Snider files for prec. 1 commissioner

With the filing deadline for county and district offices Monday, Feb. 6, Vance Snider has filed for commissioners Precinct 1, opposing incumbent Garland Head.

Others who have filed include incumbents, Helen Dry, Tax Assessor-Collector; R.L. McFarlin, Sheriff; John Hutchison, County Attorney; Garland Head, Commissioner Precinct 1; B.J. Renner, Commissioner, Precinct 3; W.L. Johnson, Chairman Precinct 7 and Carl Archer for Democratic County Chairman.

The office of district attorney and district judge is also up for re-election. Stephen Cross is the incumbent district attorney and J.E. Blackburn, incumbent district judge. Neither have filed for re-election although it is thought that Blackburn will be seeking another term of office.

For state representative of the 88th District, incumbent J.W.

(BUCK) Buchanan has filed for re-election. He has no opposition or at least no one has announced. The

same is true for Bill Sarpalus, who has his sights on returning to the State Senate, representing the 31st District.

Politics on the local level may be

dull but national and state election promise enough fire for everyone.

Spearman school district voters will elect two trustees with the terms of Jim Davis and Tommy White expiring.

Pringle-Morse school district will also be voting on two trustees with terms of Jon Jarvis and Bob Womble expiring.

Wayne Garrett and Ronnie Williams terms will be expiring in the Gruver school district.

In the city of Spearman election, terms are expiring for mayor Ralph Blodgett and councilmen Ed Garner and Jim Nicholson.

Mayor Blodgett and Garner have announced that they will be running for re-election.

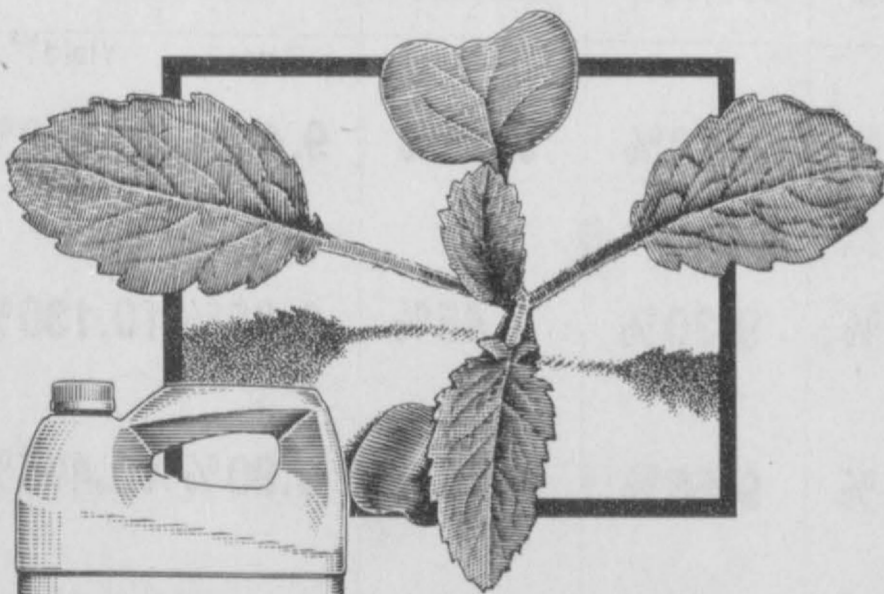

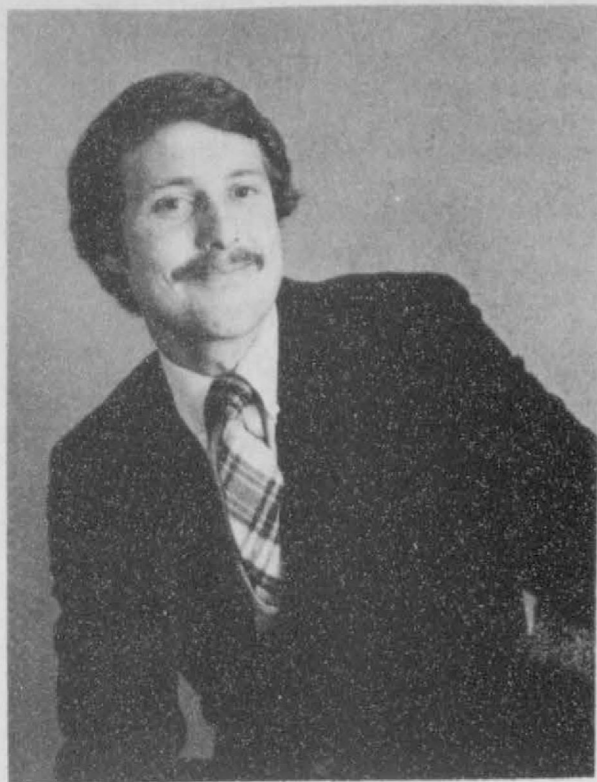

Terry Bradshaw featured speaker

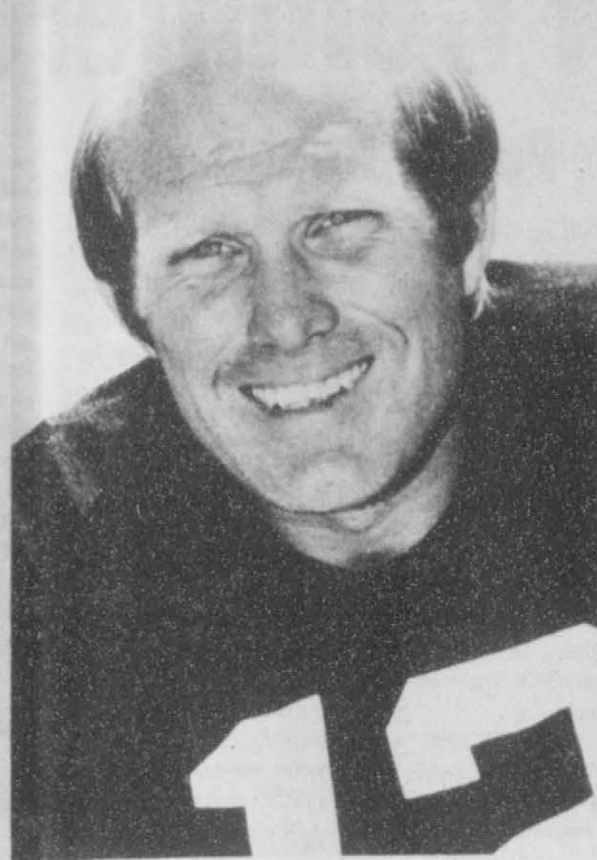
'Free Enterprise Day' planned

Two time Super Bowl most valuable and four time winner of the National Football League's summit game, Terry Bradshaw of the Pittsburgh Steelers, will be a part of the Free Enterprise Rally to be hosted by Borger High School February 8.

The rally, sponsored by the Spearman and other area Rotary Clubs and several area businesses will also feature a 1956 naturalized citizen of the United States and Oklahoma University graduate in chemical engineering, F.J. Spencer. The rally will culminate with Michael Broome, an inspirational and humorous speaker.

Free Enterprise is what has made the United States a great powerful country and the younger generation, that must carry on this system, must understand the system. A recent Chamber of Commerce opinion poll showed that students in the United States do not understand free enterprise.

Bradshaw, Broome and Spencer are considered one of the best groups of speakers to represent the free enterprise system.

Bradshaw, by far, is the best known of the group because of national television exposure on NFL football broadcasts as a player for the Pittsburgh Steelers and as a color commentator during broadcasts when not playing and on commercials. The 6'3", 215 lbs. quarterback who wears #12 for the black and gold of the Pittsburgh professional team was the number one draft in 1970. It was his duty to lead a team that had never won a championship in its entire history to the Super Bowl. For eight consecutive years from 1972 to 1979 the Steelers made the playoffs and appeared in six AFC championship games winning four trips to the Super Bowl. The Steelers have not lost a Super Bowl Game.

Bradshaw was the unanimous choice as MVP in both Super Bowl III and XVI and was named "Sportsman of the Year" in 1979. He sat out this entire season with an

elbow injury, but has not indicated that he will retire even after 15 years in the league.

F.J. Spencer was born in Bombay, India, and attended St. Xavier's High School and St. Xavier's College of the University of Bombay, from which he was graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Chemistry, cum laude, in 1946. At college, he was a member of the Debating Team and lettered in Swimming and Tennis.

He came to the U.S.A. in January, 1948, and entered Oklahoma University where he obtained a Master's Degree in Chemical Engineering. At the University of Oklahoma, Mr. Spencer was twice elected President of the International Club, was Vice-Chairman of the YMCA Steering Committee, Assistant to the Dean of Men for foreign-student orientation and Student Director of the OU International Understanding Program. He also met and married the former Nina Mae Wooten of Oklahoma City in 1949, while completing his studies at OU.

Mr. Spencer is a founder and Trustee of the Institute for Free Enterprise, The Free Market Education Foundation and the Tuesday Forum. For his work in acquainting the business as well as academic communities with the principals, practices and benefits of free enterprise, he was awarded the 1976 Americanism Award of The Jaycees, the 1976 Honor Certificate from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge and the 1977 George Washington Medal of Honor from the same organization. Mr. Spencer is a member of the South Texas District Export Council and chairs its committees on Export Counselling and Governmental Affairs.

Michael Broome is one of those rare individuals who is making a living doing what he always wanted to: Talk. The unusually gifted and talented performer does more than just deliver thought-provoking messages. He drives home his points by use of humorous characters, pantomime, imitations, and superb acting.

Broome made his first speech when he was 18, and he incorporated numerous showmanship tactics to emphasize his points. He was an instant hit, and has been at the microphone ever since.

His presentations are exciting, entertaining and informative and he can move an audience to a wide range of emotions. On stage, he has the fiery delivery of Billy Sunday, the conservative wryness of Paul Harvey, the sincerity of Art Linkletter, the dramatic ability of Orson Wells, and humor of Red Skelton.

Offstage, Broome is a quiet, serious-minded thinker who is vitally concerned over the deterioration of our economic and political systems and the loss of our nation's moral fiber. His deep interest has led to one of his most popular topics-our free enterprise system. Says he, "Too many people want the front of the bus, the back of the church and the middle of the road." He will deliver "You and America: Two Great Champions!" to the

students of the rally here in which America and private enterprise are looked at from a positive perspective.

MIRROR IMAGERY

Short of knocking out a wall and building an addition, there is no more effective way to visually expand interior space than by paving a wall with mirror. This technique is being seen more and more frequently in apartments and small homes where actual physical expansion is impossible. Homeowners would do well to consider the benefits of a mirror wall before undertaking major remodeling.

As a decorating whim an expanse of mirror may seem expensive, but it is substantially less per square foot than construction. Although it is only a visual ploy, a mirrored wall often does the job well where there is a need for visual rather than actual living space.

The illusion of abundant space can be pleasant in many areas of the home that may seem crowded or cramped. When carefully chosen and placed in these areas, mirrors can create the grand illusion of spaciousness.

Great expanses of mirror are handsome and dramatically effective, but mirrors of any size can have an impact. Hanging a mirror on a wall is much like cutting out an opening or a window. The area, large or small, drops away or opens up.

Good mirrors can be found in discount, secondhand and antique stores as well as conventional outlets. Even inexpensive new mirrors can be effective. Three or four closet-door mirrors from the nearest discount store can be mounted in vertical position behind a sofa or a bed as a room focal point. Mirrors can be flush mounted on surfaces other

than walls. Consider the impact and depth when fitted on the back panel of cupboards, display cabinets, secretaries or wardrobes.

The ultimate consideration in using mirrors in the home should be the reflected image. Take care to determine exactly what the reflected image will be when a mirror is used in a certain location. A small kitchen for example, can gain dimension with the installation of mirrors beneath the upper cabinets. However, if the kitchen counters are typically cluttered, the use of a mirror would only tend to multiply an unsightly image.

Mirrors are excellent for reflecting those things worthy of being seen again and again—a prized collection, a pleasant setting, or an outstanding art object or plant.
