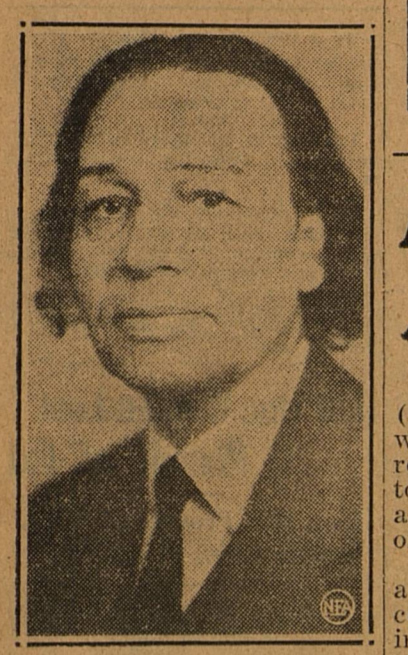

## GULF ORDOVICIAN TEN FEET BELOW FORMER RECORD

Drilling progress of several wildcat tests, none of which are yet to a particularly critical stage, made West Texas oil news for the day. The world's deepest operation, Gulf No. 103 McElroy, western Upson county Ordovician test, is last reported drilling in limestone and chert at 11,387 feet, ten feet lower than the former record.  
In the Means area, northern Andrews county, Humble No. 3 R. M. Means has run Schlumberger and is preparing to acidize, showing about 150 barrels of oil daily at present. No. 3 J. S. Means is drilling at 2,759 feet in salt and anhydrite.  
York and Harper and Harry Adams No. 1 Hereford Stock Farms, northeast of the Means, is still shut down at 3,400 feet for casing and a wildcat in northwestern Andrews county. Stogner et al Richards and McWhorter is drilling at 2,545 feet in salt and anhydrite.  
Of the Ector county wildcats, Enpro No. 1 Cummins is down to 370 feet in red beds, Gulf Production Company No. 1 Goldsmith is at 1,240 feet in the same formation, and Penrose et al No. 1 Klon is drilling in anhydrite and shale at 2,742 feet.  
In Winkler county, east of the central part of the Hendrick pool, Maxwell No. 1 Clapp shot with 100 quarts from 3,175-3,205 feet and 100 quarts from 3,175-3,205 feet and 100 quarts from 3,175-3,205 feet.

## Machine Gun Bandit Taken After McCamey Officer Hurt

SAN ANGELO, Mar. 8. (AP).—Houston Barker, wanted at San Antonio for robbery, was captured here today after dodging officers all night in the country west of here.  
Facial wounds received in a clash with McCamey officers had been bandaged during the night at a ranch.  
When Ranger Jim Rooney and Police Chief Fred Senter of McCamey tried to arrest Barker there yesterday, he fired upon them with a machine gun, grazing Rooney under the chin and sending bullets through Senter's clothes.  
A posse of officers and citizens pursued Barker all night after he had engaged McCamey officers in a running fight on the road leading to Fort Stockton. Constable Charlie Vail was wounded in the leg.

## JUDGE CALDWELL, ATTORNEY HERE FOR 35 YEARS, DIES WEDNESDAY NIGHT; FUNERAL TO BE FRIDAY

Judge J. M. Caldwell, 67, attorney who had practiced civil law at Midland since 1900, died at a hospital here at 7:45 o'clock last night after a stomach trouble attack from which he had suffered for six days. He had been in ill health for four years.  
Funeral services will be held Friday morning at 10 o'clock at the General residence, 223 South H street, with interment at Fairview cemetery.  
Born in Talbot county, Ga., April 13, 1868, Judge Caldwell gained his education in schools of that section, taking up the teaching profession in 1890, beginning at once the practice of law. Mrs. Caldwell died here June 11, 1907. He maintained his practice continuously for 35 years, confining his work to the civil courts and probate practice. He has represented out of state corporations and large interests having properties in West Texas.  
Although he never ran for an elective office as judge, he served as special judge in the eighth court of civil appeals at El Paso in 1932 by special appointment of Governor Ross Sterling, in certain important cases.

## TEXAN CONFESSES DOUBLE SLAYING ON UTAH RANGE

SULPHUR SPRINGS, March 7. (AP).—Clinton Palmer, 38-year-old ranchman, Wednesday night admitted to officers and newspapermen the slaying of a 70-year-old stockman and his grandson last Monday in a Utah range argument and said he killed them "to protect my wife and my land."  
Palmer, arrested here Tuesday after a 26-mile chase, was held in jail on an indictment charging him with the slaying in Hopkins county in 1934 of Dillard Garrett, father of Lucille Garrett, the 14-year-old girl who accompanied him here.  
The swarthy ranchman, talking freely with officers and newspapermen, told in detail of the slaying of William E. Oliver, 70, and Norris Shumway, 24, whose bodies were found at the foot of a cliff in San Juan river valley in Utah and taken to Blanding, Utah, Tuesday.  
Palmer said he went to Utah and filed a claim on 940 acres of land, taking the Garrett girl, who he said was his wife, with him. He said he entered into a partnership with a man named Gouding.  
Officers refused to file the claim, Palmer said, and ordered him to leave.  
"Oliver had bullied everyone who tried to settle there for years, and five land claimers had been run away," said Palmer.  
"I tried to keep from killing Oliver," Palmer asserted. "I met him in John's canyon. The fighting happened in the open range. He was driving my sheep away and he told me 'If they can't run you out, we'll haul you out.'"  
"I ran 75 yards before Bill Oliver fired the first shot. Jake Shumway fired the second shot at me. I turned and emptied my pistol and ran and got my high-powered rifle and shot and killed Oliver."  
"I never saw Oliver fall off his horse, for his horse turned and ran. I saw the horse returned without Oliver."  
"I unsaddled his horse because I felt sorry for the horse—but not for him."  
"I hauled Shumway about six or seven miles and then dumped him out. I went and got my wife. I thought I was doing right."  
"I killed Oliver and Shumway trying to protect my wife and my land."

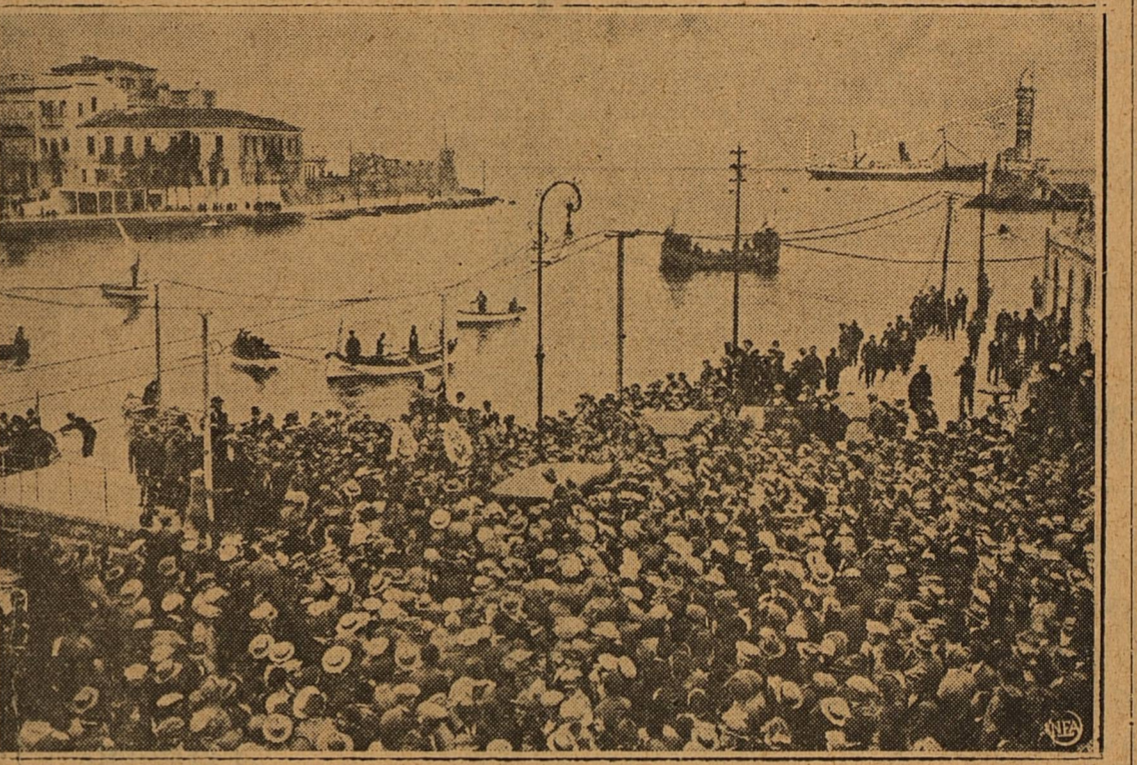
## Liquor Monopoly Plan Rejected

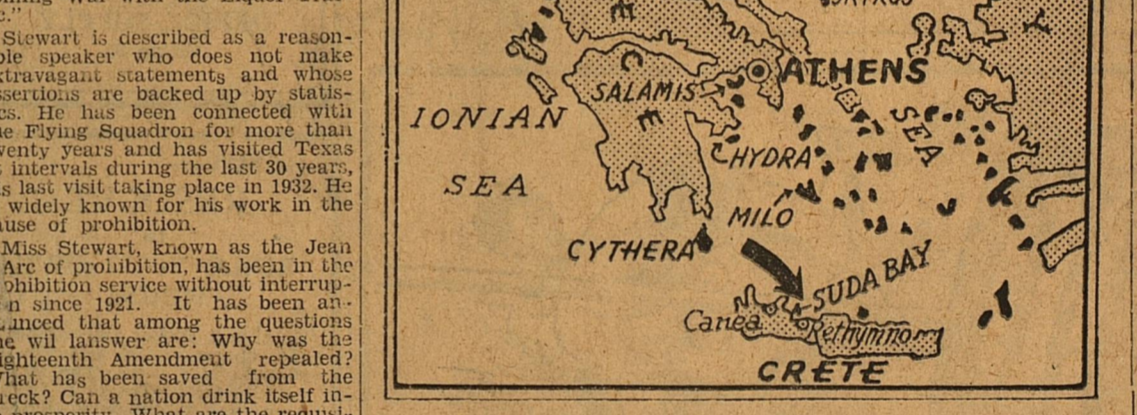
## Crete Capital, Storm Center of Strife

## TEMPERANCE IS SUBJECT OF TWO LECTURES FRIDAY

Two temperance lectures will be heard in Midland Friday when Miss Norma C. Brown will speak at the Christian church at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and Oliver W. Stewart, president of the Flying Squadron Foundation, will speak at the Methodist church at 7:30 o'clock in the evening.

Stewart is described as a reasonable speaker who does not make extravagant statements and whose assertions are backed up by statistics. He has been connected with the Flying Squadron for more than twenty years and has visited Texas at intervals during the last 30 years, his last visit taking place in 1932. He is widely known for his work in the cause of prohibition.

## RICHBERG ASKS NRA CONTINUANCE

WASHINGTON, March 7. (AP)—Donald Richberg, in outlining the administration's view, asked the senate finance committee today to extend the NRA substantially in its present form for two years, "but with codes limited to those trades and industries actually engaged in interstate commerce."  
He recommended that the president be empowered to impose limited codes, containing requirements for minimum wages, maximum hours, prohibition of "notoriously unfair business practices" and provisions to protect natural resources.

WASHINGTON, March 7. (AP)—Huey Long precipitated another verbal free-for-all in the Senate Wednesday by renewing in particular his one-man campaign against Postmaster General Farley, and slamming at the New Deal in general.

## DOZEN INJURED WHILE WATCHING OIL WELL SHOT

Premature Explosion Of Nitroglycerine Topples Derrick  
ST. GEORGE, Utah, Mar. 7. (AP).—A premature explosion killed ten persons last night and injured at least a dozen others. The crowd had gathered to watch the "shooting" of the first oil well in this district.  
A charge of nitroglycerine, dropped into the unfinished well, exploded prematurely, ripping the derrick from its moorings and hurling it into the nearby crowd.  
The blast rocked the countryside five miles south of here. Scores of persons were thrown to the ground and others were knocked down in a rush to escape the blinding sheet of flame.  
A list of dead included Mr. and Mrs. George Alsop. He was general manager of the Arrowhead Oil corporation which was drilling the well.

## EXEMPTS SMALL FARMS FROM ACT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7. (AP)—Small farms producing two bales or less cotton were exempted today by Secretary Wallace from provisions of the Bankhead production control act.  
A force of 300 soldiers occupied the grounds of Havana university, bringing an end to the institution's jealously guarded autonomy.  
A bloody outbreak of daylight terrorism Wednesday which left one man dead and eight more wounded marked the addition of employees of three government departments to the forces seeking President Mendieta's overthrow.  
Simultaneously with the explosion of three bombs in the customs house on the waterfront, wounding five, unknown persons in another part of the city machine gunned an automobile carrying Ramon Vasconcelos, political writer, and several friends, killing one man and wounding three. Vasconcelos, an outstanding figure in the revived Liberal party, was wounded slightly.  
Among those injured at the customs house, where customs inspectors struck demanding the reinstatement of thirty-nine discharged employees, was Capt. Oscar Hernandez, chief of Havana port police, and his assistant, Lieut. Carlos Perez.  
The strike of customs inspectors started government employees on their way out. Almost immediately word reached Havana that all public employees at Cienfuegos, on the south coast, had quit work at noon. Shortly afterward employees of the Education, Labor and Treasury departments left their desks.  
A bomb exploded inside the main Treasury building when the employees walked out, wounding one.

## WILL RETURN CONTROL TO SOUTH

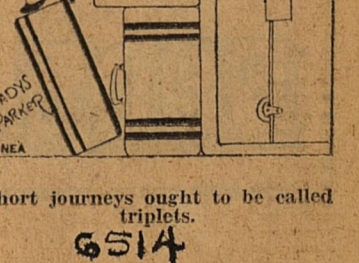

But it is worth noticing that Rio was one of the very few Chicago hoodlums to depart from this life without co-operation of a machine gun or a revolver.

**Would Redistribute Incomes — Eccles**

WASHINGTON, March 7. (AP)—A redistribution of income—not wealth—was suggested to the House Banking Committee today by Marriner S. Eccles, Federal Reserve Board governor, as one way of solving depression's problems.

Testifying on the new omnibus banking bill, Eccles almost, but not quite, took a leaf out of Huey Long's redistribution of wealth book. But Eccles said in effect it would be all right for a man with, say \$10,000,000 in capital to keep that provided his income was redistributed. Long wants the capital redistributed.

"Our ability to fight the depression in this economy of abundance is not a question of money," Eccles said. "It is a question of distribution."

"The depression was not brought about by a shortage of money. As long as we had an inequitable distribution of wealth as existed (in the post-war decade) it was inevitable that business would slow up and the depression ensue."

"Our problem now is one of distribution of income. The most effective way of achieving a better balance is through income taxes."

**Heiress Bride's Death a Mystery**



The tragedy which ended the honeymoon of Mrs. H. Bradley Davidson, Jr., heiress to Stattle hotel millions, only 58 days after her wedding, took on an aspect of mystery when authorities announced they were unable to determine whether the case was one of "accident, suicide or murder." Mrs. Davidson, shown here with her husband at Pinehurst, N. C., on their honeymoon, was found dead in the garage of her Pinehurst home. Authorities at first believed her a victim of carbon monoxide poisoning.

**Bride Death Still Laid to Gas Fumes**

PINEHURST, N. C., March 7. (AP)—Solicitor Rowland S. Pruett, investigating the mysterious death of Mrs. H. Bradley Davidson Jr., Wednesday said the possibility of an accident had been definitely excluded from the case by inquest testimony regarding the mechanical garage doors behind which her body was found last Wednesday.

His statement followed questioning of Sheriff Charles McDonald, of Moore County, who said the doors, of the vertical runner type, would drop back to the ground if raised only 24 inches, balance between 24 and 36 inches and would fly upward of their own accord if raised more to four feet.

"In my opinion," the solicitor said regarding the testimony, "it excluded the accident possibility."

Dr. M. W. Marr, physician called to the Davidson home when the body was found, said the girl had been dead for approximately half an hour when he arrived, and reiterated his previous diagnosis of death from carbon monoxide. His diagnosis has since been confirmed by toxicologists.

Prior to the appearance on the stand of the sheriff and the physician today, Mrs. Davidson had been described as a millionairess who quarreled with her husband two months and wept at what was supposed to have been a gay party on her death eve.

Davidson then took the stand. He was forced to go back over previous testimony regarding his first wife, by whom he had three children. He said she obtained a divorce, charging desertion.

He said he was 42 years old; Mrs. Davidson 22.

He said his personal income, obtained from a small selection of securities, was between \$75 and \$100 monthly.

**MAKES GOOD RECORD**

Six straight B's with one C, the latter grade being in German, is the scholastic record of B. C. Driver, graduate of Midland High School, and now a student at Texas Tech in Lubbock.

**DIRECT DELIVERY TO LEGISLATURE ALLRED'S SYSTEM**

AUSTIN, March 7. (AP)—Governor James V. Allred is departing from the policy of most of his predecessors by delivering important messages to the legislature in person.

Two aims reportedly prompted the governor to do so.

The governor who is unable to personally contact all members on important subjects, believes a personal appearance before a joint session establishes a closer relationship and tends toward harmony between the executive and legislative branches.

The second purpose is that it guarantees more careful attention to content of a message than if it were read by the house reading clerk or the senate secretary.

It has been noted that Governor Allred makes good use of the eloquence lessons he received when a boy in delivering his messages. He has good voice control and uses it effectively to bring home the important passages.

In effect, Allred's delivery constitutes more the reading of a prepared address than a routine presentation of his views on a stated subject. It has been noted that when the governor appears personally to speak on a major topic the members, for the most part, abandon their reading and letter writing to give him close attention.

Former Governor Miriam A. Ferguson made only a few appearances before the legislature. The appearances of former Governor W. C. Sterling and some of his predecessors were few.

Allred worked long with the aid of his secretarial staff and his young son, Commissioner R. B. Anderson, on the recent message on taxation. He polished, re-polished, built up and cut so that the final result was one of the best prepared messages in recent years.

It set out in plain language that he expects the 44th legislature to do something concrete toward adjusting the burdens of taxation so that they fall more equitably on all citizens and to raise sufficient revenue to carry the cost of government without adding to the already large deficit. The governor also indicated the legislature should begin to plan ways and means of making a start toward reduction of the overdraft, although he favored paying it off in installments rather than to attempt to liquidate it in one stroke.

That the legislature has not heard the last of the governor's ideas on taxes was clearly apparent from the message. In several places he made reference to future pronouncements on specific tax subjects.
