

BRAMLETT RESIGNS

Spearman School Superintendent James Bramlett submitted his resignation to the Spearman School Board Tuesday night.

Bramlett's resignation is effective July 1, 1965, when he will assume his new duties as Superintendent of the Seminole Public Schools.

Bramlett's resignation came as a surprise to the Spearman Board. His current contract runs through June 30, 1966.

Bramlett said the offer to move to Seminole was a surprise to him. The Seminole board contacted him after they had made their own investigation of prospective superintendents. The school did not take applications for superintendent's post, after the death of the superintendent there last October.

Bramlett said the first indication he received about the position was approximately two weeks ago when the Seminole officials contacted him and asked if he would consider the position. At that time three candidates were being considered.

The Superintendent and his family met with the Seminole Board and he accepted the position Saturday.

Bramlett said he and his family were sorry to be leaving Spearman, but the Seminole position is a promotion and one of the top 3A schools in the state.

Seminole has approximately 2400 students in the 12 grades. It is located in the rich oil production areas between Lubbock and Midland and in recent years a large amount of irrigation farming has been developed.

The departing school leader is completing his third year in Spearman. He came here from Albany where he was Superintendent for six years.

Under Bramlett's leadership the Spearman school has improved its course of study with additional subjects, student counseling and other newer educational improvements.

Bramlett has been in the teaching profession for 18 years and 12 of these have been as a Superintendent.

While in Spearman Bramlett has been active in the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. He is serving his second term as President of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. and Mrs. Bramlett have three children, daughters, Barbara Ann, Cindy and son Jeff. They are members of the Methodist Church.

When asked if a raise in salary here would change his mind, Bramlett told the board that the Seminole position is a professional promotion, otherwise he would not consider it.

He said there had been opportunities to move during his three years in Spearman, but there are few districts that offer the advantages of Spearman.

"This is one of the best double A schools in the state," Bramlett said.

Board members said they will go ahead and seek a new Superintendent. They will accept applications for the position, but others may be considered, also.

Applications should be sent to the Spearman Public Schools, and not to individual board members. Applicants should not contact Board President D.E. Hackley, who is hospitalized with a heart condition. Lloyd Buzzard is now President Pro-Tem of the board.

Earnest Grissiam was indicted as a habitual criminal and burglary. Grissiam was indicted

Grissiam's brother, John Lincoln Grissiam, was indicted earlier this month on a charge of murder with malice by the grand jury.

John Grissiam is alleged to have shot and fatally wounded Mickey Westerfield while Grissiam was attempting to burglarize Westerfield's store.

Troy Beavers was indicted by the grand jury for fraudulent removal of mortgaged property from the county.

Willard Paul Cox was indicted on a second offense of burglary. He is alleged to have burglarized a service station in Gruver.

Clement Trial Opens In Spearman April 12

The trial of Robert E. Clement of Amarillo will open here in 84th District Court on Monday, April 12.

Clement is being tried on a charge of theft over \$50. He has been tried and convicted on the charge earlier in 47th District Court in Amarillo. However, the conviction was reversed by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals because of a faulty indictment.

A new trial was set and late last year a change of venue was granted and the second trial was moved to the 84th District Court here.

District Judge Max Boyer will hear the case here. Dee Miller, 48th District Attorney, and James P. Linn, County Attorney will prosecute the case.

Clement was owner of Superior Mfg. Co., in Amarillo

and in 1960 sold the firm to Harold Orr and others. They were later involved in the Billie Sol Estes scandal.

Second Probation Officer Hired for 84th District

The Hansford Commissioners Court approved this county's part of the employment of another probation officer for the 84th District.

The commissioners of Ochiltree, Hansford and Hutchinson counties had to approve the second officer. The second officer will assist John Stevens.

The new officer will be paid \$409 per month.

The commissioners also approved one application for opening a county road and rejected another.

The court approved two miles of road between sections 224 and 225 and sections 256 and 257 in Block Two of the

GH&H survey. The road is three miles west of Gruver. This joins two roads.

The rejected road was for one mile in the southwest edge of the county. This road would have been in fact a private road to one house.

The court has a policy of building a road to farmsteads, but the county does not make them into county roads, pay for bridges or maintain them.

County Board Divides Funds

The County School Board met Tuesday and handled two items of business.

They approved the purchase of two school buses. One for the Spearman Independent School District and the other for the Morse Independent District.

Day by Day

With all the national news coverage the civil rights demonstrators and marchers have received, I'm glad the Amarillo Globe-News' man, Bruce Romig is in Selma. I'd almost forgotten there are two sides to every issue.

There are two ways to make cakes too . . . from a mix or do-it-yourself style. Most of the packaged cakes taste so much alike, I like to make my own when I find a simple enough recipe. This coconut pound cake is one of those kind of recipes.

COCONUT POUNDCAKE

2 cups sugar
1 cup shortening
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon butter flavoring
6 eggs

1 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
1 can angel flake coconut

Cream shortening and sugar. Add flavors. Add eggs one at a time. Mix well. (Use high speed with electric mixer.) Sift flour and salt together then add slowly. Fold in coconut. Pour into 10" stem pan that has been well greased and dusted with flour. Bake at 325 degrees for about an hour and 20 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

COCONUT SAUCE

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
2 teaspoons coconut flavor

Mix all ingredients together about five or ten minutes before cake is baked. Bring to a boil and boil for one minute.

For hard glaze crust remove cake from oven. Brush or pour sauce over hot cake while still in the pan. Put the cake back in the oven for not over five minutes more. Remove cake from pan at once.

For other than hard glaze crust remove cake from pan immediately after it is baked. Brush sauce on with pastry brush while cake is still warm.

I don't qualify as an early riser, but this is a pretty good idea for starting a day I think.

State 4-H Roundup in June. SCREWORM ERADICATION

Texas farmers and ranchers have been asked to raise \$300,000 to keep the screw-worm eradication program in operation through June.

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation set the two-week period beginning March 29 for committees in all Texas counties to ask livestock producers for contributions to keep the popular insect eradication project alive until the Federal government can assume full financial responsibility. Livestock industry leaders are hopeful that with Congress considering a U.S. Department of Agriculture request for \$5 million, this will come about July 1.

Dolph Briscoe, Jr., SWAHRF president of Uvalde, stated his organization had investigated all alternatives before deciding to ask for additional contributions from producers and assured the livestock industry that its funds are vital to the continuation of the eradication project.

Eradication experts have estimated that during April, May and June, which in the past has been a time of heavy screw-worm activity, 100 million sterile screwworm flies will be needed each week to keep fertile insects from Mexico from reinfesting the Southwest where the livestock pest has been eradicated through use of the sterile male fly technique. Cost of operating at this level will be \$12,000 a day or approximately \$1.1 million for the three-month period.

The \$300,000 to be raised by livestockmen, along with \$250,000 already appropriated by the Texas Legislature, will match an equal amount of Federal funds to supply the total required.

Livestockmen have been asked to contribute 10 cents for each head of beef or dairy cattle or horse and two cents for each head of sheep, goats or swine. A similar campaign conducted by the Foundation earlier result-

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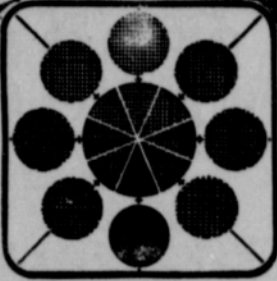

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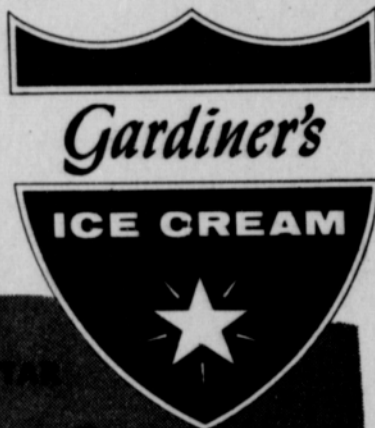
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Athletic Banquet Set Top Bowlers Club Meets Here Friday Night Announced

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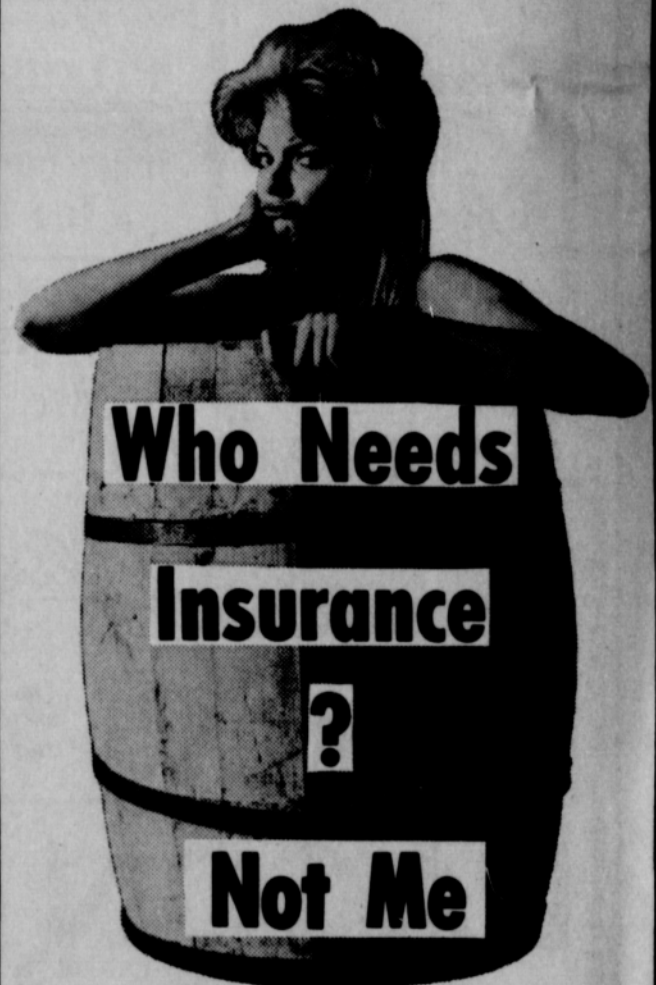
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
