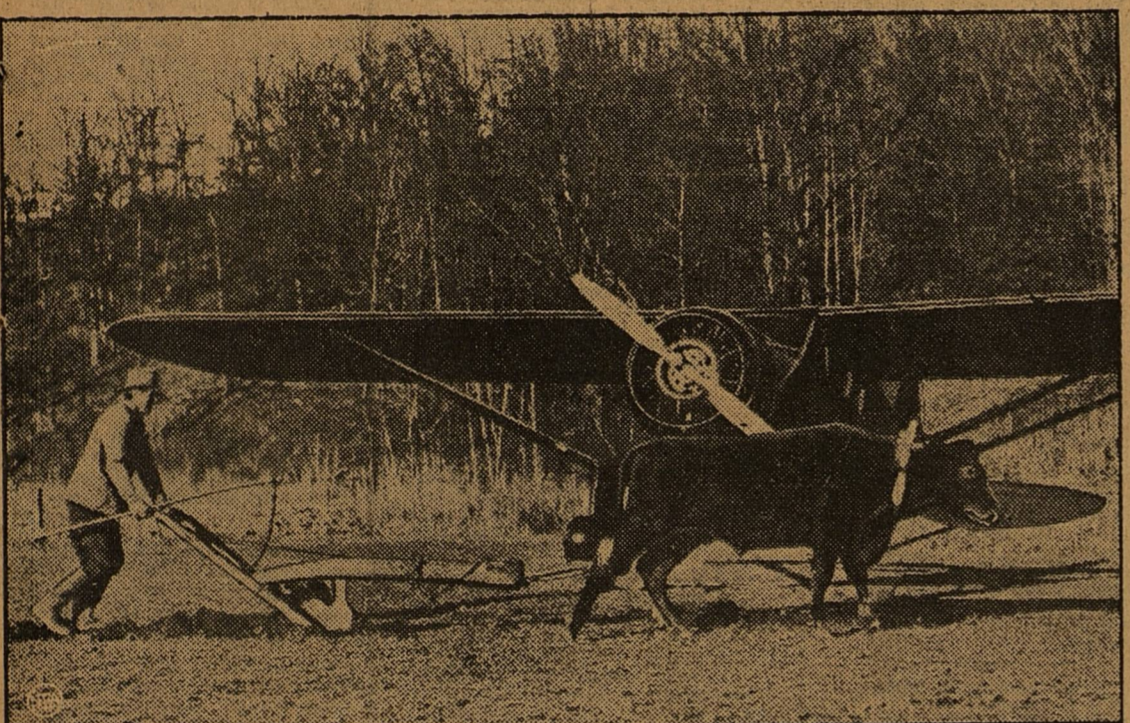

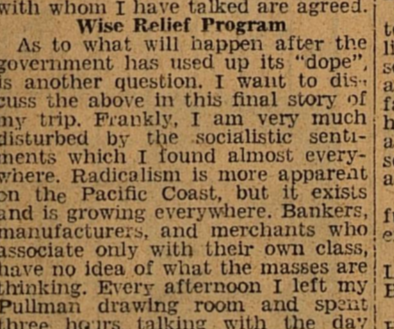

THE "SECRET" OF SCOUTING
 (An editorial from THE ROTARIAN Magazine)

"Boys", a wise man once observed, "are like a bicycle—stable only when going somewhere." Sir Robert Baden-Powell sensed the truth of that when a quarter century ago he gave to England and to the world the Boy Scout movement.

Youngsters of the 'teen age are not philosophers; to their elders they seem to think through hands, elbows and feet as much as through their heads. They are bundles of exploding energy. The open secret for the success of Scouting is that it provides the expression they crave—but in directed channels.

Scouting has extended to almost every country, taking on local color but always holding to those fundamentals. Many individuals and organizations have given it support, for they believe in it and approve the way it attacks the "boy problem". They hope that the success it has had in the past quarter of a century will increase in at least geometrical progression in the next.

IT'S THE "THIRD HOUSE" THAT IS DANGEROUS

If you could get the seventh son of a seventh son off in a corner and ask him, man to man, what the next great political reform in the United States was going to be, he would probably tell you that it would involve adoption of the one-chamber plan by state legislatures.

This idea, which Senator George W. Norris put over single-handed in Nebraska, seems to be taking hold everywhere, for the excellent reason that it is a completely logical and sensible proposition.

The weaknesses of democratic government are nowhere more apparent than in the average state capital. State government has grown expensive, inefficient, and unwieldy.

To a large extent this is because we cling to a device invented by the British back in the days when the power of the throne was a thing to be feared.

In theory, the British House of Commons and House of Lords represent very different groups. The former gets its authority from the people, the latter from the crown.

Working side by side, they are supposed to act as checks on each other so that neither class can legislate to the detriment of the other.

Because of that theory, the American state legislature has two houses. All reason for the division has vanished; what we have now is best described by Senator Norris, who calls the two-chamber legislature "as useless as a wagon with five wheels."

"You cannot have a two-house legislature," says the senator, "without in reality having three, for the conference committees that must be set up to iron out differences between House and Senate constitute a third body.

"Moreover, it transacts its business in an un-American and undemocratic manner. Its meetings are held in secret; there is no such thing as a roll call, and there is no record of its proceedings.

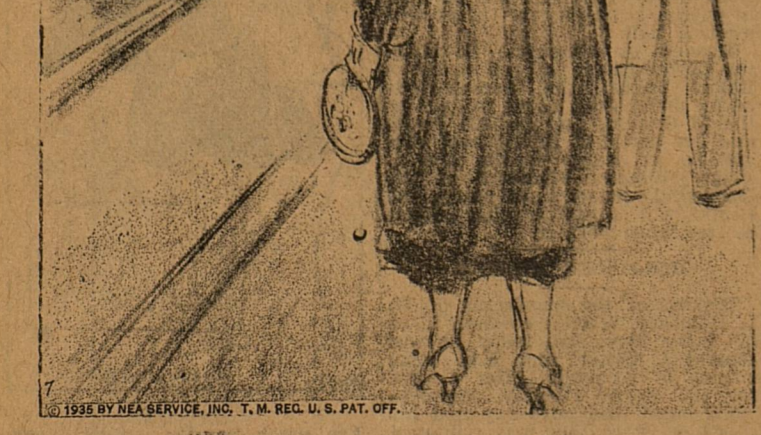
"A bill once referred to a conference committee cannot become law unless it is agreed to by a majority of the conferees. Thus it is within the power of the conference committee, in secret and without a record vote, absolutely to prevent legislation and to kill or to modify at its pleasure any proposed legislation within its jurisdiction."

The lever which this gives to special interests to block legislation designed for protection of all citizens is too obvious to need comment; so, too, is the opening which it gives to all kinds of political chicanery and thimble-rigging.

Once the public awakens to the merits of the single-chamber plan, it is a safe bet that state after state will follow the lead of Nebraska.

While the nation feels sorrow for the Macon disaster, no one would display grief if some of the smaller gas bags in Congress would bump against the ceiling and explode.

The Hauptmann jury has decided to stay off the stage, which probably saves the audience the ordeal of bringing in a verdict for electrocution.

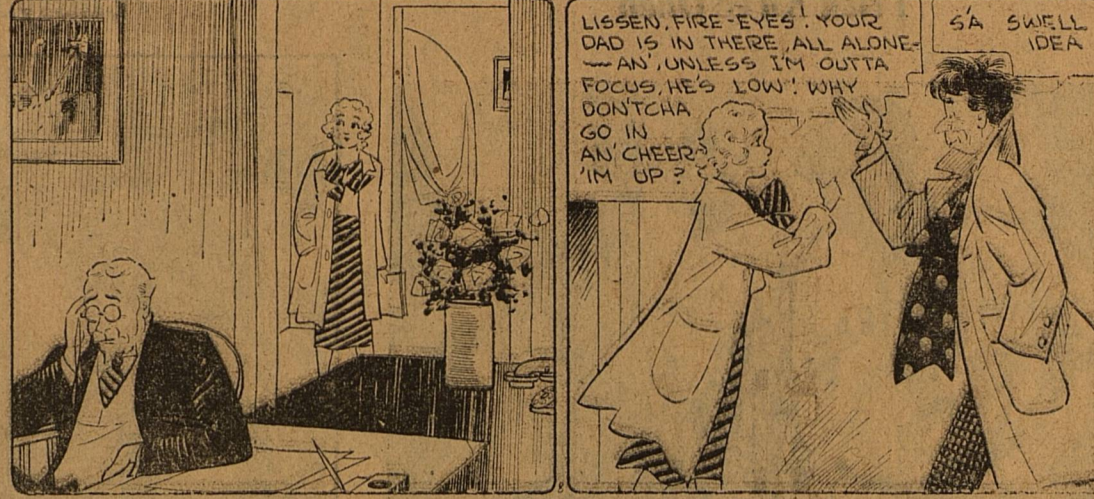

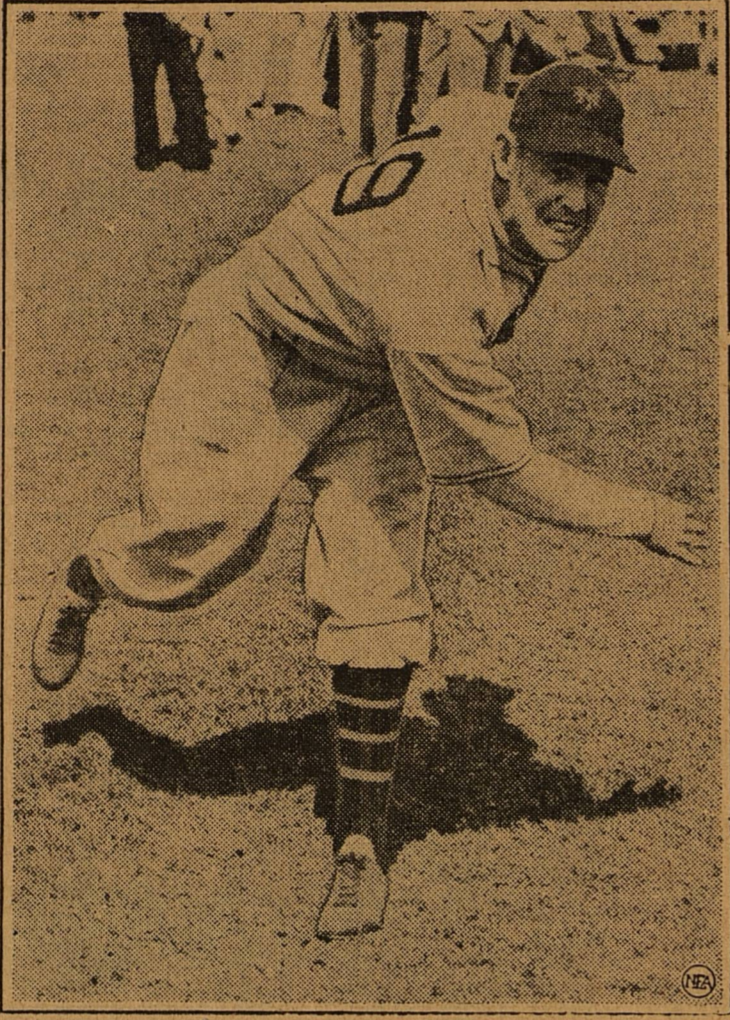

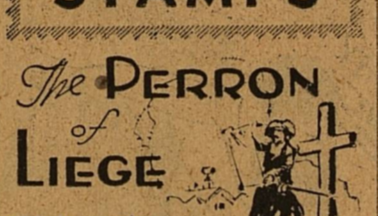
