FUHRMAN'S NEW PRODUCER GOOD FOR 1500 BBLs.

May Develop Into a Big Producer; Is Deepening

Gulf Production Company No. 103 McElroy, far and away the world's deepest drilling operation was reported drilling ahead this morning below 12,308 feet in search of Ordovician production in western Upton county.

Another deep test, John I. Moore No. 1 McDowell, wildcat Ordovician operation of northern Glasscock county, is in gray shale below 9,560 feet.

Fuhrman No. 2-B Boner, first of what could be classed as large producers in Andrews county, is scheduled to resume drilling tomorrow morning below the present depth of 4,403 feet. Fourth well in what has heretofore been a field of relatively small producers, Boner is reported to be good for 1,500 barrels as it stands without shot or treatment, and it is believed that there are two more like subsidiaries yet to be drilled into. Location is 440 feet from the north line and 1,320 feet from the east line of section 25, block A-43, public school land.

House Silver Bloc To Attempt Pass Inflation

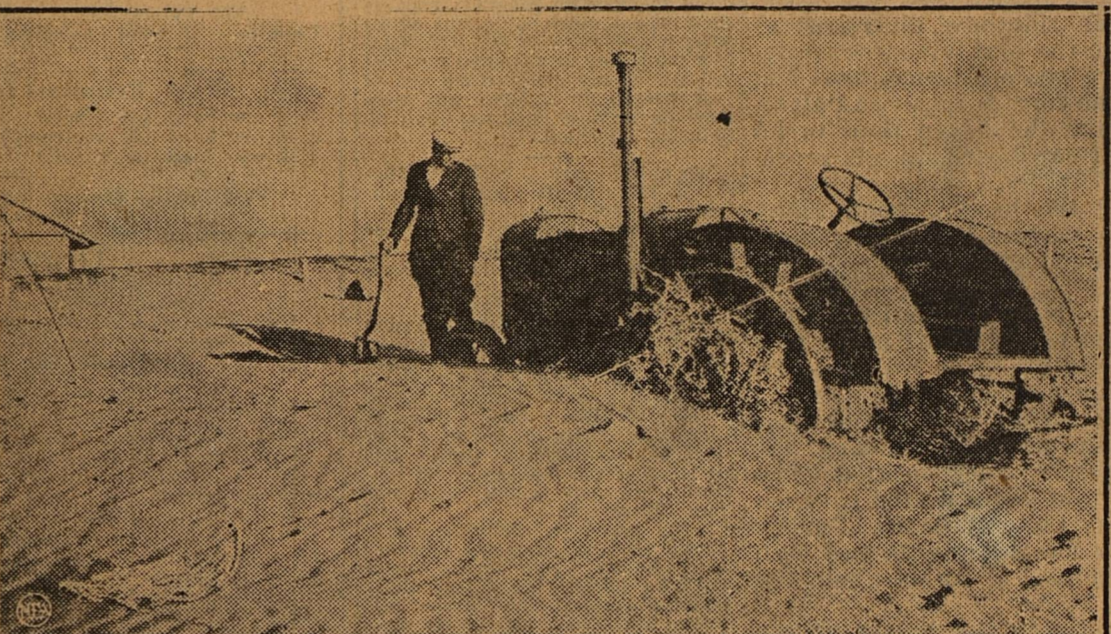
WASHINGTON, Mar. 25. (AP)—House Speaker Byrns today expressed hope for final congressional action on the work relief bill by the week-end after conferring with President Roosevelt and Chairman Buchanan of the Appropriations Committee.

Meanwhile members of the house silver bloc agreed to attempt to force the house for acceptance of the emergency relief bill, especially Senator Thomas' Oklahoma proposal for a moderate silver currency inflation.

HITLER CLOSETED WITH BRITISH ENVOYS TODAY

MacDonald States Treaty Is Not Denounced

Reichfuhrer Hitler, behind closed doors with British envoys was reported today to be insisting that Germany needs an adequate army, navy and air force to defend western civilization from a Russian Bolshevik invasion.

In Geneva, the League of Nations has called a special session for the fifteenth of April to consider France's appeal against the German rearmament program rapidly being pushed by Hitler.

By London Premier Ramsay MacDonald today told the House of Commons that the Treaty of Versailles as a whole could not be considered denounced despite Germany's repudiation of the armament clauses in the treaty.

CHICAGO, Mar. 25. (AP)—An investigation was launched today in an attempt to discover the reason for the fire which Sunday swept the interior of the Club Rendezvous in Morton Grove in which four men and two women were killed and 22 were injured, two critically.

U. S. BUILDING 30 GIANT AIRSHIPS; COAST DEFENSES

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The navy is conducting experiments that may result in the formation of a first-line defense of thirty flying battleships, the United Press learned Sunday night.

The giant flying planes will carry both bombs and machine guns and will be among the most deadly instruments of war ever constructed.

Much secrecy has been thrown around tests being made with one of these ships on the West Coast. A similar ship now is based at Norfolk, Va., and will be ready for trial flights soon, it was learned. If these two planes prove to be successful, the navy is prepared to pay \$150,000 a piece for a fleet of them, it would take a year to build them.

ROME, Mar. 25. (AP)—Official government communique announced a new combat between Italian soldiers and Ethiopians on the turbulent Eritrean frontier in which one Ethiopian was slain.

AUSTIN, Mar. 25. (AP)—The senate reversed itself today by voting 20 to seven for a constitutional amendment to divide the pardoning power between the governor and the pardons board.

COURTNEY WILL "TURN ON HEAT" AGAINST HOODLUM

CHICAGO, Mar. 25. (AP)—State Attorney Thomas J. Courtney today answered gangdom's challenge of bullets to start on a vigorous campaign to crush all gangs.

The prosecutor who escaped eight bullets fired at him Sunday by two would-be assassins, directed the "turn on the heat" against hoodlums in the city.

Courtney has waged a two-year war on labor union racketeers, outlawing them in violent and rival teamster unions to influence one faction, and the first they expressed today was that they emigrated by his interference with the trucks was the motive for the assault.

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RAINS SUNDAY BRING RELIEF TO DUST STORM AREA

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 25. (AP)—Revolving rains fringed the parched Southwestern Plains country Sunday, bringing partial relief from smothering dust storms that have harassed inhabitants and live stock and retarded crops.

The greater part of the drought area, however—the mountain plateaus—received no moisture. The relieving rains were accompanied in many sections by destructive hailstorms, cloudbursts and electrical displays. Three persons were killed in Oklahoma, where skies were clearing.

DUST PNEUMONIA ARGUED

Controversy as to whether a series of pneumonia deaths were attributable directly to the dust led the Colorado Board of Health to send out a National Guard airplane into the southeastern corner of the State to take cultures up to two-mile altitudes.

Illness that has resulted in scattered deaths throughout the dust-battered territory has been attributed to pneumonia by lay residents. Physicians have disagreed whether the dust directly causes pneumonia. Special germ culture plates will be exposed at successive 1,000-foot levels in the dust-laden skies by the plane occupants.

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EUROPE AGAIN DANCES WITH "RED DEATH"

The society folk of gay Vienna have found machine guns and target practice a diversion just too ducky for words, according to recent news dispatches.

One cable has it that such sideshow diversions as shooting galleries, introduced to the best Viennese circles recently by young Fascists, have made a tremendous hit; and finally, at a great ball in the former Imperial Palace, ladies in evening gowns deserted the dance floor to let fly with machine gun bullets at cardboard targets representing enemy soldiers.

Everyone, apparently, had the best of good times, and the home of the Strauss waltzes found machine-gunning much more fun than dancing.

This sort of thing, of course, is nothing but the froth which any spirited society is apt to throw off every now and then, and there is no sense in taking it too seriously. But to read about it, against the background of the war threat which is steadily rising higher and higher over Europe, is to get a creepy and uncomfortable feeling.

Edgar Allan Poe once wrote a story entitled "The Masque of the Red Death." It told about a land ravaged by a horrible plague known as the red death. Sundry titled folk locked themselves in a remote castle and with feasting and dancing tried their best to forget about the plague outside.

But it couldn't be kept out. At the height of the merry-making, the dreaded infection suddenly appeared in their midst, and the revel abruptly dissolved in a frantic scramble as ladies and courtiers fled vainly from the destroyer.

There is something about this story from Vienna that reminds one of that tale of Poe's.

No red death menaces Vienna. The threat is infinitely graver. Unless every thoughtful student of modern affairs is mistaken, war in Europe today would bring in a new dark age. Famine, revolution, massacre, the collapse of government and the decline of all those graces which make modern society worth while—these are the prices that Europe would inevitably have to pay.

Each month sees the war clouds mount higher on the European horizon. And well-to-do, cultured, intelligent folk, who ought to be moving heaven and earth to avert the danger, find it amusing and "chic" to play with machine guns . . . dancing the masque of the red death, while the fatal infection draws nearer and nearer the castle.

A HERO IN PEACE

Records of the United States army list a great number of heroes, and nearly all of them are men who faced great peril on the field of battle. But there are a few who performed their deeds of heroism in time of peace, and one of these was James Hildebrand, who died in Atlanta the other day at the age of 80.

Hildebrand was one of the buck privates who, in 1901, volunteered to aid Dr. Walter Reed and his associates in the research that made it possible to bring yellow fever under control. The scene was Havana, where yellow fever was almost disrupting the army.

Some of these men slept in beds just vacated by men who had died of yellow fever, wore the dead men's clothing, ate out of their utensils, and made every other possible effort to be infected.

The others lived in the most hygienic surroundings, but submitted to bites by fever-infected mosquitoes. In this way it was learned definitely that the mosquito transmits the infection, and control of the disease was made possible.

Few men in our army's history dared more to accomplish greater ends than did this man Hildebrand and his buddies.

An Italian reports the discovery of four planets beyond Neptune, and immediately named two for Mussolini and King Emmanuel. That assures Italy some surplus territory for its fast growing population.

Editor's Note: Wm. E. McKenney, secretary of the American Bridge League, has arranged the following chart of the new international scoring rules for contract bridge. The code becomes effective April 1. For ready reference at the bridge table, it is suggested that you cut out this chart and mount it on cardboard.

THE NEW CONTRACT BRIDGE SCORING Effective April 1st, 1935 RUBBER BRIDGE

Table with Trick Values, Undbl., Doubled, Redbl. for Clubs or Diamonds, Hearts or Spades, No Trump (first trick), and (each succeeding trick).

Table with Not Vulnerable and Vulnerable columns for Undbl., Redbl., and Trick value (100, 200, 200, 400).

Table with Not Vulnerable and Vulnerable columns for Undbl., Redbl., and Trick value (100, 150, 150).

Vulnerability does not affect points for odd tricks nor points for honors.

Table with Not Vulnerable and Vulnerable columns for 2 game rubber (700 points), 3 game rubber (500 points), and Unfinished rubber—Winners of one game score 300 points.

Table with Not Vulnerable and Vulnerable columns for Small Slam (500, 750) and Grand Slam (1000, 1500).

Premiums for honors, game and slams are the same, whether the contract is undoubled, doubled or redoubled.

Table with Undbl., Redbl., Undbl., Redbl. columns for 1st undertrick (50, 100, 200, 400) and Each additional (50, 200, 400, 600).

GARDEN GATE GOSSIP

What is the most practical annual that can be grown? This question has aroused interesting discussion in garden club circles. Most gardeners agree that the most practical annual is the one that gives the most flowers over the longest period for the least effort. But there are varying opinions.

The purpose for which a plant is grown is a basic point in the discussion, whether for garden display, for cutting or a combination of both. For garden display the preponderance to date seems to favor the petunia. It gives more bloom over a longer period with less trouble than any other annual, but is not so good for cutting.

For a combination of display and cutting, over a long blooming season, the zinnia seems to be high in favor. Close to the zinnia comes the marigold, objection to its narrow color range of yellow, orange and brown red being made by some; but color is a matter of personal taste. Shirley and other annual poppies are much in favor, but objections are their very short season of bloom and the difficulty of using them for cutting material. For cut flowers alone, the aster is highly regarded.

All these are annuals that every garden should have. They come in a great variety of form, coloring and height. The zinnia ranges from little button flowers to giant rivals of the dahlia. The marigold varies from the huge flowers of yellow, orange and red to the tiny little flowers that spangle the ferny foliage of the dwarf tagetes signata pumila. Older annuals highly favored for cutting are scabiosa and salpiglossis. Annual larkspurs are highly recommended for cutting, and are highly decorative in the border. Your selection of annuals should be based both on values for cutting and display. Some are of little value for cutting but highly decorative. Others are magnificent material for cutting. Both kinds are needed in the well balanced garden. Each year sees new colors and improved types in fine annuals worthy of trial.

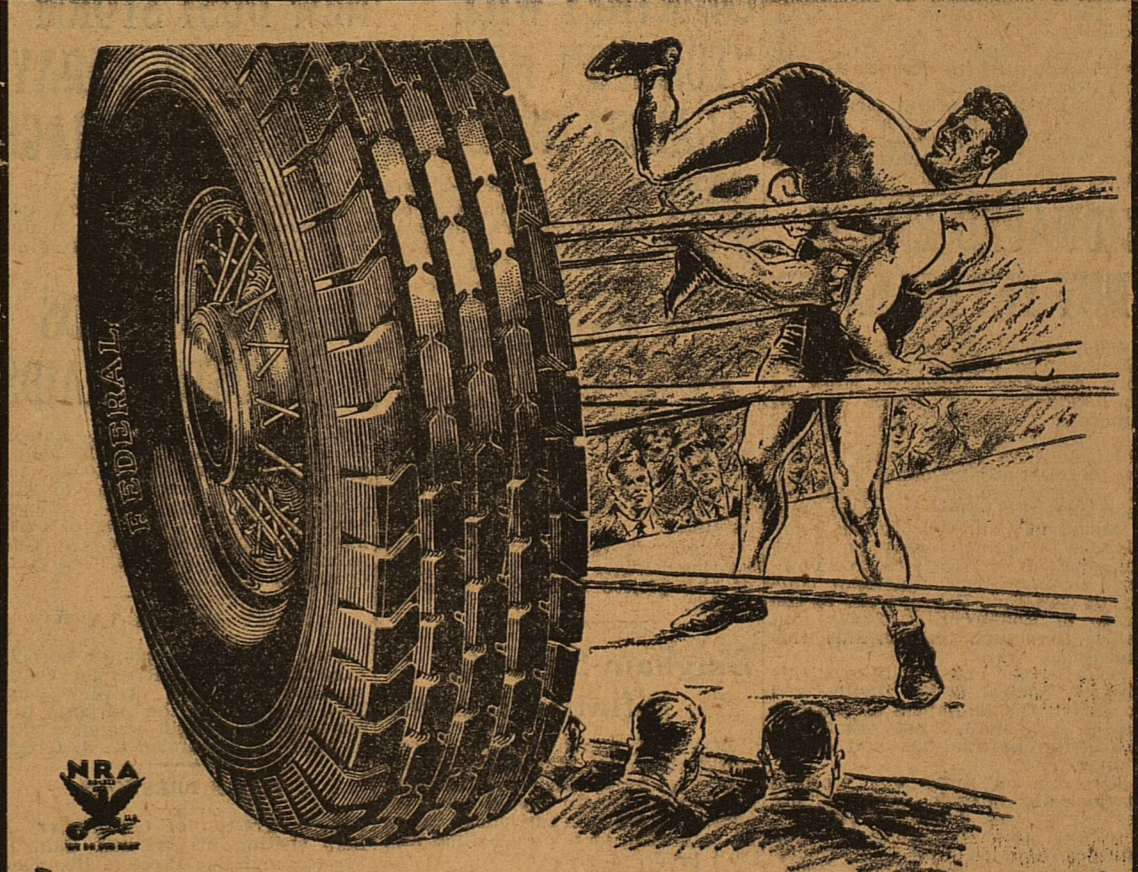
Electric Train Cuts Rome Run

MIDLAND PLACED IN NEW DISTRICT

Midland High School has been placed in a new football district, according to information received here from University Interscholastic League officials. The new district comprises a part of the old district 12-B and will be known as district 7-B in region G. Teams in the new district are Crane, Odessa, Wink, Pecos, Midland and Stanton. The teams which have been in the south half of the old district were formed into a separate district at the same time. Maria Big Lake, Iraan, Fort Stockton, Rankin and McCamey will compete in the newly formed district 8-B.

Production of Planes Increases

Producing 1,615 aircraft in 1934, the aeronautics manufacturing industry of the United States exceeded the production totals of 1932 and 1933, and halted a downward trend which had continued since 1930, the Bureau of Air Commerce of the Department of Commerce announced today.

In the last six years the annual totals of aircraft produced have been as follows: 6,193 in 1929; 3,437 in 1930; 2,900 in 1931; 1,246 in 1932; 1,324 in 1933 and 1,615 in 1934. The increase is particularly noteworthy in small civilian airplanes of the types suitable for private owners. This is shown by the statistics on airplanes of 2, 3 and 4 places—sizes mostly commonly purchased by private owners. In the past three years production for domestic civil use in those categories has been: 426 in 1932, 501 in 1933 and 637 in 1934.

Most Convicts

AUSTIN, (U.P.)—More natives of Oklahoma were convicted of felonies and sent to the state penitentiary last year than any of the 45 states represented except Texas. Oklahoma's contribution of 113 native sons brought its representation to 242, equal to that of Louisiana which last year contributed 99. Texans increased the total 2,211 to 3,711 of the 4,949 American born convicts. Two hundred and sixty-five were foreign born, of which 230 came from Mexico.

New Sea Scallop Bed Found

BEAUFORT, N. C. (U.P.)—Fishermen venturing 20 miles off the North Carolina coast have discovered a new source of revenue—the sea scallop. Heretofore they have found that particular variety of scallop only in small numbers. Among the choicest sea foods, the sea scallop usually brings a high price. In an effort to find out where they spend their winters, approximately 30,000 chimney swifts have been tagged.

9 each; six built 2 each; and seventeen established manufacturers produced one each. In addition, 114 other firms and individuals produced one airplane each. The report of aircraft production is based on the Bureau's record of licenses, identification marks issued for unlicensed aircraft, and reports as to military and export production. There is a possibility that there still may be a few aircraft manufactured in 1934 for which licenses or identification marks have not yet been sought.
