



EXPERTS STILL BELIEVE IN THE BATTLESHIP

Decision on America's ship-building policy at the coming disarmament conference is complicated by the fact that there is still a good deal of uncertainty about the type of ships the American navy ought to have.

Naval authorities in the main stand firm for a fleet ships, seasoned by a considerable number of heavy cruisers. Yet there is a wide belief that the battleship has outlived its usefulness, and that the terrific expense of maintaining these costly vessels is one the navy might very well avoid.

A facetious republican columnist says: "It is now being demonstrated in economics that a blue eagle sitting on a beautiful door knob is a beautiful domestic scene, but produce no chicks."

Add to this the growing feeling that airplanes and submarines are revolutionizing naval warfare, and you have a situation in which decision on a naval program would be difficult enough, even if it were not necessary to adjust our program to the programs of foreign powers.

A good exposition of the theory that the battleship is still the backbone of the fleet came recently in a public address by Rear Admiral Joseph K. Taussig, acting chief of naval operations.

America, says Admiral Taussig, needs the battleship because of its lack of naval bases—the battleship, with its wealth of heavy guns, serving as a kind of floating base which can protect lighter ships against superior

Furthermore, says Admiral Taussig, the improvement of the submarine and aerial branches of naval warfare has made the battleship even more indispensable than before. It is the only warship which can be armored and protected sufficiently to withstand the shock of bombs and torpedoes.



It's really the stuffing rather
than the turkey that smells so good than the turkey that smells so good on Thanksgiving morning, perfuning the house with its steamy fragrance of sage and thyme. Personally, I can never see why folks go to such trouble to think up new kinds of striffings when the old-fashioned bread and egg combination, properly seasoned, is so absolutely the one perfect accompaniment to most fowl.

But there are tastes and tastes, as we mustn't forget. Besides there are a few general rules to remember—that turkey and chicken, for instance, require a less highly-flavored stuffing than duck, goose and guinea fowl. By the same token, highly flavored fruit stuffings are appropriate for duck, goose and guinea.

When to Use Onion Stuffing When to Use Onion Stuffing.
My favorite old-fashioned bread
stuffing is the foundation for a
number of other good fillings. You
want to gild the lily. Simply add
mushrooms, chestnuts or onions to
the basic rule. Any of these sturfings except the onion are suitable for all fowls. Never use onion stuffing with turkey or chicken.

Season lightly, with salt and pepper and add pineapple juice to make moist.

Trussing the Turkey

Trussing your turkey is important because it adds so much to the final appearance of the bird when it is placed before the host.

Trussing is done after stuffing. To truss, first draw the thighs close to the body and hold them by inserting a long skewer under the middle point, running it through the body and out through the other side. Cross ends of drumsticks and fasten securely with a stout cord. Fasten cord to tail. Second, place wings close to body with tips pushed over first joint, making triangles on the sides of the turkey. Hold then with a second skewer forced through wings and body. Draw the neck skin under the back and sew with a soft cord.

Next, take the cord holding the drumsticks to the tail, cross it and draw it back and forth around each end of the upper skewer. Tie string securely in a knot and cut off end.

Allow four hours for roasting a ten-pound turkey, about 25 minutes to the pound. Roast in a moderate oven—375 degrees F. Place breast down on the rack of the roaster. Even with a covered raster it's a good plan to baste every half hour with 1-2 cup butter melted in 1-2 cup boiling water. Sprinkle with salt and perper when turkey has been in oven thirty minutes. Allow 1-2 teaspoon salt to each pound of fowl.

When ready to serve, remove the skewers, cut the cords and place turkey breast side up on a large hot platter.

house. A dark stairway may cause a serious fall . . . using a match or candle in a dark closet may start a fire . . . poor light in the kitchen often causes cut fingers.

One of the best safeguards against household accidents is plenty of light. Fill those empty sockets so that you can have light anywhere in the house you need it, when you
