One bear cub christened "Pancho" and two fawns named "Villa" and "Acuna" were brought back to Midland.



Over 8,000,000 Lbs. Texas Wool Unsold

Texas Wool Unsold

SAN ANGELO. (P).—More than 8,000,000 pounds of Texas wools remain unsold, according to figures compiled by Press Nichols, agent for the Clyde-Mallory steamship lines, after he had telegraphed or telephoned to nearly every wool concentration point in the state. This count, which revealed hitherto unknown reserves, shows there is nearly twice as much wool on hand as had been estimated by buyers and dealers.

The count revealed also that 32 firms had bought in Texas 32,274,000 pounds of wool and had taken on consignment 21,350,000 pounds this fall. This with the amount on hand gives a state production of 61,897,502 pounds for 1934. Of the wool unsold 5,664,000 pounds is 12 months, 836,000 is 8 months and 1,643,000 is fall wool, a total of 8,263,000 pounds.

The price this fall has ranged from 15 to 24 cents with the higher figure being paid a few days ago by Jim Hill, buyer from Robert M. Pitt and Company, for 160,000 pounds of 12 months wool bought from the Val verde & Mohair Company of Del Rio.

NO USE FOR INEFFICIENCY

The supreme court's decision upholding price-fixing measures by the New York Milk Control Board may well stand as a landmark in the development of our attitude toward the inter-relation of private profit and state super-

The essential part of the decision would seem to be these words: "The 14th amendment does not protect a business against the hazards of competition." In other words, a legislature has a right to use the operating costs of an industry's more efficient members as a yardstick, in reaching a fair price level, and the less efficient members must make the best of it.

Under such a ruling, less efficient firms might well be frozen out. Yet that is precisely what happens in any industry under the free play of competition. The decision simply means that marginal producers cannot expect the state to keep them in business against more skillful or economical competitors.
