The Spearman Lynx 7th grade downed a fine Dalhart 7th grade team 18-6 at Lynx stadium Thursday afternoon, before one of the largest crowds in the school's history, ever to watch a Jr. high game. On the opening kick-off, the Lynx ran the ball back to the 40 yard line. After a series of "trick" plays, No. 25 Chuck

Rigdon scored on a hand-off from quarterback Monte George. Rigdon scampered through for the TD with only 1:55 left in the first quarter.

The Lynx kicked to Dalhart, and they returned the kick-off to the 39 yard line. They Lynx defense held Dalhart and forced them to punt on fourth down. Rigdon returned the punt 25 yards to the Dalhart 48 yard line. Sherwood picked up 12 yards, and Monte George threw a pass to Stephen Tindell for another 30 yards, but the Lynx were offside. Stan Sherwood then broke into the open for a TD, but lost the ball after picking up 20 yards. The Lynx recovered and George then threw another 30 yard pass to Stephen Tindell who raced into the end zone for the TD with 3:07 left in the half. Both PAT's failed! Dalhart finally made a first down on a 9 yard pass play (after picking up 7 on the ground), after they received the kick-off. But, in the fading seconds of the half, Dalhart intercepted a pass, and raced 80 yards for a sure TD, but an alert Lynx defender caught the runner on the 6 yard line as the first half ended.

The third quarter belonged to the Lynx, as they held Dalhart on the opening kick-off and took over on Dalhart's 20 after the alert 7th grade defense literally drove the Wolves backward. Rigdon raced for a 9 yard gain, Tindell grabbed a pass from George and raced to the 1 yard line, and Monte George called a quarterback sneak for the final yard to give the Lynx an 18-0 lead.

Dalhart cranked up their offense in the last quarter, and scored to keep the Lynx from blanking them.

# Floyd Starting for Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. — For three years Mike Floyd battled Coach Emory Bellard's first great recruiting crop at Texas A&M. Now that group has departed and Floyd's chance is here.

The 5-10, 170-pound senior split end fills the spot left by four-year starter Carl Roaches. Floyd says he has learned the position and is ready for the job.

"When I was first recruited out of Spearman High School, the A&M coaches told me I might have to wait a while before becoming a starter. That didn't bother me because I knew I needed time to learn the split end position, since I had been a quarterback and defensive back in high school."

Floyd didn't let the possibility of not

playing early discourage him when deciding which college to attend. "Before A&M recruited me I had

hardly heard of the school. When the other recruits and I arrived, they showed us the campus and then took us to a basketball game. We recruits were introduced at center court and the noise was just tremendous. The students' school spirit really sold me on Texas A&M."

Although a reserve, Floyd did letter as a sophomore and then last year, as a junior, he alternated with Roaches, playing split end and bringing in plays from the coaches.

This year, Floyd likely will share time at split end with Randall Teate. The Aggies will again use the messenger system with the split end bringing in plays. Floyd doesn't like alternating but says that it is difficult to study the defensive backs as well as he would like.

Floyd sees massive improvements in the entire Aggie squad.

"The defense has been good here for a long time but this year the offense will be excellent also. We have outstanding backs and an experienced and improved line and our passing game will be better."

Floyd says the incoming freshmen will add depth and also will provide the upperclassmen with tremendous competition.

"Most players are having to work hard to keep their jobs. This keeps everyone keyed up and ready to play. This will help us have a better team than we had last year."

#### Living Benefits On The Rise

For those of you who assume that you have to die to receive value from your life insurance policy, let it be said here that more money is paid out to policyholders in living benefits than for death benefits. As a matter of fact, the spread between living and death benefits has been widening each year.

Over the past decade, the pay-out of "living benefits" by insurance companies to living policyholders has just about doubled - from \$5.8 billion in 1963 to \$11.7 billion in 1973. The increase was felt every year during the decade.

## Baptists Launch Registration Drive

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

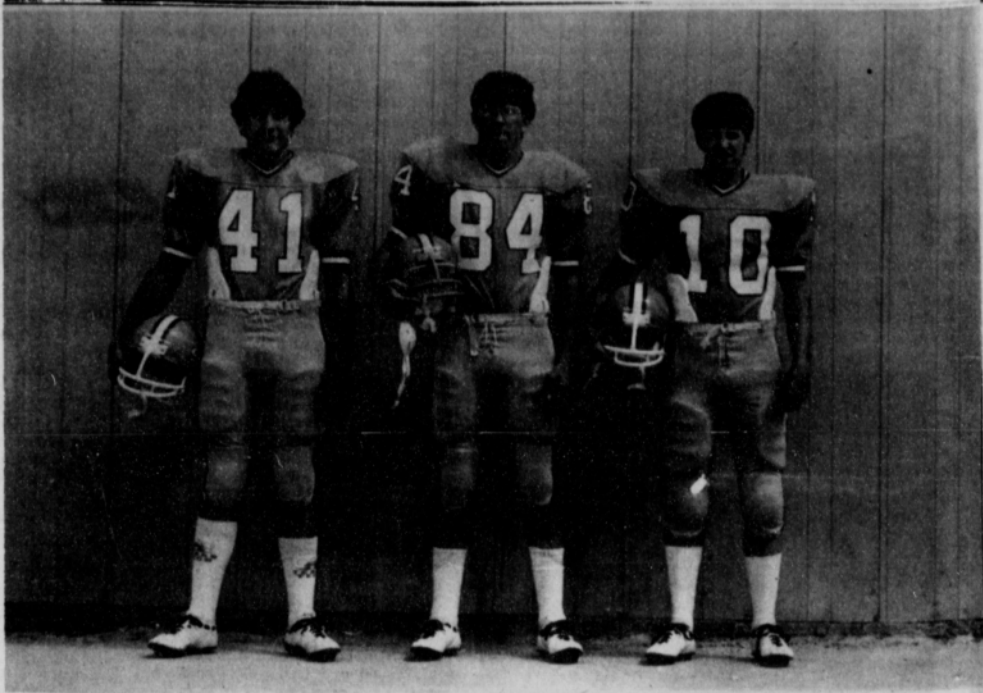

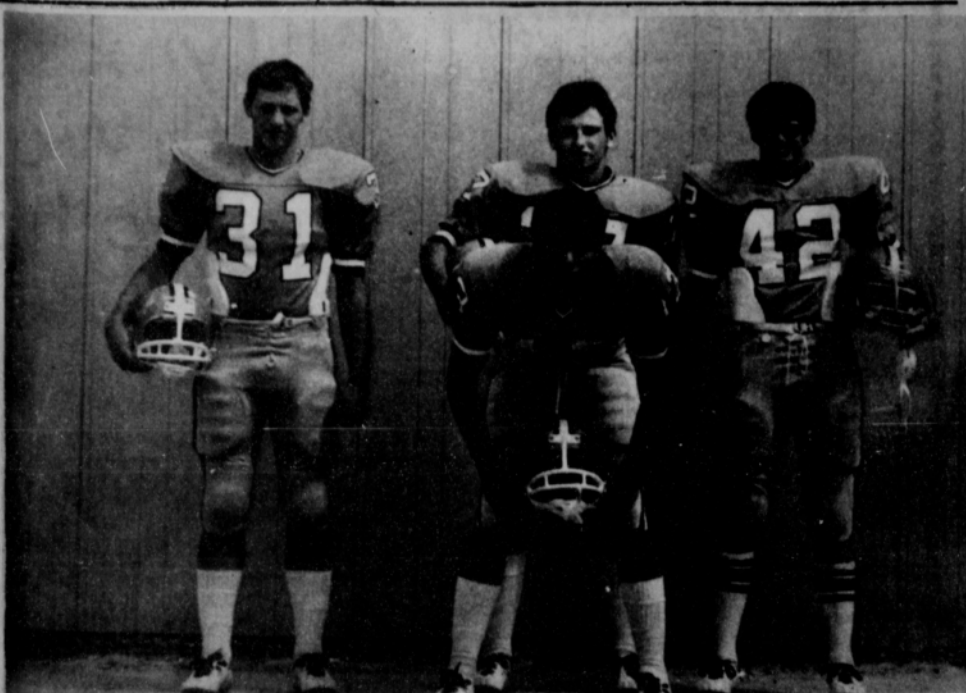

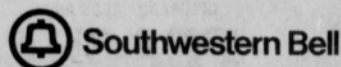
