## WIFE Listens

A multitude of men and women filled the Junior High School cafeteria, Thursday night for the WIFE meeting. Most of the Spearman Chapter members were present, along with visiting WIFE ladies from Gruver and Perryton. Several men also attended.

Joe Dan Bryan, an area farmer-rancher, was introduced. Joe Dan, who has recently returned from Washington, D.C., gave a brief summary talk on his recent trip and answered some of the ladies' questions. He will be the guest speaker at WIFE's next meeting Tuesday night.

Bobbie Novak then introduced the evening's key speaker, Bill Nelson. Mr. Nelson opened his talk with a compliment to WIFE for having chosen what he thought was a sophisticated name, and for supporting some sophisticated ideas. Nelson stated that he knew no one that went to Washington and "got what he went for". He said that when a person or group went to Washington, they usually received a compromise. He pointed out that there was a question as to whether the farm bill coming to the Congress floor would be favorable or not, and suggested that the ladies wait before they make any definite decisions about supporting it or not, until it was written and ready for presentation to the floor.

He commented that the reason for the present drop in wheat prices was not President Carter's fault, adding that on the other hand, President Carter hasn't used any of his presidential powers to do anything about the

plight that the wheat farmer is finding himself in. He also blamed such events like the wheat embargo 2 years ago, and the fact that there has been no wheat export program introduced. Mr. Nelson added that past farm programs were good ones; however if they had been administered well, some of the present-day problems would not exist.

At the end of his talk, Mr. Nelson answered some of the questions that will be raised at any WIFE meeting. These women may not have all the knowledge they need to conduct a successful farm promotion campaign, but they won't have that lack of knowledge much longer. They are asking questions of anyone that will reply with an answer and are inquiring of some that won't answer. WIFE's President wrote a letter to President Carter, asking him why he would spend \$11 billion on a tax rebate program and talk at spending \$4 billion to keep farmers from going broke.

WIFE members from Spearman, Gruver, Perryton, Kress, Bovina, and Lubbock will be going to Washington May 21-May 25. Through the passage of sixty-nine years red carnations have become the symbol of a living mother while those wearing white carnations denote that one's mother has died.

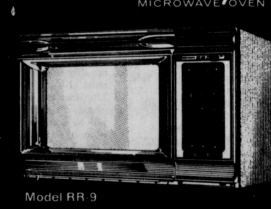

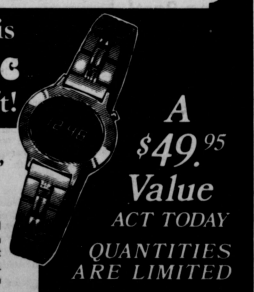

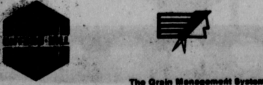

## Private Applicator Certification Training

Hansford County producers will have an opportunity to complete a training program leading to certification as private applicators at a program scheduled for May 9, 1977, beginning at 7 p.m. at the Spearman County Show Barn in Spearman according to Jim Kuykendall, County Extension Agent.

The Private Applicator Certification Training Program, one of the optional means of qualifying for certification as a private applicator of restricted-use pesticides, includes a discussion of laws, labels and labeling, pesticide safety, mixing and calibration and pests and pest damage identification.

The program prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service includes a review of certain questions relating to the information presented. The program will require approximately 3 1/2 hours. Those attending and seeking certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a Request for Private Applicator Certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for issuance of certification.

As an alternative to participation in a training program, an individual may qualify for certification as a private applicator by submitting a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture following a review of self-study materials. The self-study materials may be obtained at the county Extension office.

# Panhandle Delegation Legislative Report

With three days of long, involved debate behind them, the members of the Texas House of Representatives still have to consider two of the five articles which comprise the House Appropriations Bill. When the bill was brought to the House floor, it was some 400 million dollars above what many representatives believed the state could afford, and what the Legislative Budget Board had recommended. The three days of debate have resulted in the cutting of over 150 million dollars from the bill.

The Panhandle Delegation to the House voiced this same attitude...cuts are going to have to be made. As Representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo pointed out, "we have already passed a Highway Bill in the area of 500 million dollars, and still need to pass an educational finance bill, and consider teacher pay raises and teacher's retirement. These expenditures, coupled with the many other bills that are required to run the state, mandate our trimming all the fat we can from this Appropriations Bill."

Simpson emphasized that almost every request for funds made to the House was valid and needed, but, as he also mentioned, "it's the responsibility of the House of Representatives to set priorities in state spending, because there are simply not enough funds available to satisfy everyone." One bill, authored by Representative Simpson, has now passed both the House and Senate.

This measure provides that a notary public commissioned in a county may act throughout the state in an official capacity, in any county. Though this idea is not totally new, it might be noted that there have been attempts, for the past 30 years, to get this concept made into law, with no success for one legislative reason or another. However, it appears now, Simpson will have carried it into statute law.

Earlier this week, five of Simpson's bills were reported out of various committees. Among these were ones concerning corporations, and one addressing itself to the probation of small states. The latter is a bill by Senator Max Sherman which Simpson is sponsoring in the House.

Representative Danny Hill of Amarillo simply stated, "the state cannot continue this type of spending. I wish we could simply give everyone all the money they needed, but it's impossible."

Hill compared the states budget problems to that of an individual. He said, "rising prices and inflation affect the states funds, too. Just as a family sometimes has to cut costs, and sacrifice, so does the state. We simply have to slow down." The Amarillo lawmaker expressed concern over an amendment that he proposed to cut out funds for certain women's programs

and wind energy research at West Texas State University. He said, "of course, we from the Panhandle area are going to fight to defeat this amendment, because of the importance we attach to both. I also hope we can keep the 1.9 million dollars for the Texas Tech Medical School facilities in Amarillo. However, the Senate did not include this in their bill, so these funds could be in jeopardy. Despite all the activity, proposed amendments, cuts, debating, and arguing going on over this bill, I feel the end product will be a measure that will meet the needs of the state.

Representative Phil Cates of Shamrock said, "all the cutting of funds going on was expected and lots of agencies are going on now is a bit like the irrefragible fact and the immovable object. Every member knows cuts have to be, and will be made, but every member is fighting to keep funds for interests he supports and represents. Something will have to give.

Cates added that with a figure of 15.7 billion dollars it's impossible to trim every ounce of fat from the proposed budget bill. With the current budget, he said, "we can only allocate funds with the information available to us during the debates, for it's impossible to oversee the daily activities of each of these to see where every cent goes," said Cates.

Representative Cates' bill that increases retirement benefits for retired peace officers has cleared the State Affairs Committee, and is headed for the House floor. He mentioned this bill will not increase general revenue funding.

Representative Bob Close of Perryton said he believes the House in getting the most thorough look at an Appropriations Bill ever. "Normally we don't see this bill until the last few days of the session. Then it has to be rushed through. With this closer look we are seeing some of the real boondoggles that are present. There have been some displays of temper and nerves this week, but this is only natural," said Close.

House Bill 1774, by Representative Close has passed the House and is on its way to the Senate. This bill would create a water district for portions of Odom and Deaf Smith counties, as a vehicle to try and obtain a water supply. Close added that, "it isn't just a matter of trying to get water for agricultural purposes, but drinking as well. It's a serious problem in that area, and I'm hopeful that this measure can help alleviate the problem."

On the same subject of water, The 64th District Representative is sponsoring a bill that would combine the three major water agencies in Texas. Much interest has been expressed here, because it involves a new

approach in the organization and administration of an agency. There are checks and balances involved much like the state and federal government. "I am hoping it might become a model for other state agencies to follow in re-organization and streamlining," he said.

## Requirements For FIFRA

The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA), as amended, enforced by the Environmental Protection Agency, includes among other requirements (1) classification of all uses of pesticides as either restricted use or general use and (2) certification of applicators (private and commercial) as a requisite to the legal use or supervision of use of restricted-use pesticides.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act establishes an additional category of pesticide applicator, the noncommercial applicator, and requires certification and licensing of each as a requisite to the use or supervision of use of restricted-use as well as state-limited-use pesticides. The commercial applicator as defined by the TPCA means "a person who owns or manages a pesticide application business engaged in the application of restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides to the land of another."

The noncommercial applicator as defined by the TPCA means "a person or government agency or department which wants to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides and does not qualify as a private applicator and is not required to have a commercial applicator's license." Certification is granted by the state regulatory agencies on the basis of a written examination.

Workshops providing training opportunities for those who may seek certification as commercial or noncommercial applicators, will be conducted by personnel of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Dates, locations and times of the workshops will be announced in the near future.

The full implementation of the amended Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act is scheduled for October 21, 1977. On this date, barring any changes in the law, certification will be a requisite to using or supervising use of restricted-use pesticides.

## County Agent News

Grass is sun-loving and is often difficult to grow in shaded areas in the home lawn. But there are a few steps a homeowner can take to improve grass performance in those "difficult to grow" areas, says Jim Kuykendall, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A shade problem can be

lessened by proper pruning of shrubs and trees. This also improves air circulation, which also helps reduce turf diseases more prevalent in shady areas. When pruning, do not top or stub back large limbs but prune selectively to thin out the top by removing branches at their point of origin.

Pruning can be done practically any time of the year, notes Kuykendall. However, the best time for evergreens is late spring or early summer after new spring growth.

Early spring flowering plants should be pruned immediately after flowering. Deciduous trees should be carefully pruned over a period of several years to avoid removing too many leaves at any one time.

Tree roots compete with grass for moisture and nutrients in the soil and also cause it to weaken. This can be even more critical if the overhead umbrella-like canopy of leaves prevent rainfall penetration into the turf below.

While soil moisture is important, keeping the soil constantly wet can also be harmful to both tree and grass roots. A thorough soaking at 7-10 day intervals during the heat of the summer is best. Allow the soil to become slightly dry before watering again.

Regarding fertilization, slightly increase fertilizer rates for a shaded lawn to compensate for the needs of the tree and grass.

After completing the necessary pruning, plant a grass that has shade tolerance, suggests Kuykendall. In Central and South Texas St. Augustine grass is the most tolerant of shaded areas. Plant the grass in the spring after the soil temperature is about 70 degrees F. The

warm soil promotes fast growth and rapid establishment of the grass cover.

Once established, grass in shaded areas should be mowed at least one-half inch higher than grass growing in full sun. This provides a greater leaf surface to utilize available sunlight.

In deeply shaded areas where pruning is not possible or feasible, ground covers are the only answer, contends Kuykendall. Some of the more common ground covers include English ivy, ajava and big-leaved periwinkle. If these won't grow under the existing condi-

tions, the next best solution is to use a mulch of bark or gravel.

### Disabled Vets Field Service Unit Set For Amarillo

As a result of these visits, DAV National Service Officers filed 7,600 new claims and re-opened another 46,000 claims for veterans benefits. A veteran need not be a DAV member to take advantage of this free service.

The project is an extension of the DAV's 50-year-old national service program which provides a wide variety of assistance at no cost to veterans and their families. During the period from July 1, 1975, to June 30, 1976, the DAV was successful in filing favorable claims which resulted in 228,000 individual awards totaling \$495 million in federal benefits.

The DAV employs 280 full-time National Service Officers -- 80 percent of whom are disabled Vietnam Era veterans -- at Veterans Administration installations throughout the country.

"However, the location of some VA facilities makes it difficult for many veterans, as well as their widows and dependents, to personally visit a DAV National Service Office," said DAV National Commander Frank Randazzo. "The DAV's Field Service Unit program carries assistance right to the veteran's doorstep."

Local DAV members are cooperating with the national headquarters of the Disabled American Veterans in bringing the Field Service Unit program into this area.
