**Blast River Road 27-8 here last nite -**

However, it seems to seal a teams doom to get a lead on the Lynx, as the Lynx came rushing back and scored 27 points in the first 2 quarters, and then "waited for the Perryton Rangers" next weeks game which should decide the district 1-AA championship. Perryton defeated Dalhart 22-6, in a one-sided affair.

With 6:05 left in the first quarter, Bodey scampered 25 yards for the Lynx first scoring play. The PAT failed. Again in the first quarter, Newton crashed over from the 6 inch line for a touchdown, with 2:15 left in the first quarter. Boone ran over the try for extra point, to give the Lynx an early 24-8 lead.

With 7:21 left in the second quarter, Bodey scored again from the 6 inch line, and the PAT failed. With 22 seconds left in the first half, Billy Snider dashed 47 yards for a touchdown. Martinez kicked the extra point, and the Lynx had a 27-8 half-time lead. This was exactly the way the final score read, 27-8, as there was no scoring in the last half.

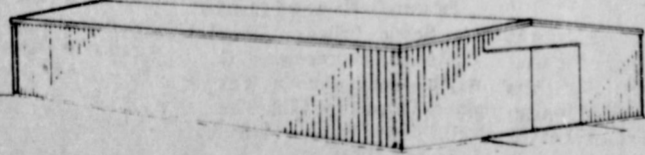

many problems. The policyholder doesn't have any obligation at all to leave things undisturbed. Indeed, on the basis of his insurance he is actually REQUIRED to take any steps necessary to prevent any further loss that may be sustained beyond the original fire. If there is any additional loss because the items were not separated, the insured won't be able to collect.

Protection of property, specifically undamaged property, is of the utmost importance after a fire or some other kind of insured loss. This must be done as soon as practical (with due regard for safety). After a fire, for example, the insured should check and inspect all property that was at or near the flames. All undamaged items should be separated and protected from everything else that was ruined.

In spite of what many people think, it is NOT TRUE that nothing should be touched after a fire. The idea that things should be left alone until adjusters from the insurance company can examine it is a myth. This is a widespread misconception that, if followed, could cause

After this amendment is adopted, I'll be ready to take the lead in the 1979 legislature to follow through on this first step."

**Lamaze Method Prepared Childbirth**

Prepared childbirth is a course in which, usually, Father and Mother are trained how to share and experience childbirth as a meaningful experience rather than a trauma.

Lamaze method prepares a woman emotionally, intellectually, psychologically, and physically for childbirth.

Lamaze is not childbirth without anesthetic, pain or natural childbirth. It allows mother, father, doctors, and nurses to work together.

Childbirth is a normal and natural function of woman, it is also an intense and challenging experience. A woman who goes into labor and delivery without preparation is very likely to find it a frustrating unsatisfactory experience.

The trained woman recognizes the birth of a child as a normal, natural observable event. She knows the reason for each part of labor and delivery and looks forward to the birth of her child with understanding and confidence. The woman has been trained how to handle labor and delivery. She knows just what the doctors and nurses want her to do, and understands why. She is not having to face fear of the unknown. She will find labor and delivery not only to be a rewarding experience, but to be very fulfilling and exciting.

Women who have prepared for childbirth seem to have easier and shorter births because they are relaxed and don't fight their labor.

The father who participates in the birth of his child finds it to be one of the most fulfilling beautiful moments of his life. Because he is actively involved in the birth of his child he is a part of a team, and is not banished as a germ-ridden, foreign object into the waiting room. He sees his child the moment it is born and hears its first cry. Sharing this moment of birth creates a bond of

closeness and appreciation between him and his wife.

Doctors who try this method of childbirth find it to be most helpful in that the woman knows just what to do, usually requires none or less medication than most unprepared women. Surprisingly to some doctors, the husbands are most helpful and not in the way.

Women who have prepared and are allowed to share it with their husbands say they feel their husbands' presence creates a bond with his child from the beginning of its life. Early parent-infant bonding is beginning to be quite an issue. Some believe this early bonding between parents and newborn may also have long lasting effects on the child's development and the parents' relationship with their child.

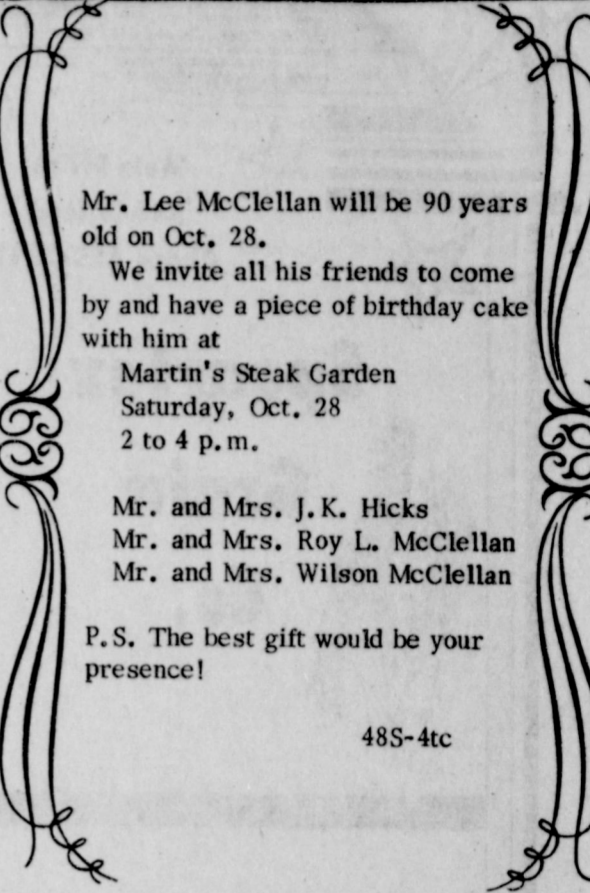
**Visit Your Local Museum**

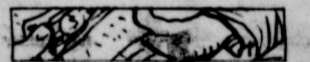

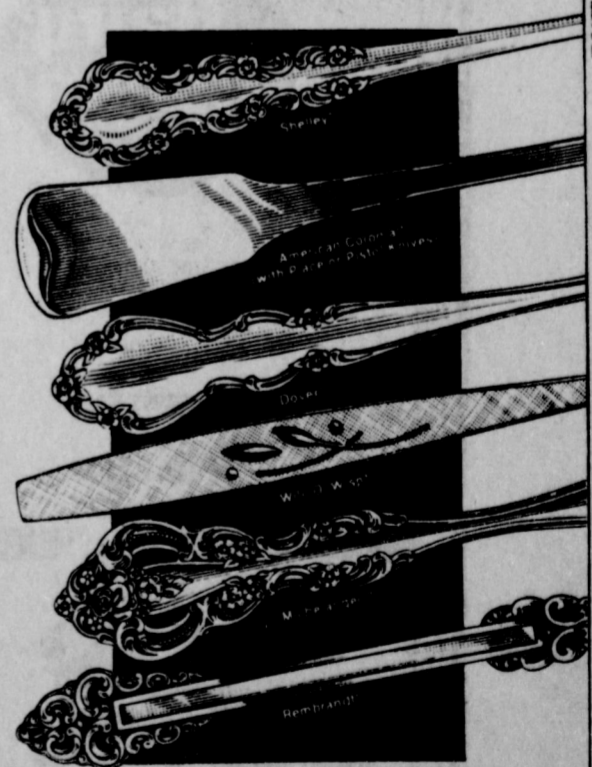


