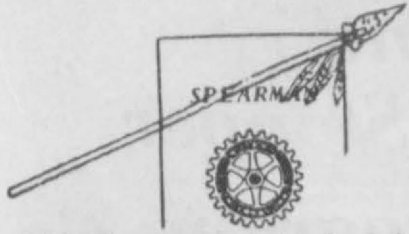

## Digital Switching "On The Way" For Spearman Customers

General Telephone of the Southwest has reached the \$3 billion mark in invested telephone facilities, an investment equating to an average of \$2,550 per customer.

E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of General Telephone, said the magnitude of \$3 billion is hard to comprehend by most people. "That is 3,000 millions or one dollar bills stacked 102 high stretching end-to-end from Los Angeles to Dallas to Miami."

The investment includes expenditures for telephones, switching equipment, cable, operator positions, buildings, truck, microwave towers and much more.

General of the Southwest was formed in 1926. It took 45 years, until early 1971, for the company to reach the half-billion investment mark. Six years later, in 1977, the company reached the \$1 billion mark. It took nearly five years to add another 1 billion, and just four years more to add still another billion.

Langley said during the same periods, the company grew from 7,000 telephones in service at the end of 1926 to over 574,600 customers after the first 45 years, to 754,000 customers in the next six years. To 1,016,000 customers in the next five years, and to the present 1,191,000.

"This milestone is a significant mark for our customer, our company and our employees," Langley said. "To our customers, it is a reflection of the improvements that have made over the

years, such as the move to dial telephone service, direct distance dialing one-party service expansion and Touch Calling in the earlier years, and the progression to the age of stored program control switching, fiber optics and space age digital communications in recent years.

Langley pointed out that in addition to the \$3 billion milestone reached this year, the company is continuing a service modernization program in Spearman and other communities throughout the state.

Digital-stored program control switching for all Spearman customers will become available in the fourth quarter of this year.

Langley said by year end over 70 percent of the company's customers will be served by electronic switching of which 57 percent will be served by digital systems, the ultimate in telecommunication systems.

He continued that the \$3 billion milestone signifies continued growth, modernization and improved service to the customer. To the employees it stands as an accomplishment for their part in building an important segment of the world's best telephone network.

"The rapid increase in investment in the past few years reflects our commitment to meet the growth throughout our service areas, an acceleration of the modernization program, and intensified service improvement efforts," Langley said.

## Texas Department of Public Safety

As many as 45 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the long July 4 holiday period, according to an estimate by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"The mixture of lower gasoline prices and increased travel this summer could prove to be deadly over the July 4 holiday," said Colonel Jim Adams, director of the DPS. "In addition to these factors, travel during the holiday will be made hazardous by the continuing problems of drunken driving and excessive speed."

Last year, 25 persons died as a result of traffic mishaps during the July 4 holiday, but because of the day of the week on which July 4 fell, the holiday period was only 30 hours. This year, the period will be 78 hours, from 6 p.m. Thursday, July 3 to midnight on Sunday, July 6.

Of the traffic fatalities during the July 4, 1985 period, 72 percent occurred in accidents involving excessive speed or drinking.

As in years past, in an effort to hold down the number of holiday traffic deaths, the DPS will conduct "Operation Holiday," in which additional troopers from the Department's uniformed services will be placed on Texas highways for heightened traffic law enforcement and to assist motorists.

Additionally, the Department will conduct its "Operation Motorcade" effort, in which periodic releases will be

made throughout the holiday to keep the public informed about the number of traffic deaths occurring across the state.

"The philosophy behind this program is to make the public aware of the dangers of holiday travel and what motorists can't do to make their time spent on the highways safer," Adams said.

This will be the first July 4 period since the new Texas safety belt law went on the books. Last year, 82 percent of those killed in traffic accidents during the holiday period had not been restrained, either by a safety belt or child safety seat.

"The message in that safety belt statistic is clear," Adams said. "The chances of being seriously injured or killed in a traffic accident are greatly reduced by wearing a safety belt and using a child safety seat for children under four years of age."

Adams said the two restraint laws, coupled with increased awareness of the dangers of drinking while driving, are contributing to an overall decrease in Texas traffic fatalities.

"Preliminary figures indicate the number of traffic deaths statewide was down 1.6 percent in the first quarter of this year compared with the first quarter of 1985," Adams said. "We hope that trend will not be reversed this July 4 period with a number of senseless tragedies."

## Drug And Alcohol Update

Joe and his friends looked forward to enjoying a three-day weekend at the seaside resort where they'd always had such good times.

But now that he and his two friends were newly recovering alcoholics their favorite vacation spot looked entirely different.

For the first time, Joe realized there was no movie theater in town, no place to go sightseeing. About the only attraction was a local disco where people drank more than danced.

Even relaxing at the hotel was difficult since a liquor store was in plain view of their room.

Suddenly, it dawned on Joe that, besides digging for clams, about the only thing he and his friends had ever enjoyed at the resort was drinking.

While Joe retained his sobriety during the weekend, his friends "slipped" soon after arriving and drank heavily for the next three days.

As Joe chauffeured them home Sunday night, he realized that even a vacation -- a time supposedly geared toward fun and relaxation -- presents difficult challenges to the recovering alcoholic.

It's a reality confronted by other newly sober people, including: The man worried that while flying cross-country to visit his children, he'll be tempted by the readily available liquor aboard the long flight.

--The woman dreading the upcoming visit of in-laws who typically begin drinking heavily first thing in the morning.

--The man looking forward to a trip to Hawaii with his wife while still worrying about how he'll function without the support of his Alcoholics Anonymous group and his A.A. sponsor.

Each person is justified in his or her concerns since vacations are traditionally one of the trickiest times for

recovering people.

The challenges arise when those who no longer drink must find other ways to occupy unstructured time. They may also feel insecure while away from their A.A. group or treatment program. And because they're removed from everyday surroundings, they may be tempted to drink without fear of discovery.

But a recovering person can take the following steps before and during a vacation to ensure solid footing on what could be slippery ground:

--Break with tradition and avoid your yearly trek to the resort, campsite or beach where drinking has always been your main activity. Pick a new destination that offers sightseeing, sports or cultural activities.

--Don't vacation with old friends prone to heavy drinking.

--Before arriving at your destination, call ahead to determine when and where local A.A. meetings are held.

--The newly sober person, in particular, should avoid a quiet vacation that leaves time to dwell on the fact he or she is not drinking. Pick a place that offers plenty of activity instead.

--When flying, ignore the person next to you who's on his fourth drink. Watch the movie, read a magazine or listen to the music instead.

--Cruise ships can be especially tricky. Help yourself and other recovering people aboard by organizing your own mini-A.A. meeting. Simply hang a sign in a prominent place that could read, "Friends of Bill W. will meet on A Deck." Other A.A. members will know what that means.

--Carry along inspirational literature such as the A.A. "Big Book" or "One Day at a Time."

## Hansford 1985 Gross Sales \$74,558,008

Despite the recent downturn in the oil and gas economy, Hansford County received some very welcome positive news recently from a report released by Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock. The report showed the county's gross sales for 1985 increased by 9.32 percent over 1984.

Though the percent of increase was not substantial in terms of sheer volume, it did indicate a far more stable economy than many believed. 1986 figures however, are not included in the report.

Hansford County fared better than all area counties. The only area county showing a net increase was Hansford County.

The only other area county showing a net increase was Ochiltree County, which included the town of Perryton, with an increase of 1 percent.

All other area counties showed a decline in gross sales. The most severe decline came in Hemphill County, which included Canadian, with a drop in gross sales of 10.1 percent.

Other area counties experiencing declines in gross sales in 1985 compared

to 1984 included; Lipscomb County with a drop of 8.31 percent, Moore County (which included Dumas) with a 5.64 decline, and Hutchinson (Borger) which was down 4.15 percent.

The State of Texas also fared better than its neighboring oil and gas states in gross sales for 1985. Texas had an increase of 1.02 percent over 1984.

Neighboring Louisiana, despite major problems in the oil and gas field, had an outstanding increase in gross sales of 16.18 percent, but Oklahoma was feeling the effects of the slumping energy field with a 12.23 percent decrease in gross sales. New Mexico, which depends heavily on gas sales, was down 12.25 percent.

## MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR MONEY

The next bull market after this may be a beauty. For two reasons: the amount of cash becoming available to buy shares is mushrooming and the shares available for purchase are dwindling.

Total cash in America now exceeds \$2 trillion. The total market value of all American stocks is actually less than cash on hand. And cash amounts are growing fast.

Within 10 years American pension funds alone may total between \$3 trillion and \$5 trillion. IRA funds represent multibillions more in buying power. Foreigners, too, are putting vast amounts of cash into American stocks.

Meanwhile, shares available for purchase are shrinking. Last year over \$100 billion in shares were withdrawn from the market through corporate acquisitions, companies buying back their own shares and leveraged buy-outs. In the previous year, the total supply of American stocks shrank by \$70 billion.

Conclusions: the huge amounts of cash available to buy shares could possibly create a shortage of shares sometime in the next bull market. That bodes well for share prices.

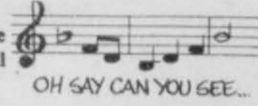

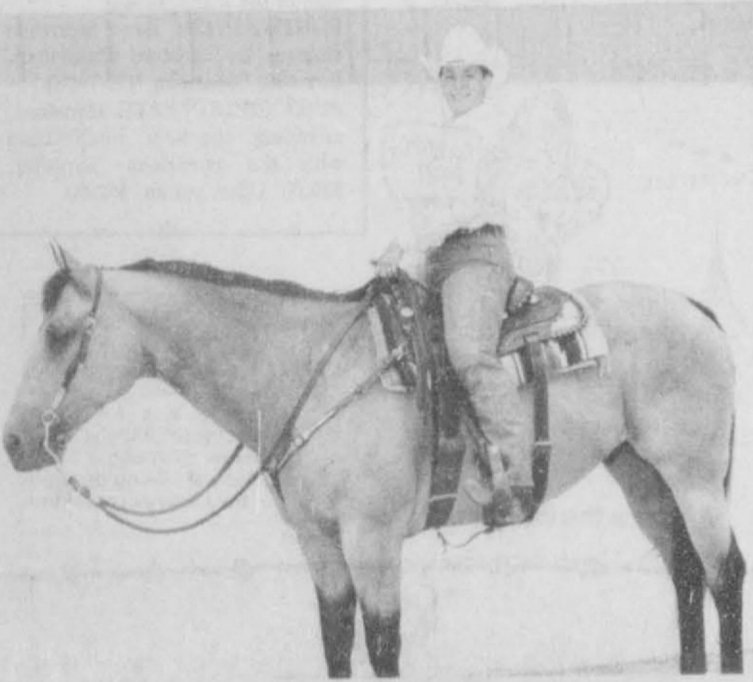

## State Franchise Tax For County

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday checks totaling \$1.1 million were sent in a special allocation of the state franchise tax on banks to 245 cities, school districts and other special districts.

Bullock said the special allocation reflected final adjustments of the new tax as it involved some 1,976 banks and 2,119 local taxing jurisdictions.

The first allocation from the new tax on banks was made in August, and checks totaling \$61.6 million were sent to 1,996 local taxing units.

Most of the taxing units--1,715--were unaffected by the special allocation. Of the remaining jurisdictions affected, money was shifted from some taxing units and reallocated to others.

The Legislature in 1984 brought banks under the franchise tax for the

first time and allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other local taxing units where the banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the new bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

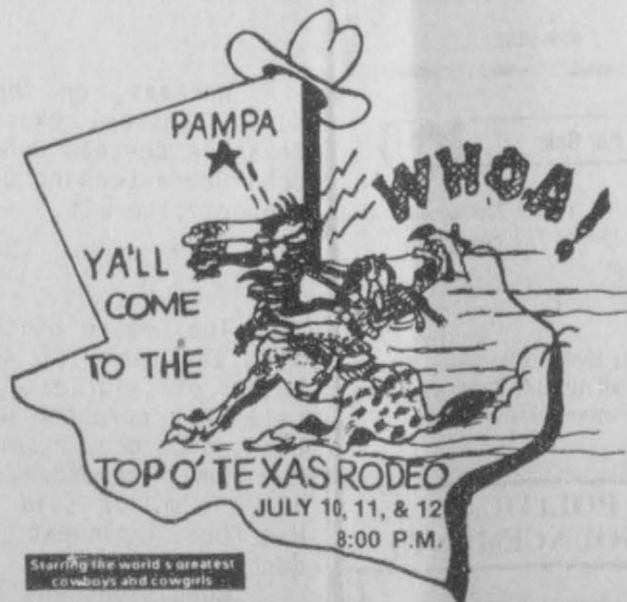

Jane Meeks, Gertrude Archer, and

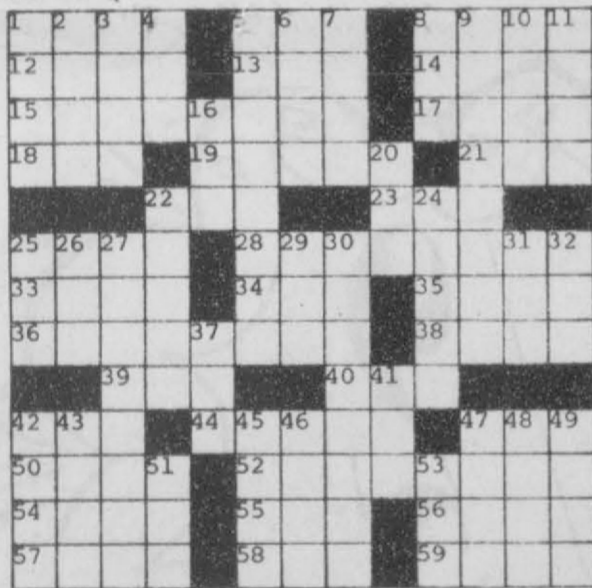

## Bonnie Jarvis to Attend AJQHA

Quarter Horse enthusiast Bonnie Jarvis will be competing at the fifteenth Annual American Junior Quarter Horse Association World Championship Show and Convention in Tulsa, Oklahoma, August 3-9.

Bonnie Jarvis will be among the 1,300 young people, 18 and under from the United States, Canada and Australia, selected to participate in the show. She will compete with her registered American Quarter Horse, Irish Gold Bar, a 1971 Sorrel Gelding in the Western riding at the show.

As an invitational show, participants must have qualified in one of two ways. First, the top ten youth competitors in terms of points earned in an event between May 1, 1985 and April 30, 1986 were invited to compete; and second, each affiliated state junior Quarter Horse Association may send two contestants per event. As only the top exhibitors participate, competition promises to be tough and exciting.

The AJQHA World Show is sponsored by Levi Strauss & Company in cooperation with Tulsa-based Drysdale's Western Wear Store. As the show's major sponsor, Levi's Westernwear division will provide general show funding. Highlights of the AJQHA World Championship Show will be aired

on the Nashville Network, October 20.

State delegates will meet in various committee sessions to conduct the business of the AJQHA, the largest youth horse association in the world, during the AJQHA Convention slated for Sunday. During the Convention, six 1986-1987 AJQHA national officers will be elected to represent the 10,000-plus AJQHA members.

Approximately 40 teams are expected to participate in Friday's judging contest which is open to 4-H, FFA and AJQHA judging teams. Additionally, a variety of social activities are scheduled for the eight days, including a clinic, barbecue and dance and an evening at a water recreation park.

Other features of the Show include the AJQHA Exposition and Trade Show which will be open daily during the Show and features nearly 30 booths. AQHA's booth will be a part of the Exposition where interested parties may request performance and race records on registered Quarter Horses. Numerous equine-related products and services will be on display.

Bonnie Jarvis is the 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Britt and Linda Jarvis of Spearman and will be in 9th Grad at Spearman High School.

## Hansford county 1 percent local tax is up 6.49%

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$54.5 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Houston received the largest check—\$8.5 million—bringing 1986 payments to 73.4 million, down 4 percent from last year. Dallas' payment of \$6.8 million, down 5 percent from 1985, brought the yearly total for the city to \$53 million.

San Antonio's check for \$3.3 million brought payments this year to \$28.5 million, up 3 percent. Austin received \$2.6 million, pushing total payments for 1986 to \$21.2 million, down 3 percent from last year.

Fort Worth's payment was \$2.2 million bringing the 1986 total to \$17.7 million, up 7 percent over last year. El Paso received a check for \$1.5 million, bringing total checks this year to \$11.2 million, up 8 percent.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$25.1 million to the state's six Metro-

politan Transit Authorities. Dallas' DART check was \$9.9 million, bringing total payments this year to \$80.8 million. Houston's MTA payment was \$9.6 million for a 1986 total of \$85.1 million. Austin's Capitol Metro received a \$2.7 million check for a yearly total of \$21.1 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$1.8 million, increasing payments this year to \$15.6 million. Fort Worth's MTA check was for \$521,808 for a total of \$4.2 million this year. Corpus Christi's MTA received a check for \$489,553 bringing total payments for the year to \$2.1 million.

June checks represent taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the comptroller by May 20.

Hansford County's 1986 payments to date total \$121,859.93. By comparison, 1985 payments to date equal \$114,434.61. This is a 6.49 percent change.

THE top cable channel in the U.S. is superstation WTBS. The latest Nielsen ratings show WTBS to have an audience estimated at 35 million homes.

THAT'S just about twice the audience the next two cable channels — CNN and Headline News.

ALSO of interest is the fact that Ted Turner's Atlanta telecasting empire began to earn money last year. WTBS has constantly earned profits, but not CNN and Headline News. But last year they turned in profits.

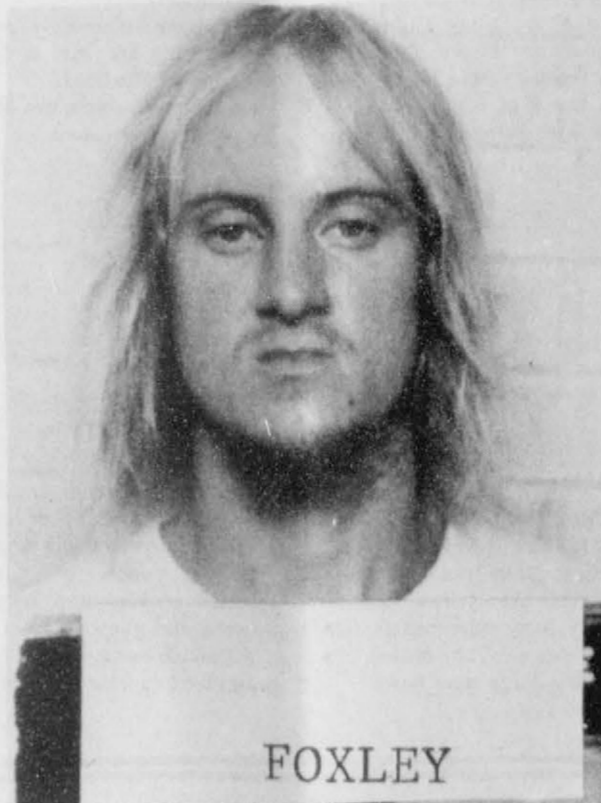
SINCE WTBS earns profits like \$65.8 million in 1984, one can understand how owner Turner was able to buy MGM/UA for \$1.5 billion last year. (He sold off United Artists for about one third of that.)

NEXT month the superstation will telecast what are called the Goodwill Games between U.S. and Soviet athletes in Moscow. This promises to be a major attraction, if only because of the fact that these two superpowers have dominated international sports meets like the Olympics in recent decades.

WTBS will telecast almost 1,000 hours of live sports in 1986, with the Moscow games the year's highlight. Since only WTBS will have these games, it will earn its title superstation in July with a special no other station can match.

THIS success story is welcome. Ted Turner's films and programs avoid excessive violence and gutter sex, at his direction.

## CRIME STOPPERS



Ricard Foxley

You can't really say that Ricard Lance Foxley has lived up to the adage of being "as smart as a fox."

In the past eight years, Foxley has been in and out of trouble spent some time in the Texas Department of Corrections system.

Now he is in trouble again. Foxley is wanted on Tarrant County warrants charging him with the May, 1985, kidnapping of his biological daughter. He is also wanted in Texas on warrants charging him with possession of marijuana, probation violation and on a misdemeanor warrant for driving with a suspended license.

This week Foxley has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list. A reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered for information leading to Foxley's capture.

Foxley's latest problems with the law began on May 5, 1985, when he allegedly failed to return his five-year-old daughter after a weekend visit.

Investigators say the young girl's mother was left a note which said, "I gotcha, and you know it." After looking unsuccessfully for her child for 12 days, the mother went to Arlington police and a kidnapping charge was filed against Foxley.

Detectives believe Foxley fled Texas following the incident. With the help of law enforcement agencies in Washington State and Colorado, they kept up the pressure on their quarry.

Apparently their efforts paid off. Ten months after the kidnapping, the young girl was dumped off unharmed in Arlington.

However, the girl's return has not diminished law enforcement efforts to capture Foxley.

He is described as a white male, 5-9, 155 pounds, with blonde hair and blue eyes. He might have a thin blonde moustache. Foxley also has a three-inch scar on his right calf.
