

We are promoting the Medic Alert Foundation. Engraved on their emblem is the medical condition, identification number and phone number of Medic Alert, which can be called for additional information.

Among the most often named reasons for membership are allergy to penicillin, diabetes, heart conditon, taking anticoagulants, wearing contact lenses, allergy to sulfa, epilepsy, allergy to insect stings, allergy to bee stings, allergy to codeine, glaucoma, neck breather, and implanted pacemaker.

1. The Medic Alert Foundation International is a nonprofit, charitable and tax-exempt organization classified by the U.S. Treasury Department under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. Founded in 1956, the Foundation provides the very best emergency medical identification system available in the world, serving persons with hidden or sepcial medical problems that cannot be easily seen or recognized. A. The first of the three-part system is the metallic alerting device or emblem in the form of a bracelet or necklace. It bears the insignia of the medical profession and the words "Medic Alert" in red. The membe's unique emberhsip number and the telephone number of the Emer gency Answering Service are also engraved.

B. The system of protection also includes a wallet card which is issued annually and contains personal and medical information in addition to that on the emblem. Because the card is dated, emergency personnel know they are working with information not more than a year old. Each member also recieves annualy a computer printout of all the personal and medical information in his emergency record so that it can be verified. He is remeinded that the emergency record can be updated at any time upon request. When a membership is updated, a new wallet card is produced fromt he new informa-

tion and sent to the member. C. The third part of Medic Alert's system is the Emergency Answering Service whihe is available to all emergency per sonnel around the clock via a collect telelphone call from any world location. The telephone number is engraved ont he emblem and printed onthe wallet card. Within seconds of receiving a call, emergency operators can relay emergency information from the computer-ized data base that might save a life. A percentage of each membership fee is placed in an established trust fund to assure that this service will always be


