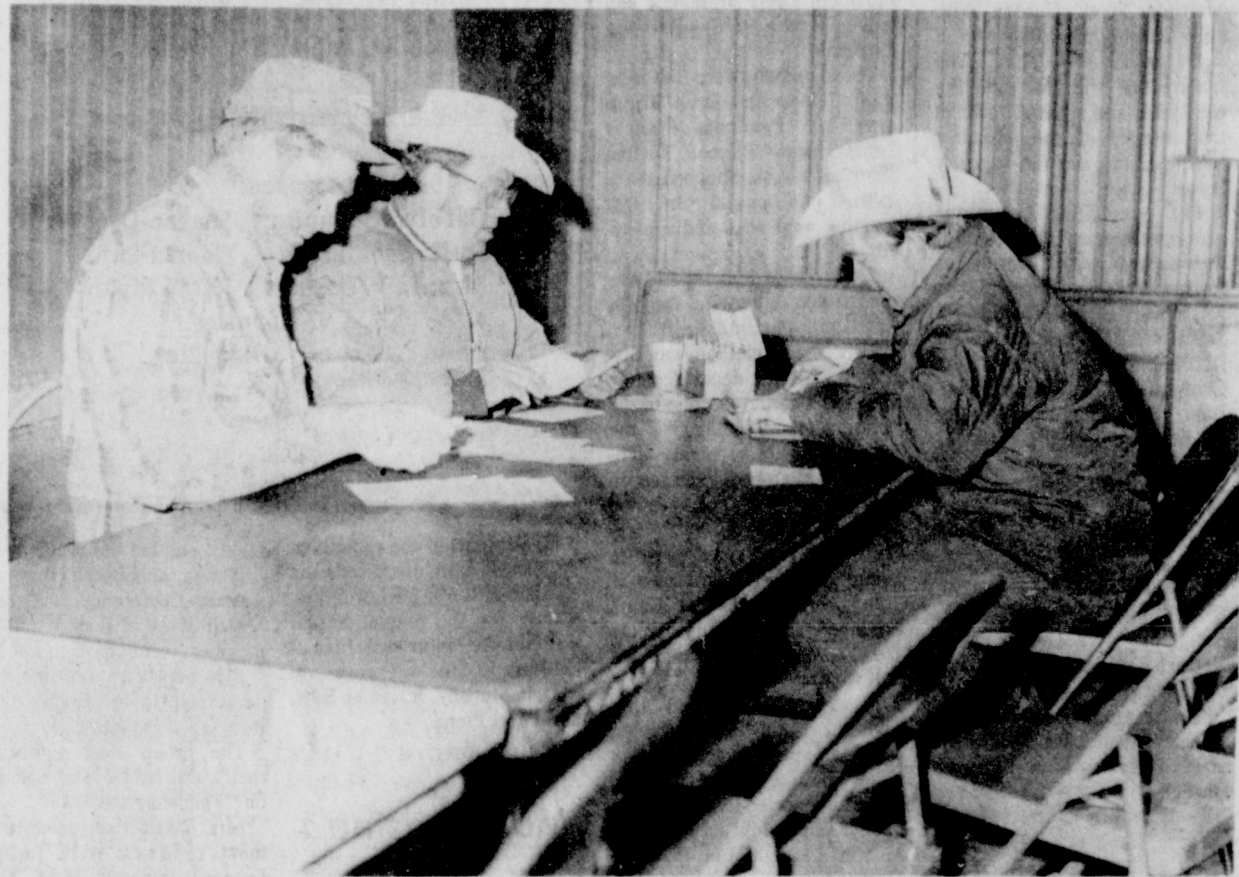

Delay Asked On Nursing Home Decision

Rex Dockery To Speak At Athletic Banquet

Rex Dockery, will speak at the Athletic Banquet in Spearman, April 24th. The banquet will be held at the hi school cafeteria, beginning at 7 p.m. Rex Dockery isn't officially listed in the Guinness Book of World Records, but he probably should be. The listing could read: FASTEST CONQUEST OF AN IDENTITY PROBLEM. Rex Dockery, Head Football Coach, Texas Tech University. When Dockery was named head coach at Tech in December of 1977, the question most often asked was, Rex Who? Well, after only one season,

no one has to ask. In fact, most football folks around the Southwest are spelling it D-O-C-K-E-R-Y. All caps. In his first season at the Red Raider helm, Dockery took a team which most people predicted would finish no higher than eighth in the nine-team Southwest Conference and led it to an impressive 7-4 record and a fourth place finish. The Raiders were in contention for the Cotton Bowl until the final week of the season. Along the way, the 37-year-old Dockery made some impressive, and gambling personnel moves.

The move which paid the biggest dividends was the switch of 6-2, 240-pound fullback James Hadnot from tight end to fullback. Hadnot responded by leading the league in rushing with 1,369 yards. Dockery also established freshman Ron Reeves as his starting quarterback and moved senior Kim Talaferro from defensive tackle to center. Both changes proved successful. For his efforts, Dockery was named Coach-of-the-Year in the Southwest Conference by Associated Press, United Press International, the Dallas Times-

Herald and the Dallas Morning News. He was named the Texas Senior College Coach-of-the-Year by the Texas Sportswriters Association and was District VII Coach-of-the-Year by the American Football Coaches Association. Dockery took over the head job at Tech after serving as the Red Raiders offensive coordinator for three seasons. As offensive coordinator he was recognized as one of the major contributor's in Tech's offensive success. In his first season at Tech, 1975, the Raiders set a school record for total offense and led the Southwest Conference in total offense by averaging more than 400 yards a game. During Dockery's second season, Tech averaged more than 379 yards a game and won a share of the Southwest Conference football title for the first time in Red Raider history. Dockery takes a back seat to nobody when it comes to energetic and forceful leadership on the football field. First, as a 5-10, 185-pound offensive lineman Tennessee, then as a successful high school and now as a proven college head coach, Dockery has left his mark for enthusiasm and hard work wherever he has been. He has earned the respect of his players and assistant coaches alike with a straight forward, honest approach. Says one current player, "With Coach Dockery you never have to worry about enjoying the run round. When you ask him a question, you're going to get an honest answer. He tells you things like they are."

Dockery graduated from the University of Tennessee in 1965, where he was an offensive lineman for the Volunteers. His peers at UT remember him "as one of the hardest workers of all time." The personable Dockery began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Tennessee in 1964. He continued in that role through the 1965 season and then accepted the head coaching job at Harriman, Tennessee, High School. His two seasons at Harriman produced a 15-6 record and helped establish him as a winner. In 1968, Dockery moved to Morristown East, Tennessee, High School. He posted a 19-2 record in two seasons there and led the team to the state playoffs. He returned to the University

of Tennessee in 1970 to coach receivers under Bill Battle. He was a member of the staff which led the Volunteers to the 1971 Liberty Bowl. In 1972, Dockery became offensive line coach at Georgia Tech and the Yellow Jackets went to the Liberty Bowl. He joined the Vanderbilt staff in 1973 and came to Lubbock as the offensive coordinator for the Red Raiders in 1975. His four years at Tech have produced a 30-16 record, two bowl appearances and prospects for a bright future. He already has proven himself an excellent recruiter with a freshman class last season that produced more than 10 lettermen and his acclaim as a head coach has grown in leaps and bounds. To the point, where everyone knows it D-O-C-K-E-R-Y.

Chief Selection Underway

Applications are being considered by the Council for those wishing to be the new Spearman Chief of Police. An area wide advertising program for applicants has been underway and a number of applicants have been interviewed concerning their respective qualifications. The City Council spent some time Tuesday evening in Executive session discussing and interviewing candidates for the position, vacant since January 8th, when Former Chief Steve Wisniewski left to assume new duties in Portales, N.M. Sources at Spearman City Hall indicate that a decision should be arrived at soon. Sergeant Jimmy Jackson has been serving as Acting Chief since the departure of Wisniewski.

Gruver Line To Stay

Some Hansford Hospital Board members looked somewhat critically at monthly costs for a toll free Gruver telephone line for Gruver residents at the Monthly meeting Thursday. A report was given that the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company had recently increased rates retroactively and that monthly regular service rates were in excess of \$90.00 as opposed to the former charge of \$68.00. Questions were raised by Board member Dick Kilgore as to the reasons for the toll free service. Other Board members suggested that the hospital retain the service for the benefit of Gruver patrons who needed to make contact with the hospital or with physicians at the local medical facility. It was noted that in as much as Gruver was currently without the services of a full time resident physician that such telephone service was imperative.

Hansford Hospital District Trustees were apparently prepared to move ahead with discussion and possible recommendations with reference to the proposed Nursing home facility, but deferred to a request that came from the Spearman Minister Alliance to hold up any decision for at least a month. The Alliance members reportedly had met earlier in the month and after a lengthy discussion concerning the Nursing home agreed to send a delegation from its membership to the next Board meeting. However the Ministers did not apparently request that they be on the prepared agenda for the regularly scheduled meeting Thursday. Board President Max Baggerly reported that he had

received a phone call from The Rev. Mr. Frank Oglesby, Minister of the First United Church asking that the Board defer any discussion and action until the Ministers could be in attendance. Mr. Oglesby stated that he had been selected to be the spokesperson for the Alliance in representing its feelings and suggestions to the Hospital Board. There was some discussion as to why the Ministerial Alliance had not carried it's recommendations to the Medical Committee of the Chamber of Commerce. That group had met several times to receive community input concerning the feasibility and need for an extended nursing home facility. The next board meeting will apparently be scheduled for Thursday April 12.

Hospital Equipment Upgraded

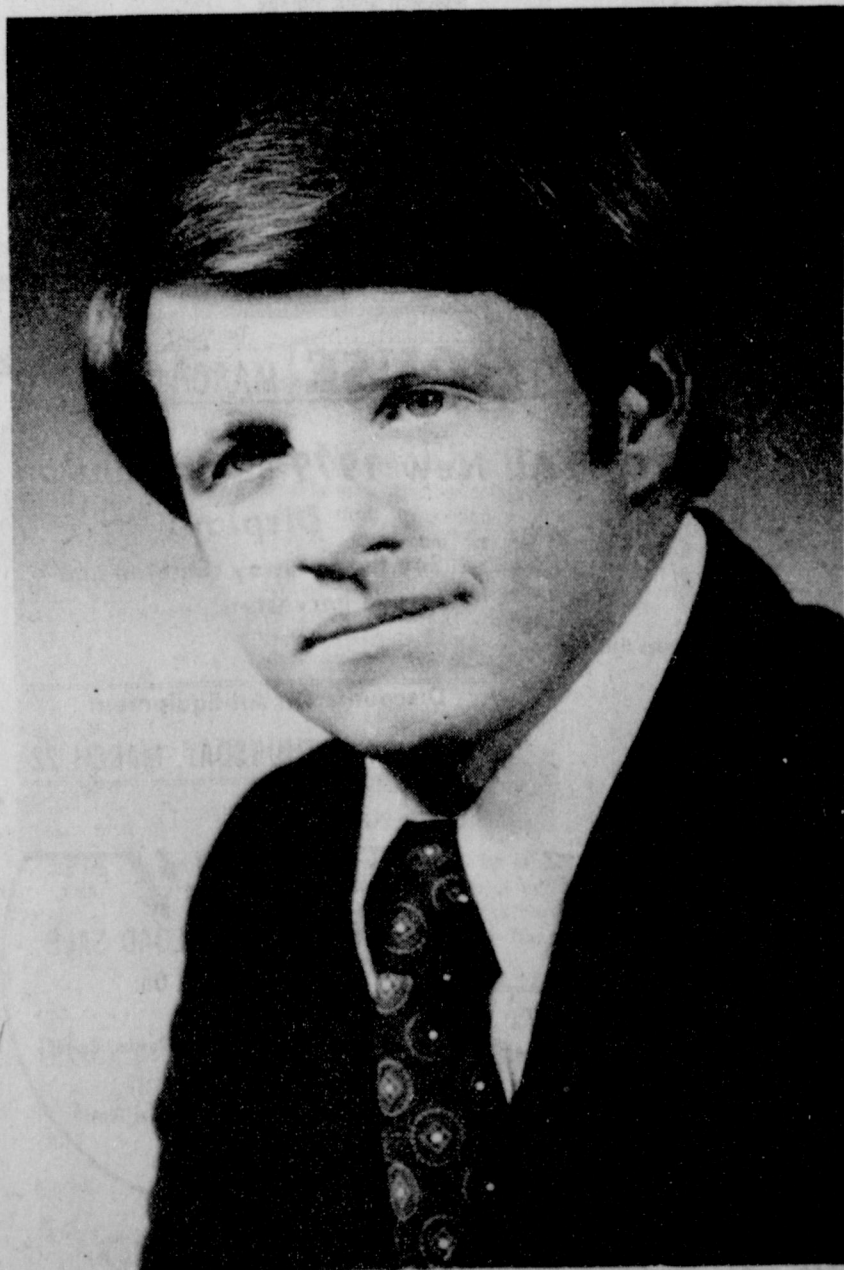
A gift of approximately \$2500.00 donated by the Pink Ladies of Hansford Hospital will provide the nucleus of funds necessary to purchase an excellent piece of equipment for the Operating room. A Day Star Light will be purchased from a California Based firm and will replace an older light now in use. Hospital Administrator Jerry Taylor reported that the Day Star Light is tremendous step forward equipment wise in the Hospital. The actual light has been on lease to another hospital and if new would cost the local Hospital in excess of \$8,000.00. It is one of the better types of Operating room lights used anywhere in the country. The Board voted unanimously to accept the gift from the Pink Ladies.

Mrs. Helen Etter told the Plainsman that the \$2500.00 was raised this past Christmas season through donations to the Operation Christmas Greeting project undertaken by the Pink Ladies of the Hospital. The pink Ladies have donated many pieces of equipment for the labor room and other entities in the hospital, and said Mrs. Etter "We are so happy that our gift this year is going to such a needed purpose." She added her appreciation to the supporters area wide of the Operation Christmas Greeting project. In other equipment related action, the Board voted 4-1 to purchase a new Electrical Surgical Knife. The new knife will replace a model, reportedly 25

years old, and for which parts are becoming almost impossible to obtain. The new Surgical apparatus will help reduce Patient costs in as much as it will cut down on the need for time consuming suturing of patients during surgery. Nursing Director Kay McFarlin also stated that it would greatly improve surgical efficiency in the Hospital and would cut down on the Surgeon's time in the operating room. The new piece of equipment has several functions during surgery. It will cost approximately \$2600.00, and was recommended by the Medical Staff of the Hospital. Board president Max Baggerly cast the dissenting vote. Board member Richey Fletcher was not present.

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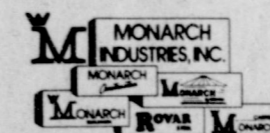
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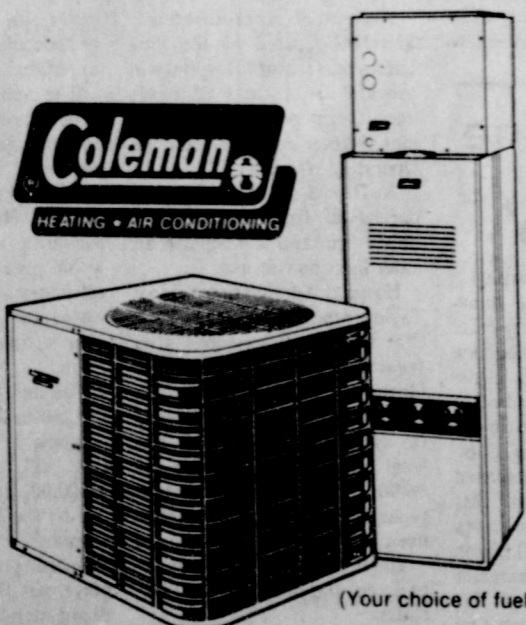

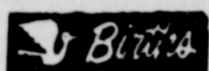

"Set the Pace! Take the Food Way for Good Nutrition" is the theme to be emphasized during March as Nutrition Month.

Exercise and a sound diet are the cornerstones of good health. Good nutrition and regular exercise that you enjoy can cut the cost of health care.

Your know-how about foods and their nutrients can multiply the benefits of physical activity in keeping fit. For starters, begin with minimum servings of the essentials: milk and milk products; meat or an alternate,

such as dried beans and peas, chili, eggs, or fish; fruits and vegetables--one deep green or yellow and one source of Vitamin C; and wholegrain or enriched breads and cereals.

MEAT ALTERNATES-- Dry beans and peanut butter are at the top of the list for meat alternates. However, the amount of these foods needed to provide 20 grams of protein are larger than the usual serving--for example, more than a cup of cooked or canned beans and four and one-half tablespoons of peanut butter.

SPRING FASHIONS -- will bring back "happy days" -- for those who liked the 40's and 50's looks.

In general, spring fashions are slightly tailored--showing fewer ruffles and tiers. They follow a "paring down" trend that sees more close-to-the-body lines--with a big play on legs and waist.

'RETRO' RECALLS 40's, 50's "Retro" is today's word for styling that recalls the 40's--with a dash of 50's.

It means broader, boxed shoulders, pared down slacks and skirts, and cinched waistlines.

SKIRTS--SLITS OR GATHERS Slimmer-cut skirts will show a lot of leg--with slits up the front, down the side or in the back. Soft gathered skirts will continue their popularity.

SUIT-ABLES FOR SPRING Suits will get lots of emphasis--with jackets cut a variety of ways.

We'll see the waiter's jacket, the peplum of the late 40's, the kimona sleeve and a carry-over of the unconstructed jacket from last fall.

PANTS GO TO ALL LENGTHS Tapered pants will stay--and go--to all lengths.

They will range from short shorts to Jamaica's (a little longer than short shorts) to Bermudas (just above the knee).

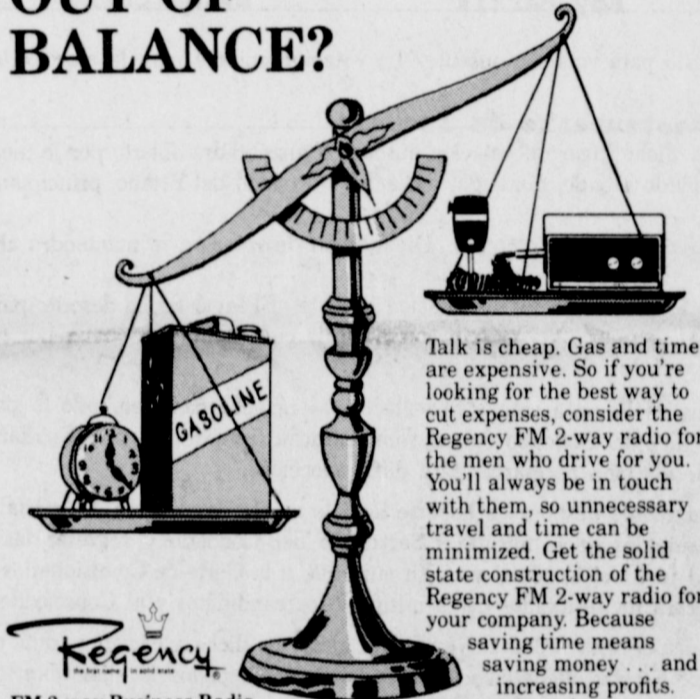

Food Costs Less In Take Home Pay

WASHINGTON--Food takes a smaller bite of your take home pay almost every year. Nationally, food expenditures in relation to disposable income were 16.5 percent for 1978, compared with 16.7 percent for 1977, according to figures by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The figures do not mean food costs less money, but that overall income is rising faster than food costs. Since 1929, as far back as department figures go, food expenditures in relation to disposable income have declined nationally from 23.4 percent, an indication that food costs less today in relation to income than it did almost 50 years ago. This does not mean the "typical" or "average" family spends 16.5 percent of its take home pay for food. A family of four with \$10,000 take home pay will spend about 35 percent of its disposable income for food. A family of four with \$30,000 in take home pays spends about 10 percent for food. While the decline is continuous over the long run, the percentage of expenditure rises and falls year by year. Food expenditures were greatest, at 25.7 percent of disposable income, during 1948. They were lowest, 16.3 percent, in 1972 and 1973. The total includes food eaten at home and away from home but not foods consumed by the armed forces, meals eaten on airlines, provided through de-

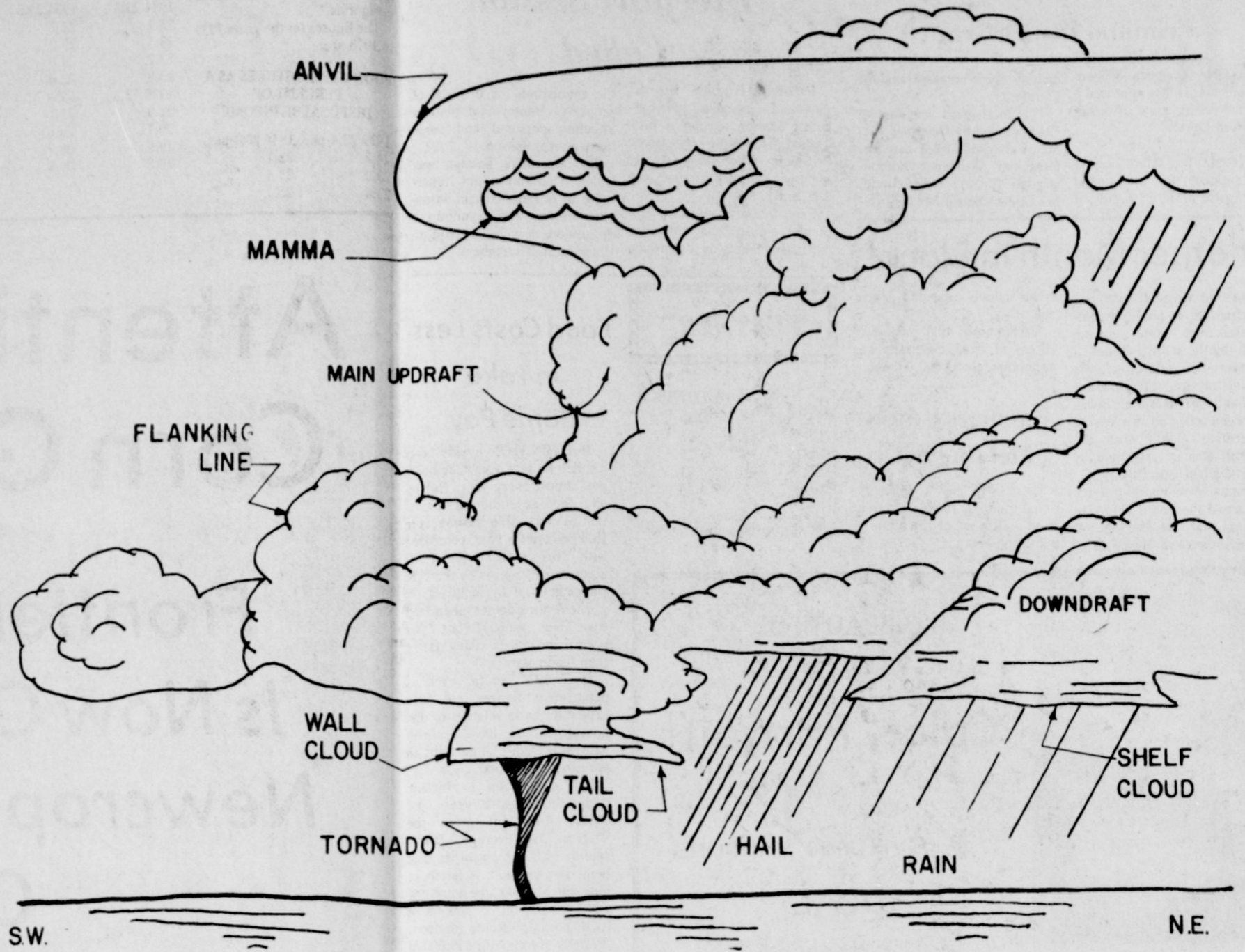

TYPICAL TORNADO-PRODUCING CLOUD--The form of the usual tornado-producing cloud is anvil-shaped at its crest with a rougher overshooting top at the dome. Mamma, which appear to be balloon-shaped formations, may drop from the anvil shape. At ground-level the common appearance is rain falling from a shelf cloud, usually in the northeastern portion of the parent cloud. Southwest of this there will be a wall cloud, sometimes with a horizontal tail cloud at the forward or northeast lower portion of it. This tail cloud is not the tornado. The tornado itself forms typically at the southwest lower edge of this wall cloud. Behind the tornado there is not likely to be rain, but, instead, a precipitation-free cloud base.
