Welcome To The HANSFORD ROUNDUP

The activities for the Hansford Round-up Days began Monday evening with a 8 p.m. rodeo performance. Rodeos were scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday evening but at press time there was some doubt whether the Tuesday night performance would be held due to the heavy rain early Tuesday morning.

A teen Disco will be held from 8 to 12 Friday evening for 13-18 years olds. It will be at the community building, and "The Country Doctor" Doc DeWeese of KDJW in Amarillo is scheduled for that performance. Cost is \$2.00 per person.

Saturday is always the big day for celebration activities and this year will be no exception.

A sidewalk sale will be held in downtown Spearman and at the Plains Shopping Center also.

The Hansford County Home Demonstration Council Bake-off will be held at 9:30 a.m. Saturday in front of the Old Lyric Theatre. The county judge and commissioners will be the judges. All baked goods will be sold after the contest.

Also at 9:30 Saturday, the annual Old Timer Reunion

will be held at the Joe Traylor Ford building.

The parade is scheduled for 11 a.m. Saturday. General James Rose, the director of the Texas Water Development Board of Austin, will be the parade marshal. The theme for the parade this year is "It's A Child's World. There will be eight floats entered, decorated bicycles, the Texas Agricultural Products will have a station wagon in the parade. Lynn Kemper is scheduled to have his restored Corvette in the parade. Judges for the parade will be Bobbie Harper, owner of Ad Best in Amarillo (she is the sister of Travis Davis) and Doc De Weese, Amarillo disc jockey.

The barbecue will be after the parade. It will be served downtown. Harvester Pit Bar-B-Q of Pampa will cater the meal. Cost is \$3.50 for adults and \$1.75 for children. A square dance has been set for 1:30 Saturday on Main Street.

Moose Lodge 2212 has scheduled games for girls and boys for 1:30 p.m. east of the Court House. There will be a sack race for 3 to 5 year olds, 6 to 10 year olds, and 11 to 14 year olds. First prize in each age group will be \$2.00 and second will be

\$1.00. A soft ball throwing contest will be held for ages 6 to 10 and 11 to 14. Prizes will also be for \$2.00 first place and \$1.00 for second place. Also on the schedule is a 3 legged race planned for ages 6 to 10 and 11 to 14. Prizes will be the same as the other two races.

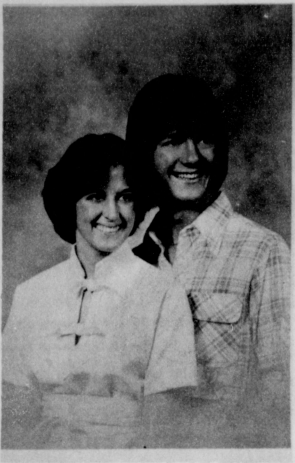

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LEGAL NOTICE

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Corn Growers Association, 105 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027, a referendum election on July 29, 1977, under provisions of Article 55C, Vernon's Civil Statutes on the proposition of whether or not corn producers in the following counties shall assess themselves an amount not to exceed 1/2 cent per bushel on all corn sold to be collected at the first point of sale, and to elect members for a 6-person commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, promotion, and education designed to encourage production, marketing, and use of Texas corn.

Counties included in the referendum are: Area I - Deaf Smith, Palmer, Castro, Bailey, and Lamb. Area II - Randall, Swisher, Brisco, Hale, and Floyd. Area III - Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, and Carson.

The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county courthouse in the referendum area. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent offices, or the Texas Corn Growers Association. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at 105 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027, before midnight three days prior to the election date.

Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced corn for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners or farmers and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

4-H'ers May Qualify For Scholarships

Winners in Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana and Nebraska will receive their awards through Gulf Central Pipeline Company, a Santa Fe Industries Company, Tulsa, Okla. All others are donated by Santa Fe Railway System, Chicago.

Candidates for awards and scholarships must have completed at least one year of 4-H work and be in good scholastic standing at the time they apply.
