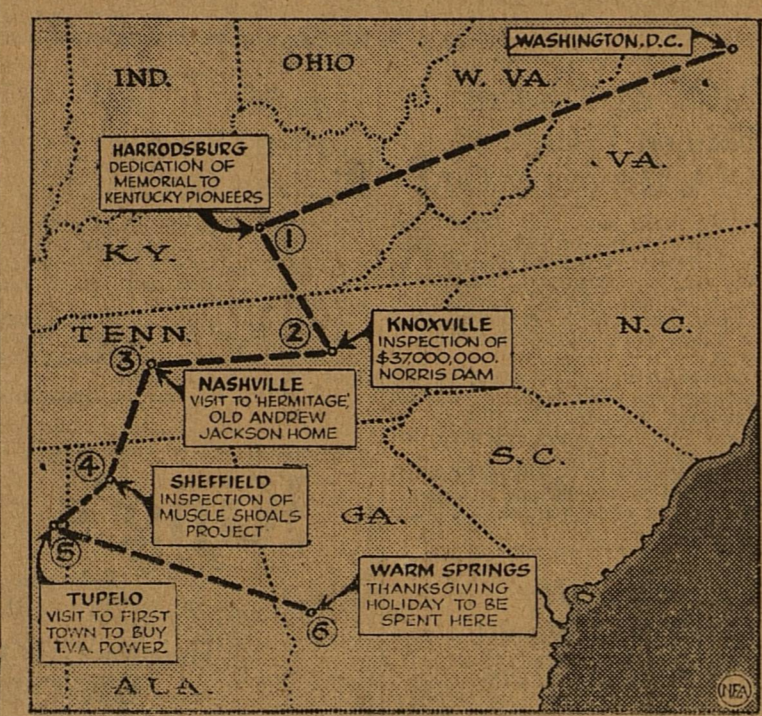

### President to View TVA Projects

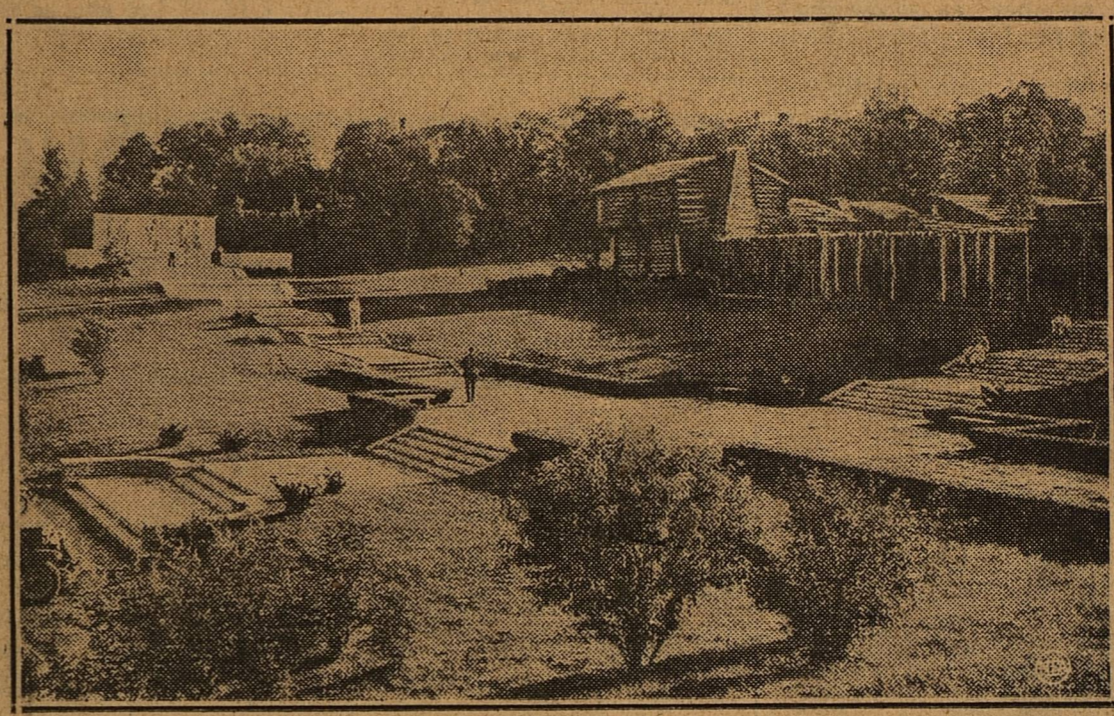

### Dedicating Memorial at Harrodsburg, Kentucky

HARRODSBURG, Ky., Nov. 16. (U.P.)—President Roosevelt today called for a new pioneering on the part of the nation to meet the challenge of a changing world. He said the "mere survival" depends upon development of such a spirit today. The nation's executive was speaking at the dedication of the memorial to George Rogers Clark. The appearance here was the first step in the president's trip of inspection to the Tennessee Valley where federal projects are advancing on a large scale.

### SAYS DUTY OF GOVERNMENT TO PREVENT THEFT

Suggests Forcing of Compacts Between the States  
DALLAS, Nov. 16. (U.P.)—Harry M. Dawes, Chicago, president of the Pure Oil company and brother of the former vice president, Charles M. Dawes, was the first witness before the congressional investigating committee here today. He suggested federal legislation authorizing a compact among oil producing states, with the federal control features eliminated. "No controversial theory is involved in the demand for regulation of oil production," he said. "It is the duty of the government to prevent one man from stealing the property of another man."

BRUSSELS, Nov. 16. (U.P.)—A cabinet crisis which all eyes watched because of its possible bearing on the gold standard of currency became serious today when Henri Jaspar, foreign minister, announced his inability to form a government.

An appeal for a better understanding and greater cooperation on the part of the citizenship in connection with the Better Housing program was made yesterday in a message from F. F. Elkin, local housing chairman, to the Midland Rotary club. The message, read by Joe Pylon, was as follows: "At a joint meeting of the Lions and Rotary clubs, on the occasion of the visit of Mr. Stuart representing the Better Housing administration, it was unanimously decided to undertake the promotion of a Better Housing program for Midland, and committees were appointed for that purpose. It was several weeks before literature and other supplies from the administration were received, and so the field work is just now getting under way.

### EXECUTIVE ISSUES THANKSGIVING ORDER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (U.P.)—Prior to leaving Washington last night for Harrodsburg, Ky., and thence to the Tennessee Valley, President Roosevelt issued a Thanksgiving day proclamation, calling upon the American people to observe this day as a day of thanksgiving for the betterment of mankind. "This should be done, he said, 'with gratitude in our hearts for what has already been achieved.' The text of the proclamation follows: "I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim the Twentieth day of November, 1934, as a day of thanksgiving for the people of the Nation.

### BIDDLE NAMED ON LABOR BOARD

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (U.P.)—President Roosevelt today appointed Francis Biddle of Philadelphia to succeed Lloyd K. Garrison as chairman of the national labor relations board, it was made public today.

Strict adherence to the new order from the Texas relief commission affecting aid to families having members who buy alcoholic liquors or who gamble will be given here, it was declared today by relief officers. The order says that work relief only may be given such families.

### Governor Approves House Tax Measure

AUSTIN, Nov. 16. (U.P.)—Governor Ferguson today sent the secretary of state house bill number six with her approval. The bill sets up a "permanent" system of discounts for early tax payments and penalties for delinquent payments and ties the tax system into a knotty problem.

KILGORE, Nov. 16. (U.P.)—The merchants of Kilgore today wired President Roosevelt protesting the court refusal of Administrator Ickes to reinstate the distress gasoline purchase plan. They asked that the plan be reinstated because it would correct the Elex situation, air employment and improve business.

### Magnolia Washes Crude Petroleum

DALLAS—Fred M. Lege, Jr., vice president and director of sales promotion of the Magnolia Petroleum company, announced today that after long experiment and tests Socony-Vacuum and Magnolia have developed a new method of making motor oils by washing crude petroleum.

"The clear mixture is propane-oil which is drawn off. When this warms up to room temperature, the propane bubbles off in the form of gas, leaving a motor oil much superior to any other oil." Lege added.

Lege said this new method of refining motor oil would doubtlessly alter the entire method of present day refining as it produced "an oil so superior as to save millions of dollars for motorists."

"These savings include less oil consumption, less carbon deposit, more gasoline mileage. This new type of oil virtually eliminates carbon in the cylinders as shown by 86,000 miles of test running. At the conclusion of these tests, the pistons of the test cars were clean of carbon, which often proves to be the bane of existence for conference clubs—Centenary.
