

## Hospital board is doctor hunting!

It was learned at the regular Hospital Board meeting Thursday night that Dr. James M. Thomas of Spearman will begin a residence practice at John Peter Smith Hospital in Ft. Worth. He will become an orthopedic physician and plans to close his offices in Spearman either Christmas Eve or New Years Eve.

In a long session (until 1 a.m. Friday morning), the Hospital Board wrestled with the question of where to find more doctors and what to do. Both the Chief of Staff, R. L. Kleeberger, and Dr. Thomas were present to assist and answer questions to the Board.

The Board did agree to negotiate with Dr. Park, who was flown to Spearman at Baker & Taylor's expense this week to meet the people of the community, and see if he would practice here. The Board is negotiating with Dr. Park and early Friday morning

Hospital Manager, Jerry Taylor, informed the Plainsmen that the two Vietnamese Gruver doctors would receive their license and begin practice in four weeks. This should take some of the pressure off of the doctor shortage, having these two doctors available in four weeks!

The Board also authorized Taylor to place advertisements in the Toronto, Canada papers for doctors. Taylor will place the ads and then, accompanied by one of the local druggists or a Board member, will fly to Toronto and interview prospective doctors who might want to come to Hansford County.

The Board did not declare an executive session last night and allowed the editor and one visitor, Lady Biggers, to "sit in" during the entire meeting. We want to congratulate Mr. Taylor and the Board for this!

## National Honor Society Installation

Raymie Porter called the National Honor Society to order for its 1976 installation ceremony at 10 a.m., Oct. 12, in Spearman High School Auditorium.

Carrie Clark led the invocation and Alan Shields led the pledge to the flag.

Denise Cope then stepped forward and said "Many times one begins to feel his existence is futile. Then begins to wonder why endeavor to achieve. Yet when it takes time to do so, he finds that out of all the chaos, life is a cosmos or harmonious world." She then read A COSMOS, NOT A CHAOS by Admiral Richard E. Byrd.

### A COSMOS, NOT A CHAOS

I paused to listen to the silence. My breath, crystallized as it passed my cheeks, drifted on a breeze gentler than a whisper. The wind vane pointed toward the South Pole. Presently the wind cups ceased their gentle turning as the cold killed the breeze. My frozen breath hung like a cloud overhead.

The day was dying, the night was being born—but with great peace. Here were the imponderable processes and forces of the cosmos, harmonious and soundless. Harmony, that was it! That was what came out of the silence—a gentle rhythm, the strain of a perfect chord, the music of the spheres, perhaps.

It was enough to catch that rhythm, momentarily to be myself a part of it. In that instant I could feel no doubt of man's oneness with the universe. The conviction came that rhythm was too orderly, too harmonious, too perfect to be a product of blind chance—that, therefore, there must be purpose in the whole and that man was part of that whole and not an accidental offshoot. It was a feeling that transcended reason; that went to the heart of man's despair and found it groundless. The universe was a cosmos, not a chaos; man was as rightfully a part of that cosmos as were the day and night.

David Evans then stepped forward, lit the gold candle and said, "I have lit the candle of scholarship. Scholarship is an important part of the National Honor Society. Scholarship is learning and knowledge. We gain our knowledge through the teachers in our school, through our teachers at home, and through the teachers in our community. We also gain knowledge through the actual experience of everyday living. Our generation will assume important roles in society in the near future. In order to carry the responsibilities and make the wise decisions required of us, we must have knowledge and a clear perception of truth. Therefore, we must strive for a high degree of scholarship. When we have achieved this, we will be more prepared to serve our positions in the world and serve our fellow man."

Elaine Reimer then came to the podium, lit a red candle and said, "I light the candle of service. May we always be an example of willingness to serve others. Scholarship, character, and leadership would be incomplete without service. To have the fullest life one cannot live for himself alone. Good scholarship, fine character, and inspiring leadership may be lacking in some small part if service for

our fellow man is not added.

To serve is to work and use one's talents not only to help himself but for others as well. One who serves gives much of himself and gives it willingly. In serving others, it is not necessary to conceal one's own qualities, but it requires the development of them. By practicing friendliness and good will now, we will benefit our country as an adult. It is now when we need men and women who can rise above everyday matters and serve both God and man unselfishly."

Pam Rylant stepped forward, lit a blue candle and said, "I light the candle of leadership. May the ability to lead others continue to manifest itself in Spearman High School. Leadership in its highest sense is not simply an outgrowth of a pleasing personality. Leadership, in order to benefit mankind, must proceed from unselfish motives, from a strong character, and from a self-informed mind. It requires constant denial of self, a genuine affection for mankind, and an abiding trust in God. Humility is a requisite here also, for the success of any cause is endangered when the leader thinks himself higher than the cause. A true leader is marked by self-confidence and poise, both of which are born of experience, knowledge, and an understanding of men. Self-confidence is not conceit, but it is a genuine belief in the righteousness of one's cause and a just appraisal of one's ability and knowledge. The peace and prosperity of the world, the success of Christianity, and the salvation of mankind from itself are in your hands. Accept this charge and when petty quarrels threaten to detour you, look ahead to the broad horizon and refuse to be stopped until you have attained your goal, keeping in mind that "without God's help, you cannot succeed; with it, you cannot fail," in any good thing. In you, the leaders of your own world today, lies the hope of the world tomorrow."

Jim Jones then lit the white candle and said, "I have lit the candle of character. Character is the force in one man that distinguishes him from others. It gives him personality. Character is defined by the dictionary as the 'moral constitution or the qualities that distinguish one person or thing from others.' Your character is your identification, it signifies who and what you are. It is up to each individual to build the type of character that he wants to possess. So, in this time of increasing emphasis of being a part of the group, it is important to remember that we are individuals and we must act as individuals not as what our peers want or expect us to do. Our good character must dictate what we do even if we must go against the group's will."

Crystal Carson came forward and said, "You have heard the ideals of the National Honor Society. If you believe in these ideals and are willing to uphold them, you are ready to make the pledge which I shall give you. At the same time the senior members of our Society will repeat their pledges: I pledge myself to uphold the ideals of the National Honor Society, to build character in myself, to promote scholarship, to carry the torch of leadership, to serve my school, my community,

## Lynx win 7-6

What happened at Dalhart? Two great football teams played a game that was in doubt for the entire 48 minutes and the Lynx offense and defense both played well as did the golden Wolves from Dalhart. Ironically enough, the game was decided on the 4th play!

Dalhart received the opening kick-off and returned to the 27 yard line. They ran three plays and on 4th down, a hard-charging Lynx line knocked their center down as well as their entire front wall, and the punter never did get a chance to punt, and the Lynx took over on the 20 yard line. The Dalhart coach came out on the field and he was penalized 15 yards. The Lynx took the ball on the 6-yard line and Dalhart jumped off sides and they were penalized half the distance to the goal line. After several tries at the line, on 4th down and 4 yards to go, Mercury Morris sailed into the end zone and Zane the train kicked the extra point and the Lynx won a ball game.
