CUBAN STATE OF WAR

HAVANA, Mar. 11. (P).—The government of President Carlos Mendieta, seizing a weapon forged more than a year ago by one of its enemies, declared the existence of a state of war throughout Cuba today in its battle to escape overthrow.

The decree provides for trials in councils of war for all persons arrested for acts against the public order, prohibits all
