Lamaze Method Prepared Childbirth

Prepared childbirth is a course in which, usually, Father and Mother are trained how to share and experience childbirth as a meaningful experince rather than a trauma.

Lamaze method prepares a woman emotionally, intellectually, psychologically, and physi-cally for childbirth. Lamaze is not childbirth with-

out anesthetic, pain or natural childbirth. It allows mother, father, doctors, and nurses to work together.

Childbirth is a normal and natural function of woman, it is also an intense and challenging experience. A woman who goes into labor and delivery without preparation is very likely to find it a frustrating unsatisfactory experience.

The trained woman recgnizes the birth of a child as a normal, natural observable event. She knows the reason for each part of labor and delivery and looks forward to the birth of her child with understanding and confidence. The woman has been trained how to handle labor and delivery. She knows just what the doctors and nurses want her to do, and understands why. She is not having to face fear of the unkown. She will find labor and delivery not only to be a rewarding experience, but to be very fulfilling and exciting. Women who have prepared for childbirth seem to have easier and shorter births because they are relaxed and don't fight their

The father who participates in the birth of his child finds it to be one of the most fulfilling beautiful monents of his life. Because he is actively involved in the birth of his child he is a part of a team, and is not banished as a germ-ridden, foreign object into the waiting room. He sees his child the moment it is born and hears its' first cry. Sharing this moment birth creates a bond of

Visit Your Local Museum

The Stationmaster's House Museum is a County project maintained by donations and gifts. It is governed by the Hansford County Historical Survey Commission Incorporated. They in turn are appointed by the Hansford County Commissioners Court. This museum is an ongoing project of the entire community.

The museum houses, collects, and cares for social and cultural heritage, yours and mine. It is a place for research and learnings for all.
