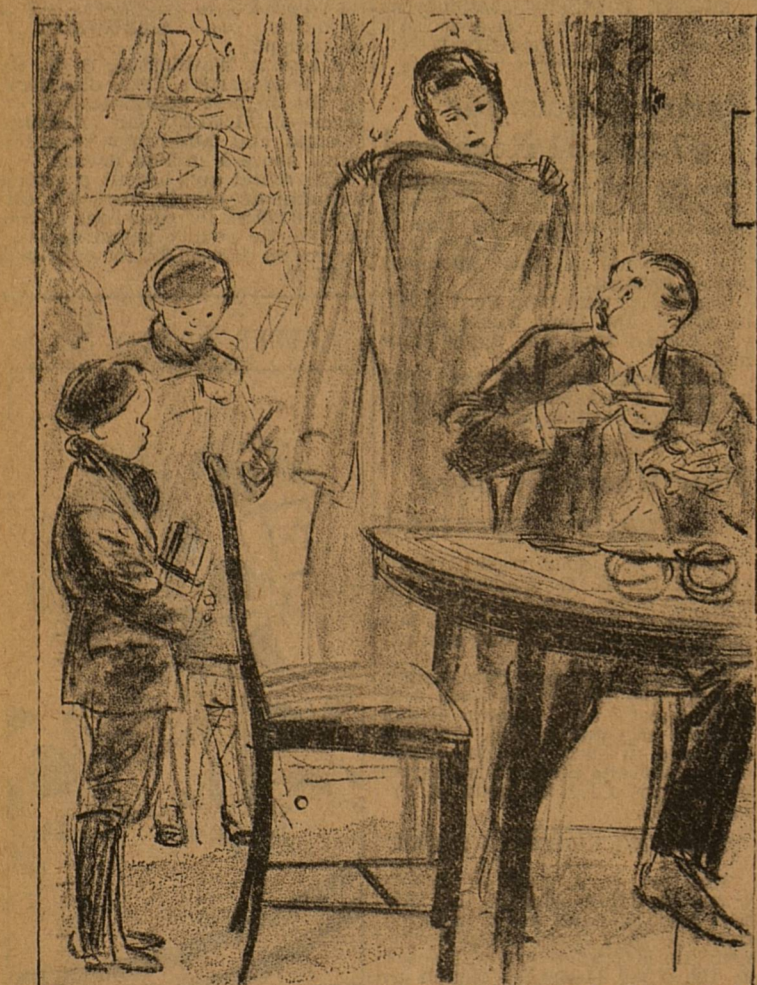
Two shining examples recently cropped up. In Russia there was a public scandal over the fact that a radio station was caught red-handed broadcasting—negro spirituals! Somebody saw insidious counter-revolutionary propaganda in the haunting melodies and sweet chords that had wandered so far from their home in the Old South.

And in Germany, a movie film, which was immensely popular in Germany in 1926, is today barred as "not coinciding with world philosophy of the present day in Germany." It was Charlie Chaplin's "The Gold Rush".

If a man is a political dictator, he inevitably thinks he knows better than the rest of us what we ought to see, and read, and hear. Which is absurd.

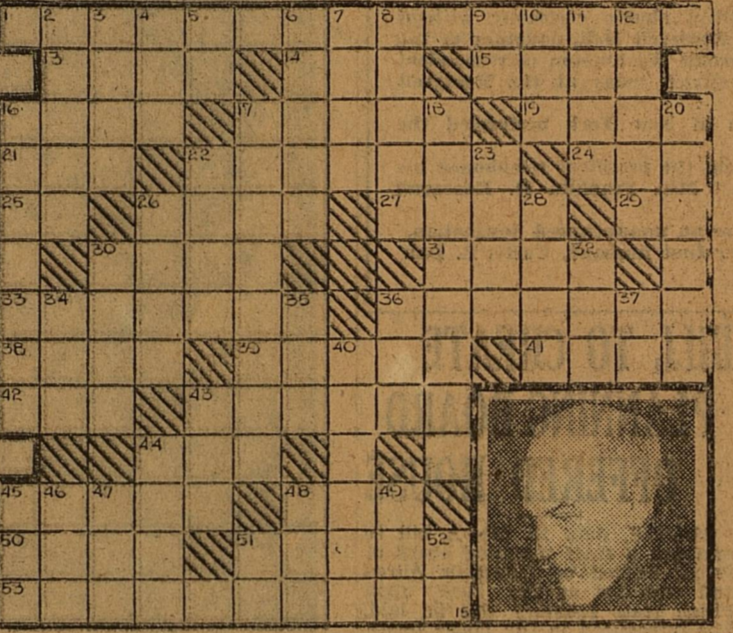

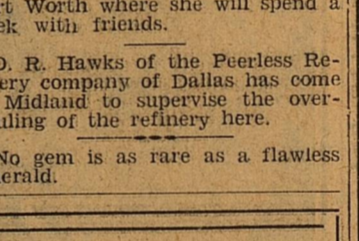
Theater Party Given For Anti Club by Miss Bivens

**Has Practiced Law In Lampasas 58 Yrs.**

LAMPASAS, Tex. (AP)—Believed to be the oldest practicing attorney in Texas, W. H. Browning, 86, has been a lawyer in this town for 58 years.

Browning was county attorney here for eight years, district attorney for the 27th district when it included Bell, Lampasas, Burnet, Mills and Williamson counties for eight years, a member of the 22nd legislature and later was elected to the state senate.

"I found there was plenty of excitement but little pay in politics," he said, "so I returned to practice of law."

Browning served two years as a member of General Tom Green's brigade during the Civil War, consisting at the age of 15. He studied law at his home near Austin, completing a course by mail.

"I like civil practice better than criminal work," he said. However, he has defended around 40 men accused of murder and said he secured acquittals in most cases.

Browning tells many stories of justice in the early days. One concerns a Texan whom he defended on a charge of murder in Sheridan, Wyoming, many years ago.

The case was tried during a blizzard with the mercury 6 below zero. The defense claimed self defense. The verdict was not guilty.

The judge then ordered the defendant to rise and calling him by name said: "The jury found you not guilty. You fellows from Texas shoot too quick. You did not kill in self defense, you shot him down and in cold blood. You are guilty of murder, if not of murder, of a lower degree of homicide. But the jury has turned you loose."

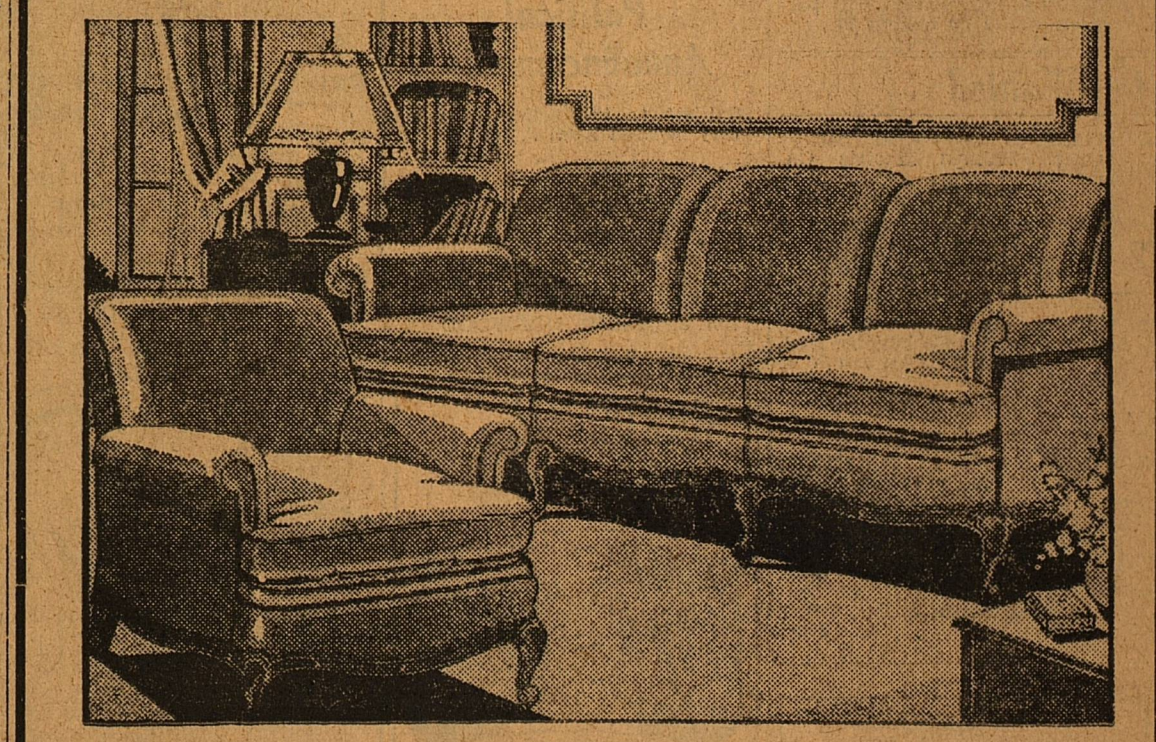
