Living Benefits On The Pise

For those of you who assume that you have to die to receive value from your life insurance policy, let it be said here that more money is paid out to policyholders in living benefits than for death benefits. As a matter of fact, the spread between living and death benefits has been widening each year.

Over the past decade, the pay-out of "living benefits" by insurance companies to living policyholders has jeut about doubled - from \$5.8 billion in 1973. The increase was felt every year during the decade.

"Living benefits" amount to 58 percent of all payments

made by life insurance com-panies. The 1973 total in-cluded \$4.4 billion in policy dividends, \$2.6 billion in-annuity payments, \$1 billion in matured endowments, and \$300 million in disability payments under life insur-



NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water develop-ment purposes as the ment purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment re-

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the pro-posed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 mil-lion in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legis-lature; amending and two-thirds of the legis-lature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitu-tion; and repealing Sec-tions 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)
