The recent news release on projected population for this county and the rest of Texas is causing unhappiness in other places of the Plains besides Hansford County.

Some people are viewing the population study as just another weapon in the battle between the High Plains irrigation country and downstate interests over the underground water.

The Water districts of the irrigation country have been waging a battle for sometime to keep local control of the underground water on the Plains.

Downstate interests are trying to get control of this water in a statewide water plan.

It is the contention in downstate circles that when the underground water is pumped out of the Plains, the population will decline, leaving this area a vast dryland farming area.

Many downstate consider the underground water as vital to the rivers that feed the downstate water supplies. Therefore, they want it conserved for future uses.

This is going to be a long, hard battle for the Plains to retain our water, so we had better be prepared to show that none is wasted.

During the Christmas holidays KBMF-FM has done a series of interviews with college students. The students have pointed out many things they wish they had done different while in high school to better prepare themselves for college.

January Has Gifford Hill Moves 2 Deadlines District Office Here For Farmers

Farmers are reminded that some government farm program deadlines will be in January, according to Ellzey Vanderburg, ASC office manager for Hansford County.

Vanderburg said Jan. 17 is the first deadline. This is the final date to sign-up for new cotton allotments for new growers.

The second January deadline concerns cotton, also. Jan. 28 is the final date to release cotton allotment acres and also to request additional cotton acreage.

Farmers may begin signing up for the wheat, feed grain and cotton programs on Jan. 24. The sign-up period runs through April 1.

Farmers may join the Cropland Adjustment Program from Jan. 24 through May 30.

The division office of Gifford-Hill Western was moved this week from Dumas to the new concrete-pipe plant site in Spearman.

Production in the new plant is expected to begin in January, an earlier estimate was Jan. 15. The plant will produce concrete Lock-Seal pipe. The yard here will handle aluminum pipe and Gifford-Hill Western's new white plastic pipe.

The new plant site on the Gruver highway has three buildings. An office building, a production plant and a repair shop. The office building will have offices for Jim Burks, Division Manager; Accountant Carroll Meeker; Jon Cranford, Dispatcher; and Mack Mauldin, Sales Engineer.

This new plant is expected to bring approximately 18 new families to Spearman. There may be more moving

here later, but some local people have been employed.

Two of the plant leaders, Mauldin and Ray Salsman have been living in Spearman since September. Burks have bought Maude Mathews home on Endicott. Meeker and Cranford will move their families here soon.

Crews for laying the pipe will work from Spearman. The plant will operate the year-around to keep enough pipe made for the crews to operate during the pipelaying season.

This year the Chamber will present the "Outstanding Citizen of the Year" award.

A committee for the Chamber of Commerce has been working on selecting a person who has been a leader in some activity in Spearman.

The new board of directors first task will be appointing committee chairmen, and organizing a program of work for

the Chamber this year.

The Chamber was successful in 1965 in securing one new industry for Spearman, Gifford-Hill Western Concrete pipe plant.

Several other agri-business firms have expressed an interest in a Spearman location. The Chamber has been providing information to these firms.

Two Dumas Men Jailed

Two Dumas men are in the Hansford County jail charged with destruction of over \$50 worth of private property.

In jail in lieu of \$2,000 bond each, are Roy Gene Wright and Edward Doak, both of Dumas.

The men allegedly damaged three batteries on some machinery and damaged some equipment owned by the Jones Pipeline Service of Gruver and John Armes.

Sheriff J.B. Cooke said the two men allegedly broke into the Armes house and stayed all night in the house. The Armes family were away from home.

Sometime Monday night or Tuesday morning the men allegedly went to the Armes house and borrowed a tractor to pull their truck out of a ditch.

Allegedly the men were then unable to get their pick-up started and tried to take some batteries from the machinery. They damaged the batteries and did not get them off the machinery.

Officers said after the men did not get their truck started, they allegedly broke a window in the Armes home and spent the night in the house.

They are also facing charges in Moore County of theft over \$50.

knight again had six.

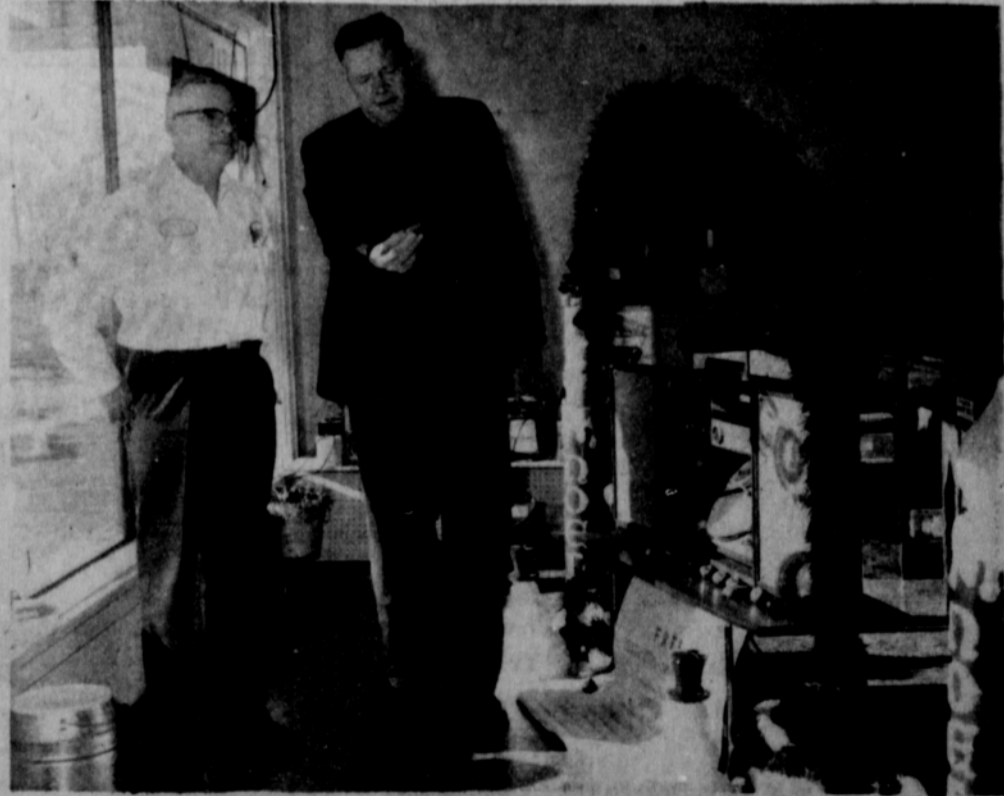
Spearman took advantage of their free shots and hit on 15 of 21 attempts. Grandbury only made 12 of 23. They out-fouled Spearman 17 to 16.

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FHA Now Accepting Loan Applications

Farmers Home Administration is now accepting loan applications from rural families who need to improve their housing, Robert J. Holloway, the agency's supervisor for Hansford, Hutchinson, Lipscomb and Ochiltree Counties said today.

Funds may be used to finance homes, building sites, and essential farm service buildings.

Under the new program private capital will provide the bulk of the funds with the Farmers Home Administration making the loans and guaranteeing the repayments of principal and interest to the investors.

Legislation implementing the new insured loan program was contained in the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1965.

The Act authorizes the Farmers Home Administration to insure loans totaling \$300 million each year for families in low or moderate income levels. These loans will bear interest at 5 percent.

Additionally, loans bearing 5-3/4 percent interest can be insured for families with incomes above the moderate level.

Holloway said that loans are available to families living on farms and in rural areas including towns of 5,500 popu-

lation to construct, improve, or repair rural homes and related facilities, or farm service buildings, or to provide water for farmstead and household use.

Families needing credit to improve their present housing may use loan funds to add bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens, and other home improvements, as well as to enlarge or remodel farm service buildings and put in related facilities such as yard fences, driveways and sidewalks.

A farmer may borrow funds to provide buildings for his use or for the use of his tenants and laborers.

A rural resident may use loan funds to buy a previously occupied house, or to buy a site on which to build his home or to build or repair a home on land he owns.

Insured rural housing loans are made to applicants who are unable to obtain the required credit from other sources.

James Lair's Father Succumbs

As a young man, he was a member of the Canyon Town basketball team that lost only one game from 1908 until 1912. He was a veteran of World War I, a member of the Methodist Church, and served as president of the Randall County Dairy Association.

Besides his son in Spearman, he is survived by his wife, four other sons, one daughter, three brothers, one sister and 17 grandchildren.

Nearly 61,000 veterans and dependents of veterans in the Waco area who receive Veterans Administration monthly pension payments were reminded today to report their annual income by January 31, 1966, to the VA Regional Office to avoid having their payments stopped.

Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office at Waco, said that income reports have been slow this year in spite of the fact that the VA has mailed to all who receive pension a simplified punched card on which the income report must be made.

These questionnaire forms must not be folded or otherwise mutilated as they are run through automatic data processing machines.

Dependent parents who receive dependency and indemnity compensation also received these questionnaires as their payments are also regulated by the amount of their income.

Pay Your Poll Tax

It is going to take a poll tax to vote in local and state elections, this year, Tax Collector J. B. Cooke said this week.

The poll tax question is in court in the state, but Cooke said state officials say it is very doubtful if a decision will be reached before the elections this Spring.

Only 459 poll taxes have been paid this year, Cooke said the county should have 2,000 to 2,500 poll taxes this year.

There are elections this year for the school board, city officers, county offices and state offices.
