

Local Girls Get 41 Trophies For Beauty, Talent Shows

Local girls captured 41 trophies during competition in the state Cinderella Pageant and the International Model and Talent Association (IMTA) competition in Denton June 26 through July 1, said Teresa Hargis, sponsor.

In the IMTA competition the girls were judged on how they modeled and what they were wearing, Hargis said. In the talent division, they were judged

on execution and difficulty of the act and overall appearance and ability, she said.

Melissa McLain walked away with the trophy for Cameo Girl in the 9- to 10-year-old age group. This competition was judged on beauty alone, said Hargis. Melissa also won third place in tap dancing and third in street dress.

DeAnna Smith was the Sweepstakes winner in the 9- to 10-year-old group. This award

goes to the girl who receives the most points overall in her division, said Hargis. DeAnna also received first place in evening gown, party dress, swimwear and sleepwear competitions.

DeAnna won second place in the novelty dance, jazz dance, sportswear and street dress.

Katina Brock won first place in the tap and jazz dance competitions in the 5- to 6-year-old categories. She also placed

third in the swimwear category. Jill McLain received first place for her tap and jazz dances in the 9- to 10-year-old group. She also received third on her novelty dance.

Tamara Ratliff won first place in the twirl competition for the 11- to 12-year-old group. She also received a second place rating with her tap dance.

Tammy Donahue won first place in both the evening gown

and street dress competition for the 13- to 14-year-old group. She came in second with her jazz dance, twirling, ballet and as Cameo Girl. Tammy won third in sportswear competition.

Cathy Ratliff walked away with the first place trophy for twirling, jazz dancing and modeling swimwear in the 15-year-old and older group. Cathy also received second for her novelty dance, modeling sportswear and was second as Cameo Girl.

She was also the Sweepstakes winner in her age group. Tammy Donahue, Kelly Harper, and Teresa Hargis received a second place trophy for their dance in a group competition.

The state Cinderella Pageant drew 112 girls from across the state, but local girls survived the pageant to become eligible to participate in the International Pageant to be held Aug. 6 to 12 in Baton Rouge, La.

Melissa McLain, DeAnna Smith, Jill McLain and Kelly Harper are eligible to compete in the international contest.

Melissa won as Overall Photogenic Girl in the Miniature Miss Division; DeAnna won third alternate and Jill won fourth alternate in the Miniature Miss Division, which includes girls 7 to 9 years old.

Kelly became second alternate in the Teen Division, which

included girls from 13 to 17 years old. Tamra Ratliff won the Best Sportswear Award in the Miss Division, which included girls 10 to 12 years old. Cathy Ratliff won the Best Song and Dance in the Teen Division.

In the state pageant, the girls had an interview with the judges, then competed in sportswear, party dress (evening gown for teens) and talent contests, Hargis said.

Twenty Building Permits Granted

The City of Spearman issued 20 building permits during the first six months of 1978, according to the records of Lenis Simpson, City Manager.

During the month of January, three permits were granted for additions, alterations or conversions for housekeeping residential buildings. Total cost of the construction was \$18,500.

No permits were given during February.

In March, three permits were granted for the building of one-family buildings with the total cost of construction \$68,

000. Permits for two new mobile homes were granted at a total cost of \$20,000. Permits for two new industrial buildings were given with the total cost of construction \$20,000.

During April, two one-family house permits were issued. Total cost of the construction was \$62,500. One mobile home permit was given at a construction cost of \$1,500. One permit for the addition, alterations or conversion of a housekeeping residential building was given with construction cost being \$500. Additions, alterations or

conversion to two other buildings were permitted at a total construction cost of \$30,000.

In May, one permit was given for addition, alterations or conversions to a housekeeping residential building with a construction cost of \$5,000.

In the month of June, two permits were granted by the City for additions, alterations or conversions to housekeeping residential buildings at a total cost of \$13,000. One permit for the alterations to a business was granted for a construction cost of \$500.

Grasshopper Eggs May Prevent Spraying Insects

Grasshopper egg laying season may come between a rancher and his grassland this season, as damaging grasshoppers must be sprayed before the eggs are laid for the extermination efforts to have effect, said Garland Stewart, county extension agent.

If the grasshopper eggs are laid before spraying, the older grasshoppers will probably die soon and the problem will have to be dealt with next year, Stewart said. Egg laying season will probably begin before July 15, he said.

A federal program to help ranchers with extermination efforts is being planned by government officials to aid in spraying county rangeland with undiluted Malathion.

The program will be a "co-operative agreement" between the state, federal government and the land owner, said Stewart.

The program is "strictly for rangeland" and doesn't cover cropland, said the agent.

The grasshopper situation is getting critical, he said. Spraying will begin "as soon as landowners can get together" and commitment fees can be collected from cooperating ranchers, he said.

Cost for the rancher for the program will probably be be-

tween 50 to 60 cents for each acre to be sprayed with Malathion, said Stewart. This will cover the landowner's one-third of the cost of the program. Cost in Ochiltree County is 55 cents for each acre, he said.

Federal inspectors with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) have inspected various parts of the county and found as many as 16 grasshoppers in a square yard of grassland, said Stewart. The spraying is economical when eight grasshoppers can be found in selected square yards, he said.

Most of the higher counts of grasshoppers follow the Palo Duro Creek, said Stewart, with the largest counts in the northeast part of the county.

He said he is trying to get the inspectors to return to check the western part of the county. After farmers agree to the

program, weather conditions must be considered before spraying can begin, he said. Although temperature is important, the wind is the major factor because it must be "perfectly still" for the mist of the spray to fall correctly, he said.

Temperatures should be around 85 degrees for the spraying to be most effective, said Stewart.

Sprayers from surrounding states as well as local sprayers with the right equipment are being contacted for bids to do the spraying, he said.

Stewart said he didn't believe the spray would hurt animals in the areas being sprayed, but he wasn't sure about the effect on other insects.

If weather conditions are not right before egg laying season begins, the landowners' money will be returned, he said.

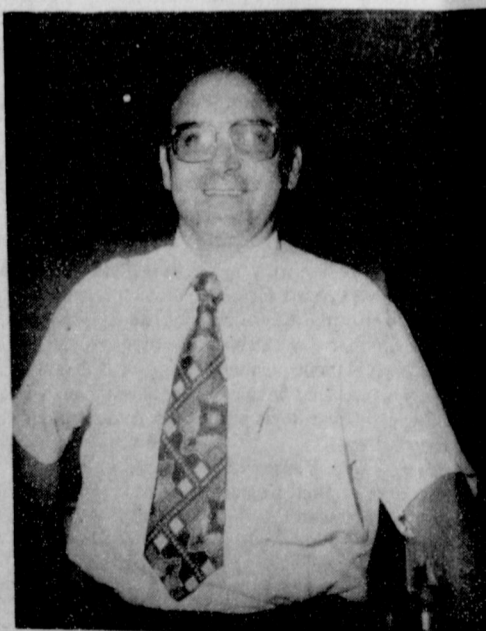

Quashing Cancer Quackery

In an attempt to help quell the rising amount of mis-information on cures and tests for cancer, the Gruver Statesman will publish a series of articles concerning this vital subject.

The first in the series is concerned with the background of cancer quackery and some information released by the American Cancer Society research division on this matter.

According to recent figures released by the American Cancer Society, annually over a half million people in the United States develop cancer. At the present time only one in three is cured through the use of accepted methods of cancer management which include surgery, radiation, and chemotherapy. The other two who are not cured are prone to exploitation by quacks who use worthless tests and treatments.

This one fact makes cancer quackery one of the biggest businesses in the United States. The U. S. Food and Drug Administration has estimated that the public spends in excess of two billion dollars yearly on worthless cancer tests and treatments. Besides this economic toll, the loss of lives due to delay in early diagnosis and the institution of proper treatment cannot possibly be estimated.

Cancer quackery surprisingly enough dates from the very beginning of our country. In 1784, General George Washington regarded and publicly commended a Mrs. Johnson for her recipe to cure cancer using a mixture of garden sorrel,celandine, persimmon bark, and spring water.

Unproven methods of cancer management cover a wide range of materials, methodology, and rationale. Among the simpler ones are escharotics (corrosive or caustic agents) used to treat external cancer; natural products such as cobwebs saturated with arenic powder applied as poultice to "draw out" the cancer; clover blossoms, tea, and raw food diets are made that cure is caused by an imbalance in the body and that it may be cured by getting rid of impurities.

Biological products have also come into their share of attention. Through the years hundreds of worthless cancer "drugs" have been developed and promoted as cancer cures. While these drugs, dietary, or device may be harmless in themselves they do waste valuable time while the patient is undergoing these worthless treatments or testings.

Why do people go to quacks? Unfortunately in sheer desperation patients leave the care of competent doctors and place themselves in the hands of quacks.

Ignorance more than any other factor drives patients to quacks. Fear of cancer is universal. Once having been told

they have cancer, they fear they are doomed, believing that all cancers are incurable. The more knowledge the individual has about cancer, the less vulnerable he is to turn to cancer quackery.

Farm Population Shrinks

It isn't that farming isn't big, big business any longer, but that fewer and fewer are involved in this time-honored occupation. The U. S. farm population dropped 5.4 percent during 1977 or by some 450,000 persons according to a startling report issued April 8th by the Bureau of the Census and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

An average of 7,800,000 persons or 3.6 percent of the total U. S. population lived on farms in rural areas of the U. S. during the 12-month period entered on April 1977.

According to Researcher Vera J. Banks of the department's Economic Statistics and Cooperative Service, total farm population averaged a 3.1 percent decline annually during 1970-77. The rate of loss differed markedly by race over this period with a 2.5 percent average annual loss of white farm residents compared with 10.3 percent for blacks.

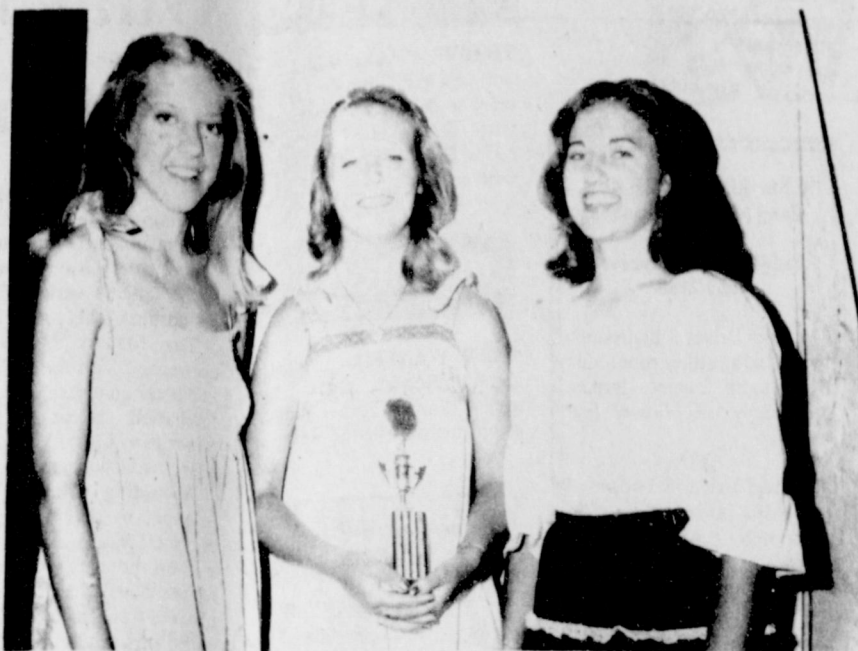

1977 Gross Sales Up

Austin - State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Friday that gross sales in Texas last year totaled \$170.3 billion, up a healthy 19.6 percent from calendar 1976.

Sales for the last three months of 1977 totaled \$51.7 billion compared to \$43.3 billion for the last quarter of 1976.

Computer analyses released by the Comptroller break down reported sales by county and by Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (SMSA).

Totals for the state's 25 SMSA's are further divided into 21 classes of sales, such as agricultural, mining, manufacturing and retail.

Harris County, the state's most populous, recorded sales totaling \$43.5 billion for the year, up 21.8 percent over 1976. Sales in Dallas County were up 20 percent for a total of \$26.4 billion last year.

For Safer Cycling

The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety recently conducted a study of some 888 police reports of bicycle accidents in Maryland, and concluded that cyclists were "probably responsible for the initiation of 78 percent" of the crashes, and that the percentage of "probably responsible" cyclists "diminished sharply with increasing ages over 12."

Researchers said older cyclists were less likely to be the cause of their crashes because they were better able to localize sounds, perceive movements out of the corners of their eyes, and were more competent at reading, understanding and obeying road signs.
