The Museum Board could not have made a better selection to serve as their irst Pioneer Queen as she has been a
lif-long resident of the area-moving to life-long resident of the area-moving to
Hansford County in 1921 before there even was a Gruver town (established in Born 23 September 1899, she and her amily came to Sherman County in 1902,
settling in the Spurlock Community setuing in the Spurlock Community
until 1907 when they moved to Strat ford, Texas. Her father, Alfred Wagner Allen, was a farmer; her mother, Mary Kelley Allen, a teacher. Maude was the Maude received her Maude received her schooling at
Stratford, graduating from Strationd Stratord, graduating from Stratiord
High School, and attended college in
Clarendon. She was Clarendon. She was one of those
wonderfully qualified teachers (pre wonderfully quailified teachers (pre education of those six to 18 in one-room school house. Maude taught
one year in the Stevens School in Sherman County.
In 1919, she and Harley Alexander home six miles west and four mile north of what is now Gruver in 1921. They had four children-Mary, now Mrs. David Long of Guymon, Okla
homa; George, who dies in 1935 hama; George, who dies in 1936 ,
Frances, Mrs. William (Buddy) Murrell of Gruver; and David who died in 1961 following a diving accident. and moved here in 1959. The Gruver ders have been an integral part of the community all of their lives. They had children in the Griver schools from 1956 to 1972; and great grandehildren from 1978 to the present. As Maude
